

Announce Clothing Drive In Plymouth For Earth's Needy

Rev. Fr. Wm. Conces, pastor of St. Joseph's Church, Plymouth, announces that his church will participate in the fourth annual Thanksgiving Clothing Collection for the Earth's Needy. The drive will be Thanksgiving week, Nov. 22 to 29.

Mgr. Edward Swanson, the Catholic executive director of War Relief Services, and an eye-witness to the suffering of refugees from recent wars says: "I can testify that the need for clothing is as great as it was in the past, and it is particularly for men's clothing, for blankets and bedding and for infants' and children's garments." "Everywhere I went, I saw concrete evidence that the clothing you helped collect last year was being put to good use. In Europe, most of the clothing is used as 'loose' clothing. "To cite the areas where the collected clothing will be received, war-torn areas would be to practically every area of need in the world."

The clothing collected is sent to war-torn countries and is distributed to all, regardless of church affiliation.

Farmers in this area who are interested in knowing their farms better, for as a time to be concerned, are invited to attend the Forestry Field Day on Saturday, November 21st at the Richland Rural Life Center Farm on Crall Road, 5 miles north-east of Mansfield. T-B SEALS GO INTO MAILS

TB costs the American people every year more than \$350 million most of it in tax dollars. Arlo Swinehart, chairman of the 1953 Christmas Seal Sale, said today. He announced that the annual Seal Sale to raise funds to support the TB prevention and control work of the Huron Co. TB and Health Association, opened today.

The cost of hospital and other medical and nursing care for TB patients, case finding, health education, rehabilitation, relief to patients, poisoning to veterans, and medical research is estimated at more than \$350 million, Mr. Swinehart pointed out. To this must be added more money for needed hospital construction, depreciation of old buildings and the training of professional personnel.

"We cannot even estimate how much the loss of patients' productive capacity and their possible earning power drains from the national pocketbook," he said.

Plan the sale of the community effort to pay the price for a disease which can be prevented and can be cured," Mr. Swinehart asked. "Christmas Seals spent now for prevention of TB are an investment in human life, the most precious of our natural resources. They also mean tax dollars saved."

He explained that funds contributed by Huron County residents through their purchase of Christmas Seals would be used for the treatment of TB patients or for relief to their families. "The total of Christmas Seal contributions to the United States is \$10 million, not enough to pay for two weeks of treatment of all known TB patients. We believe that the total economic cost of spending Christmas Seal money on prevention of the disease."

"Every one of the deaths from TB in this community and every case now on the rolls of the health department represents a human tragedy to a wide circle of people as well as serious financial loss to the community as a whole. The TB association hopes, with the proceeds of the 1953 sale, to expand its efforts to fight the spread of this disease," Mr. Swinehart said.

Last year, Huron County citizens contributed \$6985 to support the association's work. The chairman said that at least that amount will be needed to carry on programs planned for 1954.

Projects scheduled for 1954 include hiring of a part-time Health Educator in Huron County, a county wide mass X-ray survey, and the purchase of a truck, and paying for large X-ray films.

Mr. Swinehart announced that 8881 Christmas Seal letters have been mailed to residents of Huron County. The work of stuffing envelopes was done by members of Exemplar Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi, women's national sorority. Anyone who has not received seals, but desires to receive them, should write his request to the Huron County TB and Health Association, P. O. D. 148, Norwalk.

Firemen Answer Two Alarm Calls

Plymouth firemen answered the fire siren call last Thursday between five and six p. m., when the fire of late of the Roscoe Hutchinson farms was discovered burning. Firemen kept the fire from spreading, but were not able to save the building.

The barn is located across the B. & O. tracks south west of Greenlawn cemetery. At one time there was a road leading to the small farm, from the south of the school, but which has since been closed.

The Sharon township tank truck also answered the call, and brought a tank of water for the local firemen. Firefighters had to drive from Route 98, through the Hutchinson farm just south of the cemetery, down a lane across the railroad tracks, and over the fields to the location of the burning building.

There is no tenant living on the place.

Plymouth firemen were called out again Monday evening between six and seven to the Earl Heiber farm three and a half mile south of town on the Dinsinger road. There, a large stack of baled straw was reported burning by Deryl Cobb.

The stores are decorating, or should I say have been decorated for Christmas for a couple of weeks now. It seems rather early but in looking at the calendar it is only about 8 weeks away.

The children are growing and all like school very much. Mary Ann had all "A's" on her grade card last June when she finished the 3rd grade. Here grade cards aren't given out except every ten weeks so they haven't received any this term yet. Both Monnie Lynne and Tommie ride the bus five miles to school the seventh. In addition to the paper routes which he keeps him busy.

We like the life in the San Fernando Valley, it is out from the smog and we get the clean, fresh air, usually scented with orange blossoms.

As time is creeping up on me, I will close, and will be looking forward to the Plymouth paper.

I saw where you visited at Atlanta this summer. We spent our vacation last August at Vogel State Park, 100 miles north of Atlanta and it was most enjoyable. The children loved the horse riding so much.

Carl, as you know, is still in Seoul. Outside his regular chaplain duties has been helping get supplies for a Methodist Orphanage of 200 small children ranging from 3-9 years. Has provided me an opportunity to send some of the children's outgrown clothing and shoes to them as they are really desperate.

I am still working at Camp Gordon is spite of a big civilian personnel reduction here at the camp. We lost 2 girls in our office though and it really has shown up in the huge backlog of work, but guess we will survive.

I do enjoy my paper immensely and look forward to its receipt each week.

**"BEHIND THE SCENES IN AMERICAN BUSINESS"**  
NEW YORK, NOV. 16 — Happenings in the far-off kingdom of Saudi Arabia may postpone the showdown on petroleum imports which threatens to pit the large worldwide American refining companies against the smaller domestic producers whose only wells are in this country.

King Ibn Saud, who died a week ago, left this once-turbulent realm to Emir Saud, one of his 40 sons, with the Emir Faisal, another son, as crown prince. This leaves 38 sons, any one of a dozen of whom might become the center for a revolution. Because the Western world is looking on it is unlikely there will be a massacre such as once served to remove such possible foci of unrest.

Returning employees of Arabian-American Oil, whose wells provide Ibn Saud's fabulous income, have reported over the last year that no more than five factions in the kingdom have told the oil company they were taking over when king died. Each warned the oil men against lining up with one of the rival factions.

If trouble does break out, it will provide a good opportunity to close down the Arabian wells, stop pouring more crude into a sated market, and take the heat off President Eisenhower regarding controls on imports.

**PRECEDENT - BREAKER** — Sometimes flouting tradition brings rewards in a merchandising way as spectacular as in sports, styles or staging.

When Schenley Distributors, Inc. began weighing the idea of packaging its best seller, Schenley Reserve, in a decanter, two objections sprang to everyone's mind. First, decanters cost so much more — for glass, labels, stopper and cartons — that no one ever had been able to "afford" them for use in the popular-price field. Second, decanters are a big Christmas seller, but no one ever heard of their being bought in September, October or November.

The bolder spirits at Schenley had their way, however, and the decanter package, at no advance in price, went on sale in September. Results? Excellent. While no distiller had ever sold more than 125,000 cases of a whiskey in a decanter in any season, Schenley Reserve passed the 125,000 mark in a month, and marched on toward the biggest fall season in the brand's history.

**THINGS TO COME** — A little late for the current season, a junior football helmet of acetate plastic, with a lining of leather-covered foam rubber, can be had in your "Little League's" head size. A photo-flash battery to fit the Continental flash-guns becoming popular in this country is being imported. A new slide projector claims to be well cooled that slides can be left in projecting position over-

nights. Plywood with one layer of wire reinforcing, strong but still capable of being cut with a saw, is being tested on the West Coast.

**TIMELY REMINDER** — With the decline in government sponsored shipping, which required that 50 per cent of foreign-aid cargoes be carried in American ships, a Senator sounds a timely warning: "The beneficiaries of a strong national maritime policy are not solely the ship owners and operators... but all the people of all the states, for every single region in this country contributes to and shares in the benefits which flow from the construction, the maintenance, and the operation of our merchant fleet."

The speaker was Senator Leverett Saltonstall of Massachusetts, addressing the Robert L. Hague Merchant Marine Industries Post of the American Legion in New York City.

**OFF, BUT STILL GOOD** — Factory layoffs have been rising since mid-year from the low rate of late 1952 and early 1953, the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the Department of Commerce reports. Manufacturing firms let out workers during September at a rate of 15 per thousand employed, compared with 13 per thousand in August. Hiring rate was 40 per thousand employed in September; 43 in August.

Added layoffs were more marked in the durable goods industries group, said the Bureau. Automobile makers, machinery plants, and primary metal refiners were particularly mentioned.

Even so, the rate of separations remains remarkably low by any standard except that of the post-war boom. Time was when September saw the satellite auto plants, which together employ as many persons as the primary factories, almost wholly shut down as the last of old models were beginning to run off the assembly lines.

**BITS O' BUSINESS** — Topcoat makers can just about write off this fall, unless October's balmy weather plays a return date. The East went from no coats to overcoats in one icy blast. Squibb, the drug company, entertained food editors at a non-caloric luncheon to launch Sweeta a saccharine compound in a squeeze bottle.

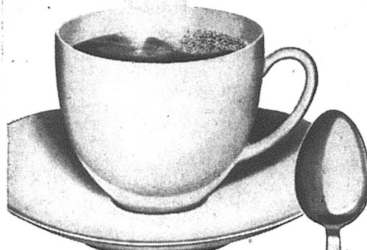

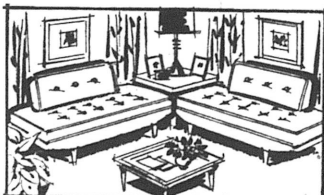

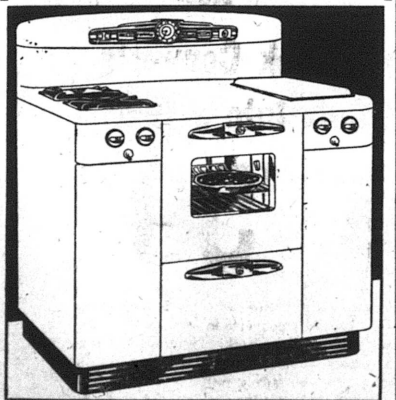

## 75 Farmers Attend Beef Tour

The first Huron County Beef Feeders tour was very successful, John Wells, County Agent, reported. Approximately 75 farmers were present and had an opportunity to see how best feeders are buying, feeding and selling cattle.

Dan and Harold Heiler, each had lots of cattle on feed showing how best feeders are buying, feeding and selling cattle. Heiler stated that cattle fed on range keep in better health than animals kept in barns where drafts commonly cause colds and pneumonia. Another group of Heiler's cattle, viewed in Centerville where they are being fed in dry lot.

James Warner, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist, pointed out advantages of the beef cattle feeding methods and ration farmers are using. Tommy Thompson, head cattle buyer for Swift and Company, Cleveland, Ohio, feders an idea of the grade on each lot of cattle and what grade to expect when the cattle are marketed if good feeding practices are followed.

Heavier cattle were discussed at the J. P. Albert farm. Bob Gannett, who manages the farm, showed how they feed heavy cattle for a short period type of program. Here the aim is to finish heavy cattle and depend on market advances for the principal profit.

Johnny Sengstock, on the Townsend Farms, had the largest herd viewed by the group. A large paved feed lot and barn with a space proved interesting to the group. Feeding practices were similar to others feeding heavier cattle. The majority seemed to feed alfalfa, the corn and cob-meat the cattle would clear up and one to one and one-half pounds protein supplement was used. Hay was not limited in order to get more grain consumer. Where cattle were being wintered to go on pasture next summer hay and silage were the principal feeds.

The Wilbert Skinn feed lot was considered unusual in feeding arrangements and general facilities that make for more efficient use of labor. Mr. Skinn was also the only stop where a Hereford breeding herd will be the main source of winter feeder cattle.

Women of the Steuben Church of the Master served a fine lunch and the group took advantage of the noon hour to discuss the price situation. Burr Knaus, Association chairman, presented the report now under consideration by Ohio feeders on a support and parity price program.

Niles Wheeler won the \$2.00 furnished by Bob Bachrach and Fred Heiler, for possessing the exact weight of one lot of cattle.

**Farm Bureau To Support Program**

The Huron County Farm Bureau went on record in support of a flexible (75% to 90% of parity) on the basic commodities price support program for agriculture at the annual meeting of members held at the K. of C. Hall in Norwalk last week.

The resolutions submitted and adopted at the annual meeting on farm program were based on an extensive survey of farmer thinking in the county and those on local and state issues were submitted by the members.

On the local and state level the adopted resolutions state that the Huron County Farm Bureau believes that the County Home and Children's Home should be retained by Huron County; all Huron County cross roads should be properly marked; and the organization should work to secure better telephone service for rural areas.

Other resolutions adopted by the Farm Bureau members at this meeting on the farm program are: 1.—We do not favor government crop insurance. 2.—The government should maintain a year supply of storable agriculture commodities. 3.—Farm programs should be developed to meet the needs of the efficient farm family type farm. 4.—Agriculture conservation payments should be for permanent practices only. 5.—The Soil Conservation Service is extremely valuable to agriculture. 6.—We favor increased foreign trade by gradually lessening trade restrictions between nations. 7.—We favor increased marketing research.

These resolutions will be submitted to the Ohio Farm Bureau Federation for consideration by the delegate body at the annual meeting of the Federation on November 30, December 1 and 2. Plans call for nine district managers in the tri-state region of Indiana, Kentucky and Ohio, operating under a Regional Manager in Cincinnati. This will eliminate the present 100 postmasters who local problems at a local level," McGregor said. "The result will be better service, greater economy and quicker solutions to problems."

McGregor pointed out, that in decentralizing its operations, the

Post Office Department will be following the lead of most other successful large business organizations in the country, as well as the recommendation of the Hoover Commission. He added that, under this plan, field personnel will be delegated authority equal to their responsibility.

**More Wardens To Check Hunters**

**COLUMBUS, OHIO** — Hunters!!!! Your chances of being checked at the end of the game protector this coming hunting season will be increased considerably, according to Lester Bailey, Chief of the Law Enforcement Section of the Ohio Division of Wildlife. Bailey said that an all out effort will be put forth this year to protect the farmers and private landowners from the illegal and so-called "hoodlum" hunter. "We realize, Bailey said, "that only an extremely small percentage of hunters violate the law or hunt without permission. But this is the fellow we must stop if Ohio hunters are to continue enjoying free public hunting in the state." A total of 220 commissioned law enforcement men with the Division of Wildlife will be in the field, Bailey said, which is the highest number in the history of hunting seasons in Ohio. In addition to this city and suburban law enforcement officers, and sheriffs will be working hand in hand with the Division this year in the extra effort to curtail trespass and other violations. "We are urging hunters to stay away from the suburban and urban fringe areas," Bailey said, "and to get into the country for their hunting. Hunting in the fringe or heavily populated areas is one of the biggest headaches the Division and city law enforcement officers have," he added. "It is extremely dangerous both to the populace and to property. Also due to the small property subdivisions in these areas, hunters are very susceptible to violating the trespass laws because it is extremely difficult to determine property lines." In 1953, the highly populated northeastern section of the state, and particularly in or near the larger urban areas of Cuyahoga, Summit, Medina, Mahoning and Licking counties, the effort will be increased three-fold, Bailey said.
