

MISSIONARIES AT SHELBY WILL HAVE CENTENARY MASS

Solemn Mass was offered Tuesday in the Chapel of Sacred Heart Seminary, south of Plymouth, on the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart observed not only the opening of the Marian Year but also the opening of their own century.

The society was founded in Issoudun, southern France, by Father Julius Chevalier, whose intention was to rekindle the faith in rural France.

He sought to do this by arousing fervent devotion to the Sacred Heart, and this at a time when devotion of this sort was considered to be for convents and monasteries of the strictest observance.

When the society was still young and small, in 1881, and engaged in teaching youth and conducting missions and retreats, the Pope asked the founder to expand the society's activities to the foreign missions.

At the time interest in the foreign missions was strong throughout the greater part of Europe, an interest that was to become stronger.

Communities of the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart rose in Holland, Belgium, Austria, Germany, Italy, Spain, Ireland and Australia. He set up houses in Canada, the United States, Brazil and Peru.

Said Father Joseph W. Casper, MSC, superior at Shelby: "The protection of the Sacred Heart, and the Blessed Virgin, under the title of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart, was clearly to be seen, especially when we consider that from a mere handful of men in France came the missionaries who have now grown to 2,610, scattered all over the globe."

In 1910 two priests came to the U. S. from Germany, established a house in Reading, Pa., and Wis. After a year the house was moved to nearby Sparta, Wis.

A year later several more priests some Americans included, began a house in Reading, Pa., taking a parish at Haycock, Pa.

Early in 1927 four priests started the minor seminary in full swing at Geneva, Ill. Later it became the regular provinciate. A new building was dedicated in 1942. It now has 70 students in a five-year course.

Father John Dicks, MSC, who served in the missions 15 years, scouted for a place where those turned to the minor seminary could go for philosophy after a year of novitiate. He bought a farm four miles from Shelby. A building was erected in 1935.

Father Joseph Janssen became first superior of the new Sacred Heart Seminary, with Fathers Joseph Richter, Joseph Kistner and John Meier as first professors.

After two years an addition was made to house theology students. After a few years the seminary had eight professors, 25 students, six lay brothers and six novices.

In 1943 a neighboring farm was bought, increasing the original 120-acre site.

In 1939 the first American priests to be ordained in the States

received their orders from Archbishop Karl J. Alter of Cincinnati, then Bishop of Toledo. Last year two priests from the American province were ordained in Toledo. One was Father William Gies, MSC, whose relatives live in Norwalk.

Another addition was made in 1949, as there was need for the novices. This house was in shape for the first group of five priests, a Brother and eight novices in 1951. It is the former Thomas Estate, Logan Rd., Youngstown, Ohio.

Shelby has 12 new philosophers, serving the seminary 42 students, eight priests, six Brothers and four Sisters.

The Missionaries of the Sacred Heart century observance will be marked through the year, especially in June, month of the Sacred Heart.

St. Joseph's Mission in Plymouth was in charge of the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart for ten years from 1941 to 1951.
