

SLIGHT ELECTRIC RATE INCREASE IS OK'D BY COUNCIL

For the first time in more than 15 years electric consumers in Plymouth will pay a small increase on their electric bills. The new rate schedule, which was sent to council for approval, was passed by the mayor and council at its meeting held Tuesday night.

At the last session of council Mayor Briggs appointed Glen West and Royal Eckstein to meet with the board to go over the proposed rates. At a joint session Monday night the committee and board members thoroughly discussed the rates from all angles, and the revenue needed to continue efficient electric service to the village.

The proposed rates, adopted by the board and submitted to council, are as follows:

First 15 KWH (Min) . . . \$1.00
Next 15 KWH at75
Next 60 KWH at2.40
Next 100 KWH at3.00
Next 110 KWH at024
Next 300 KWH at024

All over 600 KWH at 2c per KWH

For the approximate 650 electric consumers in Plymouth, the new rates will mean an increase of about 75c per month over present rates. The increase is very small in comparison to the higher prices which the board has been paying for the past several years for material, supplies and labor.

The new rates compare very favorably, in fact lower than many communities the size of Plymouth, and while the committee from council and board members did not use rates of other communities, it does to base their new rates, it does prove that Plymouth has been very low in raising electric rates despite mounting costs of material, labor and equipment.

Solicitor Joseph Dush is to prepare legal legislation on the new rates which will be presented to council at its March 18 meeting for final approval. No definite date has been set as to when the new rate schedule will go into effect.

In making its decision, the board found that most towns and cities had not only residential rates, but also commercial and industrial rates. The rate schedule at Plymouth is supplied with a "power rate," which is applicable to those stores with three-phase service, and the new rate schedule does not affect the power rate. In all instances the commercial rate in neighboring towns is much higher than the residential rate in Plymouth.

THE WEATHER

February was a mild, spring-like month with no extremes of temperature. The average for the month was 32.5 degrees, or 4.7 degrees above normal. The highest was 52 on the 28th; the lowest 16 on the 15th.

Precipitation was practically normal—2.13 inches, an excess of only .04 inch. Snowfall was also light, measuring only 1 inch.

With the exception of December when the thermometer dropped to 13 below zero, this has been an average month. The average and normal temperatures for the three months are as follows:

Siding to Cost NYC \$175,000

The NYC siding from the Shelby Junction to the Wilkins Specialized Air Depot will cost the railroad an estimated \$175,000. The service track had been requested by the railroad for the new road, and the siding will increase facilities for rail shipping.

County engineer Walter Ruck had previously disclosed that the level of the State street and the Township Road No. 61 will be raised four feet at the place of crossing. It will require the removal of 550 feet of present pavement, placing new highway embankment and new road metal. The railroad is to bear all costs of placing the new highway grade and all costs of maintaining the new road, together with the installation of storm drainage lines at this point.

Mr. Ruck previously announced, Mayor J. H. Stinson and City Engineer Howard Stinson agreed that there had no objections to the construction of the new road, and the Black Rock fork just north of the City limits, as modified, and the proposal is to be approved.

A service track from the Baltimore and Ohio has served the air force depot since its inception some eight years ago. The new track will provide direct service by both major rail systems.

RUBBISH DISPOSAL AREAS LEASED BY VILLAGE COUNCIL

Following complaints and petitions which gave out objections to a proposed site in the southwest section of the town to be used for a dumping site, members of the village council went hunting again the past week and came up with a new location at Tuesday night's session of council.

Glen West and William Ross, committee members on rubbish disposal, revealed that Eugene Beeching has offered the village a tract of land, 300 ft. by 260 ft., with an average depth of 8 feet, to be used as a rubbish disposal area. The tract is located one-quarter mile south of Plymouth on State Route 61.

A resolution was passed by the council authorizing the mayor and clerk to enter into a ten-year lease with Mr. Beeching, under terms and conditions suitable to both parties involved. PHONE COMPANY TO SELL STOCK

The Public Utilities Commission at Columbus, Ohio, today issued an order approving the sale by Southern Ohio Telephone Company of an issue of its 5 per cent preferred stock. The Telephone Company had made application to the Commission to capitalize capital expenditures for net additions to its property made from July 1, 1950 to December 31, 1951 in the amount of \$1,918,212.32. After checking the books of the Company, the P.U.C.O. approved the application.

Northern Ohio Telephone Company has announced that it will offer for sale to its stockholders residing in the State of Ohio and to telephone subscribers, an issue of 10,000 shares of 5 per cent preferred stock as of April first. - 2 slices bacon, diced
- 1/2 lb. ground beef
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1/2 C. raw rice
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 3 1/2 C. (No. 2 1/2 can) tomatoes
- 2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 1 green pepper, cut in rings

Fry bacon in skillet. Add ground beef and onion and brown well. Sprinkle rice over meat mixture. Add salt and pepper. Add tomatoes in a layer, being sure all of rice is moistened. Sprinkle on Worcestershire sauce. Overlap green pepper rings around edge of pan. Cover with tight fitting lid. Cook over full flame until steam escapes from lid. Turn flame to simmer position and cook 30 minutes. Makes 4 servings.

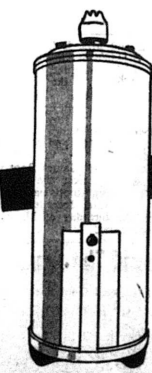

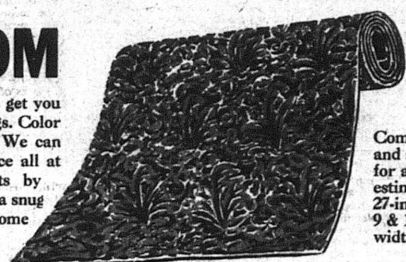

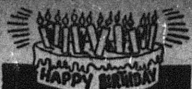

116 YEARS AGO TODAY

One hundred and sixteen years ago today, the Alamo was massacred. The siege began February 23, The Mexican general, Santa Anna, invaded Texas with a large army. The Texans, who were not prepared, had only 163 men. For Catholic mission they used must be killed. Then Santa Anna ordered these six men to be killed too, but one escaped. During this time, General Houston saved the independence of Texas. The Alamo is sometimes called the "Thermopylae of America."

On April 21, San Jacinto, Texas the Mexicans were driven across the border. The Texas army at Houston had the battle cry "Remember the Alamo!" The Alamo is a historic structure which stands in the center of San Antonio, Texas. It was at first a Catholic mission, but Padre Olvera moved it to the city of San Antonio on the Rio Grande about 1718. This mission consisted of a main body and a chapel enclosed by high walls. The name Alamo was given later because of the cottonwood trees which surrounded the mission. Alamo is the Spanish name for this tree.

Now the mission is used for a fort.
