Letter From

Puerto Rico
RUSSELL BAKER KNOWS NOW WHY WE PAY TAXES BACK HOME

Maybe it would be a good idea if all of us could take a tourist's trip down to Puerto Rico or some such place, then we would be better able to appreciate or understand the way we do things at home and why.

We had such a good letter from Russell Baker, a U. S. Marine, stationed down in Puerto Rico, that we want to share it with the Advertiser readers. Russell is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Baker, of Mills Ave., and he writes that he now knows why we pay taxes back home in the U. S., and that we shouldn't complain too much.

February, Puerto Rico
"Dear Mr. and Mrs. Thomas,
"It has been quite some time since I last wrote you all. Right now I am in Puerto Rico on maneuvers for one month. My wife is still in Miami. After these maneuvers are over I go back to Miami for the rest of my enlistment. Pretty soon I will be classed as what we call a short timer in this Marine Corps. I'll only have a few more months to do yet."

"Thought maybe you would be interested in how people live down here. As much as I have seen of it, it sure isn't any credit to Puerto Rico. (Editor's Note—Nor of the U. S. as an example of their management.) To give you an idea of what some of it is like—I had about Patrol duty in a little town about 30 miles from camp. This is the first and only time I'm leaving camp. I walked past a one room shack about 15 by 25 ft., and there were at least 20 people living in there. How they were living, I'll never know. Of course, San Juan and a few more of their big cities are beautiful so I can't tell. All of Puerto Rico I am as bad as what I've said."

"Some of the people are very poorly educated. Some do speak a little broken English. I ran into a Puerto Rican policeman who had lived in Cleveland, Ohio for 6 years. It sure was a great surprise to find a policeman here in these hills who knew where Cleveland was, outside of my fellow Marines."

"As far as travel goes, these people have better cars than some of our people do. Of course things are cheap down here because there is no sales tax, income tax, luxury tax, or thumb tax (!) to contend with. Cigarettes for instance, are 90¢ a carton."

"The roads are very, very poor; in fact 224 back home would look like a beautiful turnpike along side the roads. Automobiles sure do take a beating down here."

"This is about all I can tell you of Puerto Rico. I CAN SEE NOW WHY WE HAVE TAXES. If people get sore at paying taxes, tell them to visit another country where there are no taxes! I don't think they would get mad when March 15th rolled around."

"If anyone reads this besides me, I won't want to hurt any feelings if they are Puerto Ricans, or have ever visited here. I am just writing my opinion of it and what I have seen with my own eyes."

"I would give anything for one little snow ball. No kidding. (Ed note—so would we Russ, or a real good rain!)"

"Hope this letter finds everyone back home well and happy. God bless you all."

CLOSING OF SCHOOL

The sickness in Plymouth Schools has finally reached such a magnitude that the county health officials recommended that the schools close for a few days. Last Friday the Plymouth Schools had about 17% of the enrollment absent due to flu. Over the week end the per cent of pupils sick increased from 17% to 27%.

After discussing the situation with a local doctor and with Doctor Wayne, the county health commissioner, it was decided that perhaps a few days rest would bring our attendance up to where it should be.

Many people wonder how many pupils have to be ill before a local school is closed. There is no specific number or is there any specific percentage. It is entirely up to the local health and school officials. If all of the teachers were ill a school would have to close regardless of the number of pupils present. If the epidemic was of some bad disease such as polio or diphtheria it would take only a small number of cases before the epidemic would be serious enough to close a school.

During the present epidemic in Richland County most schools have closed when the sickness reached 25%. We closed at 2:00 p. m. because when you operate a school up to 2/3 of a school day, you are able to count that as a full day of school on the annual report to the State Department of Education. With cooperation from parents and pupils we think that the peak of the sickness should be far enough advanced so that we can successfully resume classes Thursday.

SALARY TRENDS

During the past week a bulletin has come to my desk as to the average salaries paid teachers in Ohio. It is interesting to note that Richland County is the lowest pay county in this area.

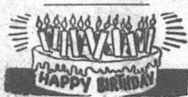
The average teacher's salary in Richland County is \$2962. Plymouth has almost half of their teachers receiving less than this amount. Richland County rates 51 among the 88 counties of Ohio.

The rates of the surrounding counties are as follows: Huron County, 36th; Crawford, 38th; Morrow, 42nd; Knox, 32nd; Ashland, 26th.

A close study of these figures will soon explain why Richland County has had such a difficult time in employing teachers during

the past time.

Last week a teacher came into the superintendent's office looking for a position. From this office she applied at the office of the board of education at the Cleveland schools. To make a long story short, Monday morning I received a letter from her stating that she was sorry that she could not accept the position in our schools. She did not mention that the Cleveland Schools also pay \$4368 an average. This is \$1406 more than the average paid in Richland County.

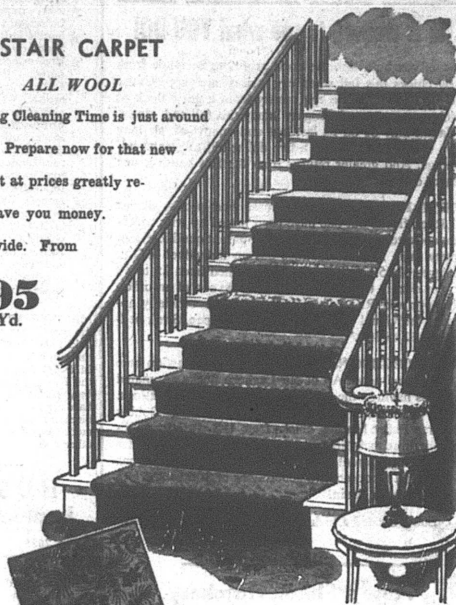

We don't believe in teaching swimming by throwing the student into deep water the first day. This system may or may not work; if it does appear to work there's generally a good chance that quite a number of poor habits are formed, habits that may turn out to be quite hazardous.

The same thing, more or less, can be said about driving instruction. You can't say "well, here's an open field, good luck!" Again, it can be said, this system may or may not work. We can probably think of quite a number of good drivers that learned this way—and quite a few poor ones.

Let me add this—the formulation of proper attitude toward other street and highway users the social responsibility as a member of the traffic society as well as the successful completion in practice driving instruction, should be considered the primary goal of prospective students of driving. These qualities are difficult to cultivate in an open lot, by the trial and error method.
