"Quo Vadis" Author Nobel Prize Winner

More than twelve years of conception, planning and actual production went into the giant effort of filming "Quo Vadis", the most spectacular picture of our time, which will be shown at the Castamba Theatre, with Robert Taylor and Deborah Kerr starring in a cast of thousands.

John Lee Mahin, S. N. Behrman and Sonya Levien were the writers who accomplished the herculean task of whipping the complex story into a workmanlike script. Robert Taylor and Deborah

Kerr were chosen to head the cast. "Quo Vadis" opens at the Castamba in Shelby on Sunday, with the first performance starting at 12:30 and continuous. Monday & Tuesday the show begins at 2:00 p. m., continuous.

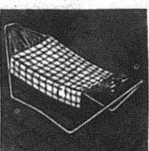

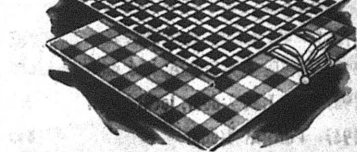

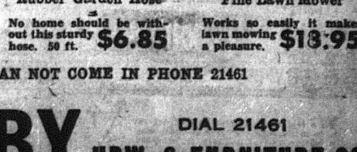

2 sq. (1 oz.) unsweetened chocolate
1/2 c. shortening
1/2 c. sugar
2 eggs
1/2 c. sifted flour
1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 c. broken nuts

FROSTING:

1 Tbsp. butter or margarine
1 sq. (1 oz.) unsweetened chocolate
1/2 Tbsp. warm water
1 c. confectioners' sugar

Melt together chocolate and shortening. Beat in sugar and eggs. Sift together and stir in flour, baking powder and salt. Mix in broken nuts. Spread in well greased 8-inch square pan. Twenty-four late-model cars, from 1946 to 1952, will take the post in the 200-lap, 100-mile race May 18. Time trials will begin at 12:30 and the two dozen fastest entries will start the race, expected to last about two hours, promptly at 2:30 p.m. EDT.

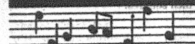

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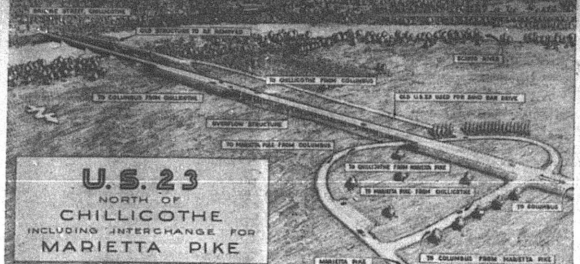
