F-R-H CO. PAYS OUT 13TH ANNUAL BONUS

For the thirteenth consecutive year the Fate-Roost-Heath Company has paid a 5 per cent bonus to its 350 employees. The \$64,000 distributed among the workers last Friday brought the grand total up to over a half million dollars, and to be exact the distribution of the \$64,000 last week makes an actual total of \$564,000.

The bonus was begun in 1940, and at that time the stockholders declared a 5 per cent bonus on all wages paid to employees in the factory and office. The plan has worked very satisfactorily, both to employee and management.

Besides the annual bonus the local manufacturing plant participates in a life and accident insurance group affording each employee extra protection. Other fringe benefits include a vacation schedule giving each employee a week's vacation with one year's employment; and if employed three consecutive years, two weeks vacation is granted. All employees who have served 15 years or more receive three weeks' vacation with pay. Besides the vacation schedule, all employees receive pay for six holidays.

Labor relations at the Fate-Roost-Heath company have been very favorable over the past years, as the employees are represented by the Independent Order of Mechanics. The union officials and management have been able so far to avoid any wage strikes, and no ratings, working conditions and other subjects without any threats of shutdowns or strikes, a record which the community can be justly proud.

Officials at F-R-H state that the year just closing has been the best year and that the company looks to a good start in 1954, as there is at present a backlog of orders on hand.

The firm manufactures industrial locomotives, clay working machines, lawnmower shavers, and other sharpening equipment. A new saw chain will be placed on the market some time in 1954, adding another popular line of products to its already established items.

The remains of Ford Davis, who died suddenly from a heart attack in North Miami, Fla., arrived in Willard at 1:45 A. M. Thursday, (today) and were brought to McQuate's funeral home. News of the death of Mr. Davis was received here shortly after the arrival of the remains. Mr. Davis was 44 years old and was employed as a clerk in the B. & O. office in Willard, and was widely known in many cities.

As a resident of Plymouth he was interested in civic affairs and devoted much of his time to the Community Club, of which he served as president a few years ago, and gave much of his time to the Boy Scout work as well as other organizations.

Born in Plymouth on Nov. 1, 1899, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Davis, Ford was in his boyhood here. At the age of 17 he became employed at the local Baltimore & Ohio station, and later transferred to the same place in charge. Through his interest in railroading Mr. Davis progressed in his work, and at one time he was division passenger agent for the B. & O. in Cleveland.

His work took him into Buffalo, N. Y., and Akron, but as the years passed he had a desire to come back to Plymouth, and his last transfer was to Willard.

During the war Mr. Davis put in extra days and hours, and with the number of years behind him the railroad work looked forward to the time he could "take it easy." Two years ago he began making plans for a leave of absence, and was only a few days from his home when he was called to duty.

Mr. Davis, who had been teaching in the local schools for several years, gave up her position so that the two of them could go to Florida and spend at least a year. To this end they made their plans, and left Plymouth on Sept. 15, locating in North Miami, Fla., where they purchased four ranch-type apartments and were just getting settled nicely when death came to Mr. Ford.

The deepest sympathy is extended to the bereaved members of the family which include his wife Muriel, one sister, Mrs. Hulda Frush of Ashland, and one daughter, James Davis, of Plymouth.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLY-

SECTION 1: The Village of Plymouth, Ohio, shall enter a contract for the purchase of an automobile to be used by the Police Department as a police cruiser, at a price, delivered, of not more than Twenty Five Hundred Dollars (\$2500.00) and the Mayor and Clerk are hereby authorized to execute said contract in the name of the Village.

State Elementary Scholarships Are Still Available

Child Welfare Group Studies Problems

The third meeting of the Child Welfare Study Group of the Huron County met last week at the Court house with Rev. Robert Collett of Greenwich presiding.

Progress reports were again given by the sub-committees. A preliminary report was given by Mr. Robert Schultz, of Greenwich, chairman of "The Child in the Foster Home" sub-committee. The committee feels that more study will have to be given before their final report and recommendations can be given. Mr. Schultz closed his preliminary report with the following recommendations in relation to standards for the Foster home program and means for implementing them:

"That a thorough study and thoughtful evaluation of the foster home be made before a license is recommended; that careful planning go into the selection of the foster home in relation to the particular needs of the child requiring placement; that adequate supervision of the child and foster home be provided; that although the group recognizes that institutional care will meet the needs of some children better by far the greater number of children will need the personalized care of a foster home, especially the infant and the pre-school child; that more information on Child Welfare Services be made available to the public; and that the County Welfare Director work out some plan making for greater co-ordination with those social agencies which are using foster homes in Huron County."

With these standards in mind the committee will continue their study of this particular phase of Child Welfare Services in Huron County. The next meeting will be held January 11th at 8:00 o'clock at the court house with a final report from "The Child Who is Adoptable" sub-committee.

He has been replaced in Plymouth by Ralph Ream who has been relief man for this area.

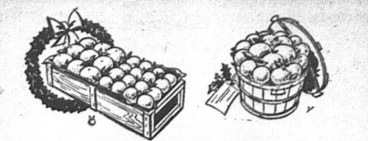

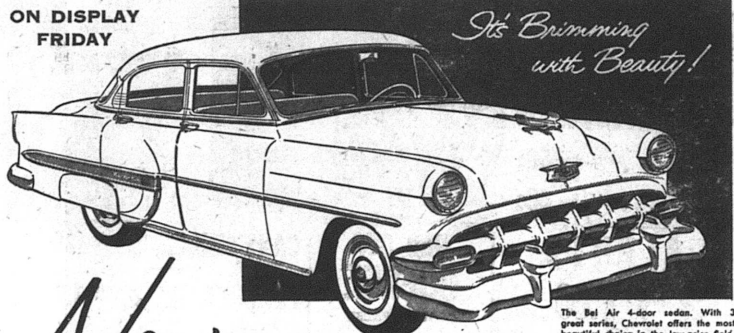

ORDINANCE No. 31-53

AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, REGULATING TRUCK TRAFFIC IN THE VILLAGE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT:

SECTION 1. From and after the 15th day of December, 1953, it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation operating a motor truck of one ton or more load capacity through or upon the streets or alleys of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, to pass another vehicle while in a moving line of traffic.

SECTION 2. Violations of this ordinance shall be punishable by a fine of not less than Five Dollars (\$5.00) nor more than Fifty Dollars (\$50.00).

SECTION 3. This ordinance is an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, welfare and safety and shall go into effect immediately. The reason for this emergency is that this measure is necessary to regulate traffic in the village for the protection of the citizens thereof.
