Let's Preserve Old School Bell

Did you ever wonder what became of the school bell that hung in the belfry at the old elementary school building? For years it called the children to classes and then when the building was torn down to make room for the present modern school, the bell was forgotten.

Some of the older graduates are now interested in having the bell mounted on the school grounds as a memorial and a campaign for funds will soon be announced. The past week after perusing the minutes of the school board, to determine whether the bell had been disposed of and finding no record of such a transaction, a hunt was on for the bell. It was found safe and sound in the high school basement in the course of which the project goes through.

The old elementary school was dedicated on Oct. 1, 1875 and it was known as the Union School Building. The first graduating class was in 1872 and then no more classes were graduated until 1878 and continued with the exception of the class of 1883, when no class was reported.

A program of that first Alumni Association was held on June 7, 1889 at 9:30 at the Opera House, (Over the People's National Bank) and later known as the Hall, when the dedication of one, all members of these first classes are deceased as far as we can ascertain. The exception is Miss Harriet Porter, class of 1885.

The amount of funds necessary to mount the old bell will not be exorbitant, and a group of interested persons are now in the process of finding out estimates and designs. Further releases will be made as the work progresses.

LOCAL MAN PRAISED AT SHELBY DEPOT
Four physically handicapped men at the Wilkins Air Depot at Shelby, one of whom is from Plymouth, are credited with saving the government owned project \$52,800 with their ideas of improving and speeding operations.Of the approximately 3,200 employees at the depot, 233 or about seven percent are handicapped and have unusually good records.

Recognition was given these men at the county convention in observance of National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week.

The four men are: Franklin McCook, Plymouth, senior supply inspector, a polo victim; John Eikleberry of Bucyrus, who has won safe-driver awards and commendation for service during the war; Clyde Fair, mailing machine operator of Shelby who has a back injury; and a safety award and Ray Pittenger of Shelby, an employee of the depot since 1946 and chief of stock records. Despite physical handicap and wrist injury Pittenger has received a sizable increase in his rating and pay increase.

Depot officials say the handicapped employees have maintained good records of attendance and work and have a total of 42,854 unused accumulated hours of sick leave.

C. W. Handley, manager of the Ohio State Employment Service, said he believes handicapped persons who find work which they like, will be more conscientious about their work than the physically normal workers.

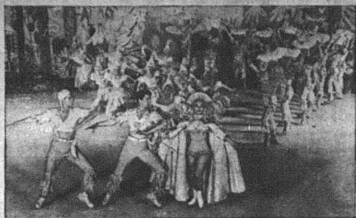

Farmers Can Now Determine If Weevil Are Present In Wheat

John Wolfe, county agricultural agent announced today that farmers can now determine if weevil are present in wheat without waiting for weevil to appear in large numbers or for the grain to show signs of heating.

T. H. Parks, extension entomologist has developed a method where grain that carry hidden weevil larvae may be detected by the "float" method. Infested wheat kernels will float in a 2 percent solution of ferric nitrate. Sound kernels will sink. If a pound of wheat included one infested kernel, farmers can consider the grain weevily.

Farmers can buy the solution from druggists or may prepare it by dissolving 10 grams of ferric nitrate crystals in a pint of distilled or rain water. The solution may be used several times. Grain treatment with carbon bisulfide or one of the grain fumigants may be used if weevil are detected.

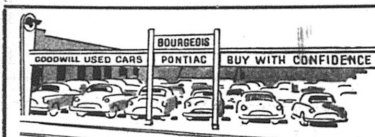

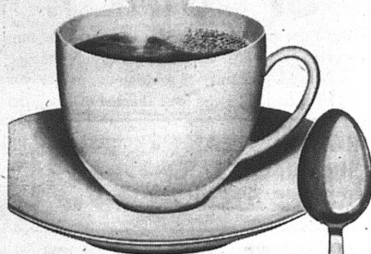
