SHILOH'S WATER SUPPLY STILL ADEQUATE; HURON RIVER IS DRY

With many of our neighboring towns and cities curtailing the use of water by their citizens; with many creeks and wells dry, Shiloh should consider itself fortunate that not once has there been any water shortage here. Able foresight by our village officials—mayors, Board of Public Affairs and councilmen both past and present—has been responsible for this, and we think they should be commended for preparing beforehand adequate water resources to meet any unprecedented demands.

For the situation today is unprecedented in this area. Sunday afternoon we accompanied Ralph Henry to the Huron river north of here and found its bed completely dry. 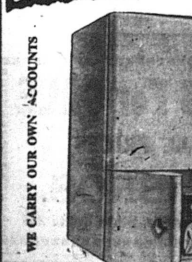
