AGE GROUPS STARTING TO SCHOOL

Fog Causes Bad Accident

With a heavy blanket of fog making driving on all roads a time of danger, Plymouth folks were not exempt from the accident toll that was taken last Thursday and Friday.

Donald "Bud" Deveny, 20, of Trux street, Plymouth, is a patient in the Willard Hospital with serious injuries, the result of a head-on collision Thursday afternoon on Rt. 208, near the Mother of Sorrows church, at North Auburn. The driver of the second car involved was Chester Lofland, of near Plymouth, who was also badly injured, suffering a broken nose, broken jaw, and other head and facial injuries. Ted Bettac, 20, Plymouth, a passenger in the Deveny car, suffered severe cuts and bruises, but is able to be up and around now.

Deveny suffered internal injuries as well as lacerations and bruises and is still on the critical list, on Tuesday. The accident occurred at a semi-collision. The family and attending physicians request, "no visitors, please."

One Million Feet Of Lumber Used In Ike's Platform

WASHINGTON—Nearly one million board feet of mixed softwood lumber is being used to build temporary stands, platforms and enclosures for the inauguration of President-elect Eisenhower.

This is enough lumber to build approximately 125 average-size frame houses. Even the platform on which Mr. Eisenhower will take the oath of office, Jan. 20, will be made of lumber.

A maximum of wood and a minimum of steel and other materials will be featured in the inaugural enclosure in front of the Capitol building, in the presidential reviewing stand in front of the White House, and in the press and spectator stands at these and other points.

The builder of these projects, Skinner and Garrett of Washington, D. C., said wood was chosen as the principal material for economy reasons. Another advantage will be that virtually all the wood involved in this construction can be used again.

The choice of wood indicates that while the incoming Republican Administration is thinking of economy in government, the Inaugural Committee is saving dollars in arranging the inauguration ceremonies.

Wood being used in the inaugural construction includes Ponderosa pine, white fir, hemlock, Southern pine and Douglas fir.

The nation's lumbermen believe this will permit the new president to begin his term in office on a "strong and sound platform."

Food Store Owner Hits Zoning Snag

Arthur Cornell, Shelby businessman, is involved in a court battle concerning the construction of a business building on his property at the south line of the city limits in Shelby.

Cornell and the Glencoe Realty Co., Shelby, have been granted a building permit for a \$35,000 super-food-market on Mansfield Ave. after a petition was signed by 23 property owners giving their approval to the project. Eight of the signers have asked for permission to withdraw their names after three Shelby men, William Query, H. P. Robinson, and James Carey, state that Cornell misrepresented the facts concerning the new building. A zoning ordinance requires 51 per cent of the property owners' signatures are required for the permit to be granted, but if the eight are allowed to withdraw their names, the permit will not be valid.

Three years ago Cornell was refused a permit to build a frozen custard stand in the residential section of the city. Cornell owned the property concerned before the present residential district grew up around it, and at present there is a dry cleaning establishment near the land in question.

When Cornell first decided to open a supermarket on Mansfield avenue, he planned to use the Sno-white building, which he owns, but later decided to put up a second and separate building.

The settlement of the issue awaits the written opinion of Shelby's Law Director, Alan P. Harman.

"Will Lose Truck Battle"—Belson

(Editor's note: The following article is reprinted at the request of Frederick W. Blackford, who is only one of several truckers in this community, who feel that the general public should be informed regarding the proposed Ton-Mile Program. Not only would the passage of this program require more maintenance on the part of the truckers, more employees, but the additional tax would fall back on the individual or corporation for whom the hauling is done, because of the necessary increase in hauling rates.)

WILMINGTON, DEL.—Efforts by selfish interests to retard development of the trucking industry cannot succeed, in the long run, because of demands by American agriculture and industry for the services which trucks alone perform.

Thus spoke Walter W. Belson, director of Public Relations for the American Trucking Associations, Inc., before the Delaware Motor Truck Association's Annual Ladies' Night Banquet here November 25. He declared that the "cold war" against the trucking industry is being turned into a "hot, fighting war" all over the land.

Belson said the trucking industry will lose some battles but contended that "no one can halt this industry."

They may stall us for a time, they may injure us severely here and there, and they may retard our development temporarily," he said. "But they can't stop progress in this bomb-proof facility in time."

Third National Scout Jamboree

"On to the Pacific" is the rallying call that will bring 50,000 Boy Scouts, Explorers and their leaders from all parts of the nation to the Third National Jamboree to be held in a 3,000 acre "tent city" in the Newport Harbor Area in California, next July 17-23, 1953.

The Irvine Ranch, one of the few remaining old land-holdings in Southern California that began in the old land-grant system of the Spanish-Mexican days, is lending the site for what will be the largest boys' encampment in the world.

To make certain that every eligible Scout and Explorer is given an opportunity to participate, the Johnny Appleseed Area Council, Boy Scouts of America, is selecting a special Jamboree Committee. The Local Council administers the Boy Scout Program in Richland and Ashland counties plus Gallon and Crestline of Crawford county.

Jamboree participation is open to all registered Scouts and Explorers who are at least 12 years old and have completed Explorer, Apprentice, or higher by January 1st, 1953. Each must have adequate camping experience to enable him to care for himself in the open and must have a cooperative attitude toward his fellow Scouts and leaders.

Only 35 Scouts and three leaders will be permitted to participate in the "once in a life time" experience from the Johnny Appleseed Area Council. Eight Scouts and Explorers have already made reservations for participation in the Johnny Appleseed Troop going to the Jamboree.

in the world because every truck that rides the roads is out there in direct response to the demands of American agriculture and industry for the service which trucks alone perform," he added. "That's why we're there, and while that lesson has not yet been thoroughly learned by the public, it is the one best guarantee I know that this industry will grow and expand."

"Agriculture and industry in this country need trucks and truck service. They will not be long prevented by anyone from allowing us to furnish it."

Belson said the trucking industry has grown in a few decades "to a magnificent system of transport upon which our whole way of life is based." He said leaders in the field of mass production have ascribed the success of assembly line production to the flexible service of the motor truck.

Agriculture, he added, has moved steadily toward specialized production and away from general farming as it found itself able to reach markets once denied it. In the retail field, he said, valuable store space no longer need be used for inventory, since retailers now can get a supplier and have the goods on sale the next morning.

He told the motor carrier executives they are entitled to feel a deep pride "in the creation out of nothingness, of a system of transport which is so unbelievably important to this land in peace, and in a bomb-proof facility in time of war."

What U. S. Wants From Your Income

Operation of the Federal government during the fiscal year 1953-54, will cost the residents of Richland county an estimated \$57,639,000, if the Truman Budget of \$78,600,000 submitted to Congress last year, is enacted, according to the Ohio Chamber of Commerce. Huron County's estimate is \$21,887,000.

Estimated cost for the State-at-large for the Truman spending program would be \$4,951,800,000. Estimate of Ohio's share is \$1,450,000,000, or 29.5 per cent of the total Federal tax burden.

For Richland County, the total is 14 times the amount of taxes collected by city and county operations for a year. For Huron County, it is 13 times the amount collected by city and county operations for the year.

The proposed budget represents \$631 for every person in Richland County, in taxes. For Huron County, each person would be tagged with \$556. For the estimate for your own family, multiply the respective sum named above by the number of persons in the family.

ACTION PLANNED

The Board of Directors of the Ohio Delegation, will request of Congress as its first order of business, a reduction of unessential spending and a balanced budget in addition to a substantial lowering of individual and corporate income taxes and excise taxes.

The Ohio viewpoint, arrived at with reluctance, is that the only effective way to check further mounting expense is new and heavier taxes, is first to cut taxes; then to limit Federal expenditures to the amount of reduced revenue.

Ohio Pastors Will Meet In Columbus Monday, Jan. 26

COLUMBUS, O.—The Ohio Pastors' convention, annual mid-winter interdenominational gathering in Columbus, begins its second third of a century January 26.

Again this year—the 34th Convention—plans are being laid to

accommodate about 2,000 pastors, about one-half the state's Protestant clergymen, it was announced today by the Rev. W. Henry Shilling, executive secretary of the sponsoring Ohio Council of Churches.

Heading the line-up of distinguished churchmen who will address the convention is Dr. Lister Paine, Dean of the Yale University Divinity School, and Dr. C. Oscar Johnson of St. Louis, former president of the Northern Baptist Convention.

Dr. Pope will make four addresses—one each day of the convention—and Dr. Johnson will address the traditional Fellowship Supper, a climactic feature of the convention scheduled for the evening of Tuesday, January 27, at the huge, new Ohio Student Union on the Ohio State University campus.

The Rev. Hoke Dickinson, pastor of Franklin Circle Christian Church of Cleveland is chairman of the 1953 convention.

Another traditional outstanding feature of the convention is the finals of the annual state-wide Peace of Deed Declaration contest. Six young people, winners of the District Contests will be the competitors.

Farmers Urged To Check Fertilizer

Richland county farmers were advised to take immediate action if they want to be sure of having on the fertilizer they will need for 1953 planting operations.

"Critical losses in fertilizer production are threatened due to the slow movement of plant food from factories to farms this far this year," reports the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee.

"Overcrowded storage facilities are causing bottlenecks at factories."

"Already the output of essential materials used in fertilizer manufacture has been cut back. Reductions are reported in superphosphate schedules and in the production of sulfuric acid, a commodity whose price has risen sharply. Potash storages are filling up back to the chimneys."

"Losses in fertilizer production cannot be recovered later, for during the spring rush season, plants are running 24 hours a day."

"Farmers cannot afford to gamble again with the weather, as they did last year. Then a serious shortage of plant food was averted by a rainy spring season which delayed corn planting several weeks. That enabled factories to catch up on production."

"By taking delivery now farmers will have the choice of the kind and amounts of fertilizer they want in prime condition. Shortages during the rush period may cause some farmers to get no plant food at all, or to take whatever is available."

"OHIO" IS SUBJECT FOR 20TH CENTURY CLUB MEMBERS

Ohio Fuel Gas Co Plans 25 Million Expansion

The Ohio Fuel Gas Company will move into the seventh straight year of expansion in 1953 with plans for a \$25 million construction program. Neil McCaron, Ohio Fuel's local manager, said here today.

Mr. McCaron said the size of the 1953 expansion was announced by Allan W. Lundstrom, Ohio Fuel president, in a New Year's message to the gas company's 3,500 employees in the state.

In the message, Mr. Lundstrom said also that Ohio Fuel and its parent organization, the Ohio Gas System, will continue efforts to contract for more gas from the southwest transmission companies. Summarizing the 1952 phase of an expansion program begun by Ohio Fuel in 1946, the message said that during the past year the company invested \$21 million in new pipelines and other facilities. That brought the six-year expenditures for construction to more than \$100 million.

During 1953, Mr. Lundstrom added, the company will move into the seventh straight year of its expansion program. Expenditures approaching \$25 million are contemplated for more pipelines and other facilities to deliver more gas.

Since 1946, the company has increased its annual gas deliveries by 93 per cent, extended gas service to 94,000 new customers and provided gas for space heating to more

than six times as many homes as had gas heat previously. Ohio Fuel now serves 331,000—more than 60 per cent of its customers—with gas for space heating.

"Even with the great increase in the volumes of gas we deliver," the president added, "the demand has not been completely satisfied. In Ohio, as in many other parts of the nation, there is still need for additional gas."

"For protection of our present customers, the restrictions on new heating users must remain."

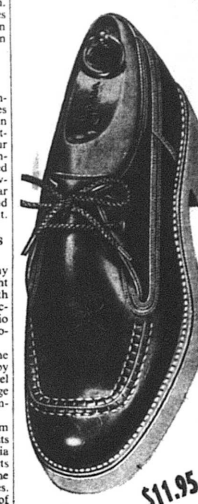
Regarding rates in the 316 communities the company serves in the state, the president said: "Our communities have shown their understanding of the way costs have soared, and of the necessity of revisions in rates. They have indicated their approval of the continual improvement and expansion of our system to deliver more gas to their homes and their jobs."

He termed 1952 "one of the most significant years in the history of Ohio Fuel." He referred to the accomplishments of the year and told employees: "Your performance over the years has been important in earning us the respect of the people we serve."

The bookkeeping year is divided into four periods: spring, harvest, fall and winter.

Two Area Men Named In Suit

According to last Sunday's edition of the Mansfield News-Journal, Levi Malone of Shelby and Arthur Weaver, Shiloh, R. D. 1, tenant on the Malone farm, north of here, were named defendants in a \$1,877 damage suit filed in the municipal court in Mansfield last Saturday by Duane F. Arnold of Greenwich, R. D. 1.

Arnold says in his petition that he is a tenant on a farm owned by Roscoe Reynolds next to a farm owned by Malone and occupied by Weaver. He alleges that under his agreement with Reynolds, Arnold was to plant beans and corn for which he was to get half the corn and three-fourths of the beans.

A fence separates the two neighbors which the petition says, the two neighbors had agreed to maintain in good condition. Arnold contends Malone and Weaver failed to keep half of the fence in repair and as a result, allowed ten head of cattle to stray onto the farm and destroy six acres of beans valued at \$338 and two acres of corn valued at \$250, of which his share was \$377.

Arnold said the defendants, after receiving due notice of the condition "did willfully and maliciously allow the cattle to stray" onto his land. He asks \$1,500 for punitive and compensatory damages plus \$377 for the corn and beans the cattle allegedly ate.
