

## Plymouth Pilgrims Cop 53-51 Thriller Over Butler in 1st Round Of Tourney; Meet Lucas Tonight At 8 p. m.

Plymouth meets Lucas Thursday (tonight) at 8 p. m. in the second round of the Richland county tournament after defeating the Butler Bulldogs last Tuesday evening by a score of 51-53.

The Plymouth squad will face a team that has defeated them twice this season when they go on the Mansfield Senior High floor tonight.

The Pilgrims played good ball in defeating the Bulldogs by two slim points, and although it looked bad for the Plymouth boys, they still came through.

The first quarter score was when a started to look really good for the Pilgrims, the score being 12-10 in favor of Butler. The scoring continued about the same until the half. The half time score was 23-34 in Butler's favor. In the third quarter the Pilgrims got rolling a little better narrowing the margin to 34-42 still in the Bulldogs' favor.

The fourth stanza was the Pilgrims' grand quarter. They continued to gain on the Bulldogs until they were within two points. Finally, after battling back and forth, they tied them with one minute and a half to play.

They kept up the even scoring until the last five seconds. Finally, Ron Norris broke the tie for the Pilgrims and the Pilgrims won 53-51.

In this last ball game Tom Meier fouled out but not until he had racked up seven helping points. Ron Norris was on top of the Pilgrims' scoring with 15 points.

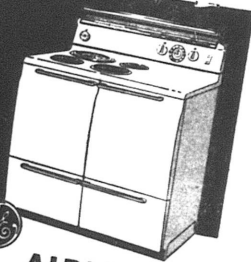

## Shiloh Selected For Injury Survey In Richland-Co.

The near completion of a special county-wide home injury study by volunteers in the county and the P.T.A. Health Chairman in Mansfield was announced today by Harold E. Samuelson, Director of the Health Departments Community Home Safety Program.

The study was in the form of a survey of slightly more than 300 homes in the county and consisted of asking every selected family whether they had suffered any type of home injury within the last week, prior to the interview.

The purpose of the study was to determine a home injury rate so that progress of future home safety programs may be measured. Help in setting up the carefully selected random sample which began in January of this year, was given by the Research Center and the School of Public Health at the University of Michigan.

One phase of the project was the selection of the village of Shiloh to represent all the villages in the county. The survey of nearly 30 homes in Shiloh was handled in its entirety by Mrs. Dewey Reynolds.

Analysis of the data collected will not be completed for some time, but it is hoped that the results will be suitable not only for a base line, but furnish additional data with which to develop effective and practical home safety programs.
