Huron-Co. Treasurer Reports Collections Most Successful

Harold B. Collier, Huron County Treasurer, reports the most successful tax collection for many years, in the first half 1952 period ending on January 31.

In view of the ever-increasing rates in practically all the 59 subdivisions of Huron County, the total tax charge has grown to a new high. The first half current charge was \$714,491.17; \$42,143.25 in delinquents; and \$17,533.69 in arrears, for a total of \$774,168.11.

The total general real estate collection was \$724,167.61, special assessments \$7,454.41 leaving \$1,873.07 unpaid real estate and \$3,923.34 unpaid special assessments; \$58,226.28 was paid as June tax advance payments.

The treasurer compared the unpaid real estate figure to \$38,244.41 of the corresponding period last year to \$40,049.18 of last June's collection.

Commenting on the seemingly large amount unpaid, he said that percentage of figures slightly less than 4 1/2%.

When asked what comprised the delinquent figure, the treasurer said that the largest part of it is made up of unpaid amounts standing from six months to one year and over half year.

It was found that at this particular time, the settlement has since been made with the County Auditor who in turn is preparing for a distribution of these monies. Only about 13% of this fund will go directly to the county coffers, the balance to be distributed locally to schools, municipalities, and townships.

RED CROSS MOBILE DISASTER UNIT HERE

With lights flashing and sirens going, the Red Cross Disaster Unit visited Plymouth Wednesday last week, and was escorted into town by the local police cruiser, fire truck, and the McQuate Ambulance.

The street in front of the Elementary School building was blocked off, and the group of vehicles parked there from 12 o'clock a.m. Students from the Elementary and the High School were conducted through, and the use of the units explained.

The Red Cross unit is equipped with two-way radio, first aid equipment, resuscitator, refrigerated medical supplies, spits, etc., portable 110 V. generator, flood lights, hot water, stretchers, etc.

In case of disaster, the Red Cross is notified and the disaster unit and a survey unit is dispatched to the scene.

A network of privately owned two-way radio equipped with transmitting details to all parts of the county. Doctors, nurses, and other personnel are instructed via this radio network.

Complete organization includes Warning, Rescue, and Evacuation Plans; medical and nursing personnel; food providers; sheltering facilities; transportation and communications facilities; clothing supply; information service; etc.

The entire organization is tied in with state, county and local police, fire, and other units. In case of National Emergency, the Red Cross unit, consisting of nearly 600 people, is integrated into National Civil Defense.

In case of disaster notify local police or Highway Patrol, Sheriff, or the Red Cross. This service is available in Richland County 24 hours a day, every day. Call E. Hamilton, Mansfield, has kindly furnished us with the necessary information for this news story.

She skidded to the left side of the icy highway and back into the path of the Vanich car, heading north and home from the Depot.

Talking It Over

The big day has come and gone. The first General Assembly of the Great State of Ohio met in the first State Capitol (Chillicothe) on the first Tuesday of March, 1803. We are now 150 years of age, and many things have happened to our State in that period of time.

In celebration, and as the official kick-off of the Sesquicentennial year, the 100th General Assembly held a session in Chillicothe on the first Tuesday of March, 1953. This meeting was held in the Court House, which stands on the site of the first State Capitol Building.

The House of Representatives met in the court room, and in spite of the bad weather (it rained all

day) the court room was filled with people, who stood during the entire session, which lasted almost two hours.

The regular order of business was followed, and during the session, House Bill #65 came up for the third reading. This bill related to the adoption of an official tree for the State of Ohio. After considerable debate, and some horse-play, in order to bring out as many points of parliamentary procedure as possible, the roll was called, and the House voted to adopt the Aesculus globosa as the official tree of the state.

The city of Chillicothe really had the welcome mat out, and in spite of the bad weather, we really enjoyed ourselves.

For you people who are interested in the history of Ohio, and museums, don't miss Chillicothe, and many of the historical sites surrounding this first capital city. Chillicothe is also the gateway to the new Atomic Energy Project in Pike County. There were thirty members in the House of Representatives in the first assembly, and they came from seven counties in the southern and eastern part of the State. If our section had any representation it probably came as a part of Trumbull County. Industrially the northern part of the state has far surpassed the original section.

You have heard much in regard to Ohio not being admitted to the union. In connection with this matter, House Joint Resolution #41 was introduced, memorializing the United States Congress relative to the status of Ohio as a member of the Union. More of this next week, along with happenings in the legislature. Harry Jump, a Huron County commissioner left me a note: "Sorry to have missed him. I was in a committee meeting at the time. Incidentally — Aesculus globosa means 'Buckeye'."

Voting Machines To Be Considered In Richland County

Richland county commissioners are again showing some interest in voting machines. Richland county commissioners and members of the election board will visit Norwalk and Sandusky sometime in April to study and evaluate automatic voting machines, which have been used in these counties for the past several years.

That the machines will alleviate a slow and arduous task of counting votes was expressed by Marshall C. Moore, chairman of the Richland county election board, when he recalled that at last November's election sleepy-eyed precinct workers struggled to 7-a.m. tabulating final results.

When official results of the last election were made known in Richland county, it was two weeks later that several voting mistakes were uncovered including a 2,000 vote error in the final vote cast for Clerk of Courts Howard Wenning.

Moore, as chairman of the election board, indicates that the board is in favor of installing voting machines in Richland county by next November or even in 1954.

Richland county commissioners will no doubt be greatly impressed with the accuracy and speed of

the machines, and their cost can be greatly offset by a reduction in manpower. The Huron county precinct in Plymouth has used a voting machine for several years and there has been no objections to its use by local voters, and it is believed that if Richland county decides to install the machines that they will be very acceptable to the voters in the south-end of town.

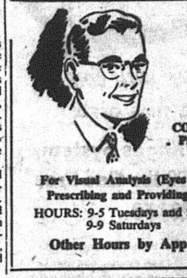
