WHEREAS the schools of Ohio are in dire need of more revenue for operating expenses than provided by the Manahan Bill or the Owen Bill, and

WHEREAS the schools of Ohio are in a precarious condition due to low teachers salaries and other financial obligations, and

WHEREAS the local real estate is being burdened by increasingly heavy taxes for school additions, municipal obligations and sewer improvements; therefore

Resolved, that the legislature of Ohio provide more revenue for school operation than provided in the above mentioned Manahan and Owen Bills; and be it further

Resolved, that the Secretary of the Plymouth Parent-Teacher-Association transmit copies of this resolution to County Representatives, Weaver and Robinson together with copies to Senators Latta and Mosher.

TRAILER TAX DUE APRIL 10

The annual tax on house trailers is due on March 31st, but there is a ten day grace period, which will extend the time to April 10th, without penalty. Applications may be made at the County Auditor's office, and certificates can be mailed, if the information forwarded is correct. Where trailers are not used as living quarters they are not taxable.

This year with the tax certificate, a metal tag is issued to be attached to the trailer, and a convenient check of local and county officials. A serious attempt is made each year to enforce the trailer tax law.

Local authorities, inasmuch as the bulk of this tax is distributed to the area in which the trailer is located, are urged to enforce the law.

The legislature has imposed a very severe penalty that amounts to several times the actual tax.

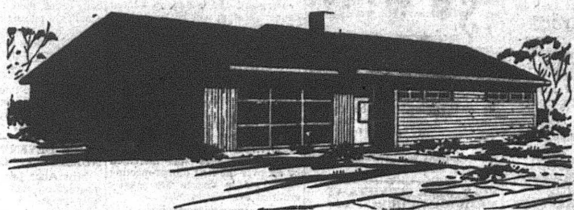

Marshal Clyde Myers has really been a ball of fire since he took over the job of village marshal a month ago. He has been keeping Mayor Swanger busy taking care of traffic cases as he has been keeping Mr. Swanger busy and not yet in sight.

If you wish to avoid being handed a ticket by the omnipresent Marshal, be careful to observe all state and village traffic laws, come to a full stop when you come to a Stop Sign; do not make a U-turn on a main highway, which is Main St. here; and make sure you are not driving in a reckless or unsafe manner.

Below is a list of cases, handed out by the Mayor, that have been handled in his court and the Probate Court in Mansfield since February 14:

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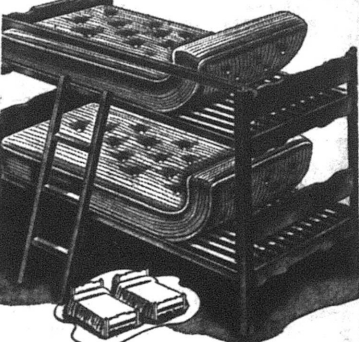

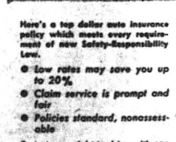

SHELBY APPROVES \$700,000 SEWAGE DISPOSAL PLANT

Shelby's council approved a \$700,000 sewage disposal plant at its meeting Monday night. Final drawings and plans for the plant were prepared by Floyd Browne and Associates of Marion, copies of which will be sent to the State Board of Health in Columbus for approval. Council will be asked to authorize Mayor James Simson to advertise for bids at its regular meeting next Monday night.

Engineer Floyd Browne has requested Mayor Simson to time all the legislation so that bids can be received on April 10 in order that construction of the plant can be started at once.

The new Shelby sewage disposal plant will be built on the site of the present sewer farm which was constructed in 1912 at a cost of \$37,000, with a capacity of one million gallons of sewage a day, and which was rated to answer the needs of a population of 6,000.

The new proposed plant will provide treatment of four million gallons of sewage and industrial waste per day for a city of 15,000 population. The new plant is costing an additional \$40,000 because it is designed to receive industrial wastes from four Shelby industries.

The Spring Hinge Co., Shelby Cycle, the Miller-Shelby Products, and the Shelby Products Co. Council has not agreed on an increased sewage rental charge to compensate for the \$21,000 a year which it will cost to operate the new plant.

The village of Lexington, Ohio, just south of Mansfield, is beginning construction of a sewage disposal plant to take care of a new industry which will locate there within a few months. Lexington's plant is designed to take care of a population of 15,000, and is estimated to cost around \$170,000. At

present Lexington's population is 700, and it is predicted that it will reach 1500 within the next 25 years.

The Stevens Manufacturing Co., located in Mansfield, has been wanting to extend its operations by plant expansion, but opposition by residents held up permission from the city, as the plant site is said to be in a residential zone, rather than industrial. A few months of litigation the plant officials decided to move out of Mansfield, choosing Lexington as their home.

The town's sewage disposal plant will be rushed to completion to meet the demands of the plant. The costs of the system will be financed by a \$35,000 bond issue approved for the project, special assessments from property owners, and by mortgage revenue bonds.

DOWN THE ALCAN HIGHWAY AND HOME WITH THE BILL GUTHRIES

When a person drives from here to California, he has to set his watch back three different times, but when he drives from here to Anchorage, Alaska, he has to set a back five different times.

That information, handed me by Myron (Bill) Guthrie, one Sunday a short time ago, gave me something of a start. Bill and his wife, Beatrice, you know drove down from Anchorage last fall over the new Alcan and linking highways, a distance of 4,540 miles, and knows what he's talking about. Bill, however, coming east, had to set his watch back five times when he got to the point—turn his watch ahead.

"Anchorage," he explained, "goes by Alaska Standard time, and our watches are set accordingly when we started. When we got to the Alaska-Yukon border, we had to set them ahead one hour to Yukon Standard time, and when we arrived at milepost 627 where the highway crossed from Yukon into British Columbia we had to move the hands ahead again to Pacific Standard time. At Edmonton we again had to shift to Mountain Standard, and back through the Midwest we drove on Central Standard until we reached the Ohio-Indiana border, where Eastern Standard took over.

"That difference in time between here and Alaska," he went on, "is just one of the many things the average person down here in the States but vaguely understands about the country. It's vast, bigger than Oregon, California, New York, Michigan, Minnesota, Indiana, Maine and West Virginia combined. It stretches from the mild and rainy north temperate zone of the Pacific coast to the frigid Arctic ocean, past the Arctic Circle to the North, and from the Canadian Yukon Territory it extends across the North Pacific half way to Japan. Anchorage, located on Cook Inlet on the south coast, is almost as far west as the Hawaiian Islands. If you don't believe it, just get out your map and look."

I did, and by gum, he's right. It's rather stunning to sit back and slowly comprehend that so big a chunk of North America extends so far west. To drive to California and thence on to across 2,000 miles of Pacific ocean to Honolulu would be driving little, if any, farther than from here to Anchorage.

"It cost me like the dickens to get my car up there," Bill resumed. "You know I, along with Dale Reynolds, Foster Smith and the rest of the boys, made the trip up from Columbus by plane. Ben followed later with the car, driving it to Seattle, where she intended to get passage for it and herself on a steamer to Anchorage."

"When she arrived in Seattle, however, a dock and shipping strike was on, so she had to store the car in a garage and obtain passage on a plane from Seattle to Anchorage."

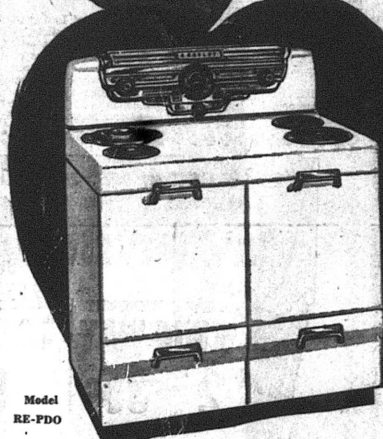

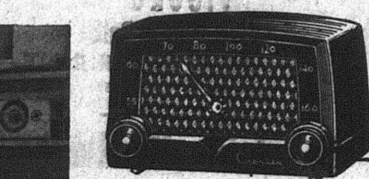

Marvin's MUSINGS

NO PREDICTIONS THIS YEAR

Hank Greenberg, one time star slugger with the Tigers and now general mgr. of the Indians, is being a little more cautious with his pennant predictions this year than he was last. A year ago, he placed himself squarely on the spot with a point-blank announcement that the Tribe was a cinch to win the A. L. flag in '52.

He came close. But it was a bitter disappointment when the Indians didn't make it—especially since three of his pitchers were 20-game winners.

This year Hank will only go so far as to say the Indians "have the best chance of any other club in the league" to halt the domination of the Yankees.

But manager Al Lopez still has a club without a top-flight shortstop, and teams without such a product just don't win pennants.

The word from the Tribe training base is that they're going to get along again with Ray Boone.

This, despite the fact that after Boone was hurt last year they bought George Strickland from Pittsburgh and thereafter played 750 ball. They cashed in on the latter, winning 18 of their last 20 contests.

Strickland isn't a great shortstop, but he is better than Boone, and the Tribe was a new team with the former Pirate in there.

One would like to think Strickland had done enough to clinch the job this year. But Greenberg hasn't given up on Boone, who is a far better hitter than George.

Boone, playing in only 103 games last season, raised his batting average 30 points over the previous year to .263. Strickland hit only .216 in 21 games for Cleveland, and only .177 in 76 games for the Pirates.

Strickland, however, fiddled 24 points higher—264 to 240—than his 30-year-old rival, who has been the Tribe's regular shortstop since only .216 in 21 games to Boston.

Strickland proved a great help to the Cleveland pitchers, and maybe Boone's absence would have been three 20-game winners (Wynn, Lemon, Garcia) on the team if he hadn't been available.

Boone, of course, was hampered by aching knees and ankles last year, which may account some for his 28 errors. Then he injured his knee and had to quit playing altogether.

But that wasn't all. Veteran baseball men have never been high on Boone as a shortstop. Last year,

though, Bill Jurges, one of the best in his day, noticed something Boone was doing that was wrong. He told manager Al Lopez about it and this spring Boone has been working extra hard to correct the fault.

So Boone is going to get another chance to keep the shortstop job. If he fails again, the Indians probably will fall again, unless Strickland gets back there and does the same kind of job he did at the tail end of last season.

Anyway, Greenberg isn't making predictions about the pennant so early this year.
