Shirley Bradford Crowned Queen At Homecoming Thurs.

The 1953 homecoming of Plymouth High School will no doubt go down in the annals of school history as the best homecoming ever held in Plymouth. The details were worked out and planned with the greatest of care by Mr. and Mrs. Fred Kreutzfeld, and Mr. Robert Dubbert. Even the weather was ideal, and the crowd on hand to witness both the football game and the dance that followed were delighted with the results.

The Queen's attendants dressed in red arrived on the football field in Larry Gooding's Chrysler convertible while the queen attired in a beige gown came in Ron Norris' red Chevrolet.

Then the band which has gained such a wonderful reputation this year under the guidance of Mr. Dubbert came out on the field. This year Plymouth was outstanding among marching bands. Especially is this true when one considers that most schools our size do not try to field a marching band and that even the smallest pupils are utilized, which will form a nucleus for years to come for future bands.

The Game
Plymouth's opponents for the Thursday night game was Wakarusa and was witnessed by more than 600 fans.

In the first period with minutes gone a Carey to Palmer pass was good for a T.D. from 5 yards out. After a Wakarusa fumble, Plymouth scored on a series of plays with a Root to Dean pass good for 55 yards, making the score at the end of the first quarter, 7-6, Plymouth.

In the second period Plymouth scored on a 15 yard run to make the score 14-6 at the half, with Utis making the extra points.

Plymouth Breaks Scoreless
In the third stanza with minutes gone, Carey went down from 8 yards out. Plymouth couldn't get going and so didn't score.

Plymouth Breaks Loose
To Score 14 Points
In the fourth period Plymouth got going. T.D. from 10 yards, scored by Dean. One was on a 15 yard sprint around end and the other on a 30 yard run with Utis making the extra points. Final score, 28-13.

This was Plymouth's first victory since 1950 when they overcame a Butler and a Union City team to a wonderful game and homecoming.

The Crowning
At the half time period, Miss Bradford was crowned by the honorary Captain, Royal Eckstein. Royal was unfortunately absent from the line-up with a broken ankle and suffered in a previous game.

The Band put on their fanfare before the queen at this time paying homage to her and her court consisting of Harriet Ray, secretary, Pearl Lucas, junior; Carol Evans, sophomore and Marsha McGregor, freshman.

The Dance
For the dance, the Queen and her court changed to strapless formal and presented a beautiful picture. Otis Root, as master of ceremonies, opened the evening which were held in the auditorium and with his announcement of the Queen's arrival, the curtains opened and applause echoed throughout the hall.

The first dance was in honor of the Queen. Since Mr. Eckstein was unable to attend, the duties of master of ceremonies fell to the shoulders of Shirley's escort for the dance. The attendants escorted were the following members of the football team: Larry Root, senior; John Fox, Junior; Bud Berberich, sophomore and Jim Hunt, freshman.

The balance of the evening was devoted to dancing. To many Gooding's All Star Band which proved exceptionally good.

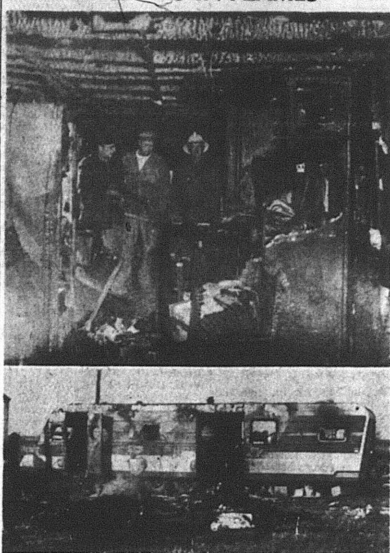
ENROLLS IN SCHOOLING

WEST ELECTED MAYOR IN HEAVY "OFF-YEAR" ELECTION TUESDAY

In one of the heaviest votes cast in an off-year election, Glenn West and his write-in ticket for five councilmen were elected at Tuesday's election to serve Plymouth for the next two years. The political pot did little boiling here even up to the day before election, but the number of votes cast indicate that local citizens became keenly interested in village candidates.

With West being chosen as mayor, five write-in candidates for council also received good support. Omar Burkett, the only candidate who filed before the deadline, and whose name appeared on the ballot, received the highest number of votes, while his "write-in" running mate, garnered a goodly share of ballots.

Carl Ellis, candidate for Clerk, polled 205 votes, while James Rhine, out for treasurer, came in with 204 votes.

On the Board of Public Affairs, Don Levering and Francis Burrer, were elected on the official ballot, while George Cheesman, a write-in, was chosen with 153 votes.

With three to be elected, the race for the Board of Education had four candidates, which were deemed doubtful through the early part of the day. Harold Chasman polled 314 votes, with Jud Morrison coming in with 270. David Cook polled 203 votes, and Guy Cunningham tallied 164 votes.

Leg Gets Approval
The one mill levy for operating expenses for the village (Greenland cemetery) got by with a slim margin. 60 per cent of the votes cast was needed for passage, and a total of 215 approved the levy, while 94 opposed. A total of 185 votes was needed to pass the levy.

In Plymouth township Floyd Steele and Virgil Baird, who had no opposition as trustees, were returned to office. In Plymouth, Steele got 166 votes, while Baird received 123.

In New Haven township there has been much interest in the trustee race there. Plymouth voted as follows: Wm. Link, 96; Henry Chapman, 37, and Walter Noble, 4. Link was the only candidate officially listed, while Chapman and Noble were write-ins. Two were to be elected for office, as Chas. Willoughby of Willard, was a carryover.

Official returns Wednesday morning gave Link 300 votes, while Chapman received 246. Chapman polled 168. Noble came out in his campaign as being opposed to the purchase of a fire truck by the New Haven trustees, but favored a contract with Plymouth and Willard instead.

In one of the biggest surprises of all elections was the results of Tuesday's voting when the village of Greenwood went "wet." There has been a strong campaign in Greenwood, both for and against the sale of beer, wine and whisky, and the ballots presented votes Tuesday added a world of confusion, but when the votes were totaled the wets won in by about two and one-half votes to one.
