TEACHER IN JAPAN TELLS OF AUTUMN WEATHER, MATSURI, AND SIGHTSEEING

Ed. Note—This is the second in a series of letters from Walter Bethel, son of The Rev. and Mrs. Howard Bethel, formerly of Plymouth. They now reside in Ashtabula, O., but by their and their daughter's (Miss Joy Bethel) courtesy we are able to give our readers a little picture of life in Japan from the viewpoint of an American teacher in a Japanese University.

Mr. and Mrs. Walter Bethel live in a Japanese style home and are happy in their new life and work in Miyazaki. The "M" in the letters refers to Mary, his wife, and the "K" mentioned is Kazuo, a Japanese student who makes his home with them.

October 31, 1951 Miyazaki Daigaku, Miyazaki shi Miyazaki ken. Dear Family:

This is a beautiful October day. Not a cloud is in the sky and the air is warm. When the sun doesn't show we are apt to be cold. Yesterday and Sunday I built a fire in the little kondo (brazier for charcoal) and we put it on the tiled fireplace. About an hour before we went to take our baths, we put it in our bathroom. It's surprising how much difference it makes.

Today M. has baked cookies and we have had a visit from workmen trying to fix the switches on the stove. I think one of the original switches is still with us, but they took the whole panel away with them. Fortunately we now have a little gas burner so when the lights are off (all day Tuesday and some other times) we have some way of heating water and soap.

School presumably begins tomorrow, but I think it is only registration. I'm not sure and no one has told me. I have talked to the President and he has allowed me to teach one course in English this term. Of course this is in addition to the 15 hours in Music. I am

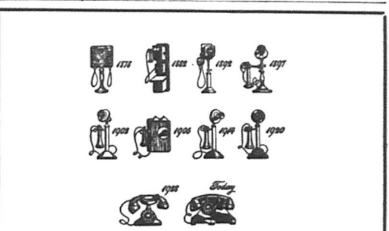
