We are planning to have our next meeting at Frindly House in Mansfield.

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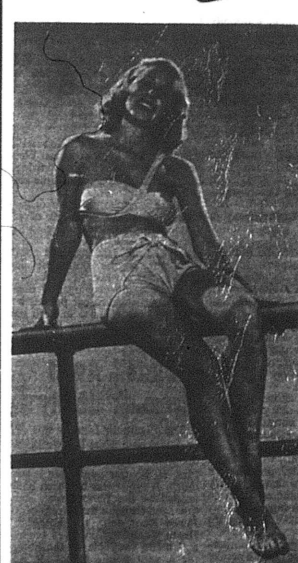
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RETURNS FROM AKRON

Plymouth, O., March 28, 1952
Proposals will be received at the office of the postmaster until 10:00 a.m., April 15, 1952 for the hire of vehicles without drivers on an hourly basis for use in collecting, delivering, and relaying mail during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1952. EQUIPMENT TO BE IN FIRST CLASS CONDITION.

Each proposal must be enclosed in a sealed envelope, with the notation on the envelope "Proposal for Vehicle Service, City of Plymouth, Ohio," and addressed to the postmaster. If the bids are mailed, they must bear proper postage. Type motor vehicle (truck or passenger car)—truck.

Estimated hours of service per day: Weekdays—2 hours. Estimated hours of service each quarter—80 hours. Payment will be made for hours of service rendered including loading time; payment will NOT be made for standing, swing, or lunch time.

The owner will be required to equip each vehicle with adequate locking device, keep the vehicle in satisfactory condition at all times; bear all necessary expense in connection with the operation and maintenance of same; deliver them each day to the starting point as ordered by the postmaster (post office, branch, or station) and remove them daily after delivery. 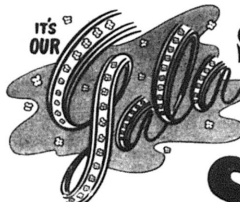

NORWALK, O.—Ohio received its largest, single payment for 1951 bonus tag stickers recently when John F. Rasmussen, Norwalk Truck Line president, handed a certified check for \$217,000 to Hiram County Deputy Motor Vehicle Registrar A. H. Specht (left). The payment covered all trucks, tractors, and trailers domiciled in Ohio by the trucking firm. Because of the state legislature's increase of approximately 35 percent in Ohio truck license fees last year, Norwalk's current payment was almost \$100,000 above the \$118,000 paid in 1951. Company officials reported approximately 77 percent of Norwalk's tag fees will go back to township, city and counties for road construction and maintenance programs. The other 23 percent will be kept for the state highway system over which the company's equipment operates almost exclusively.
