Welcome to the EASTER SERVICES of Your Church

The joyous Easter season again returning reminds us that almost 2,000 years ago an event occurred in the city of Jerusalem that has brought more joy and peace to human hearts than any other event in recorded history. The resurrection of Jesus Christ was the climax of His unparalleled life.

It, the resurrection, is the cornerstone of all Christian faith and hope as the Apostle Paul wrote in I Cor. 15: 14 "And if Christ be not risen, then is our preaching vain, and your faith is also vain." The resurrection of Jesus from the dead was the focal point of the faith, hope, and witness in the preaching of the early Apostles. Everything pertaining thereto hinged upon it. It has been the chief target of the enemies of Christ since the day when the disciples discovered the empty tomb.

THE JEWS, skeptics, unbelievers, rationalists, humanists, etc., of all the Christian centuries have endeavored to disprove it, but without success. The reliability of its truth has stood through all these years. The following are some of the bulwarks upon which it has stood from the resurrection to the fulfillment of Jewish prophecy and also the words of Jesus himself that He would rise again the third day. Secondly, there was the evidence of the empty tomb and the folded grave clothes; "He is not here. He is risen as He said," Spoke a Mother to a Christian. "We have proof in our religion which you do not have in yours. When we go to Mecca we can find the tomb of Mohammed, so we know such a person lived. But when you go to Palestine you can find no such tomb of Christ. Therefore we have a proof that you have not." To which the Christian replied: "You are right, we have no tomb in our religion, because we have no corpse." There is no decaying corpse at the center of our Christian faith. Our faith is fed by the fact that the worst has been met and conquered. Thirdly, there was the appearance of the resurrected Christ to many of his followers so convincing them, that the effect upon the disciples was almost miraculous. Their sorrow was turned to joy, their despair to hope, their lethargy into fervency, their apathy into passion. They "came alive" and yet were ready to die for their faith. They were willing to suffer the loss of all things, even life itself, for their loyalty and witness to their living Lord.

THE RESURRECTION has also its testimony in nature. In a lonely farmhouse a woman past the age of age lay slowly dying. The doctor who had known her all her life stood by her bed. "Doctor," said the dying woman, "How much time have I?" "About a week, Sarah," he replied. "Only a week and when this body will be decaying up to the hillsides. But where will I be?" The doctor stepped to the window and took from the sill a flower crock in which a magnolia was growing and carrying it to the bedside, quietly said: "Sarah, a few weeks ago I saw you planting the seeds of this magnolia; the seeds are rotting in the ground but what beauty and fragrance have come from them!" If God so will, the grass of the field, shall not much more clothe you?" Sarah's eyes were full of sudden tears. "Give it to me!" she said. The doctor placed the silent crock in her hands and quietly left the room.

WHILE the bird was in the shell the beauties of nature were all around it, but it was unconscious of them until it escaped from the shell. What is Heaven? As we have never seen anything like Heaven, we could not understand it if it were described to us. If it were the shell of the world, the sunlight, the moonlight, the air, the birds, the flowers? "O death, where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory? Thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."
