Since Ohio is celebrating its Sesquicentennial Year, the theme for this year's Reading Club of the local library will be "Ohioana".

The club is scheduled to begin June 1 under the supervision of Mrs. Harold Shaffer, Librarian, who has directed the clubs since 1949. Prior to that time, Miss Jessie Trauger was supervisor.

The club will be made up of groups, each running for ten weeks. In the first group, the first, second and third graders will be enrolled in the second group, the fourth, fifth and sixth graders in the third group, and the seventh, eighth and ninth graders in the fourth group.

Suggestive of the theme, there will be a map of Ohio with colored dots to represent the various cities, towns and villages which are read, with an interesting travelogue in connection.

The Richland County Highway department will spend an estimated \$83,000 this summer on road-surfacing program planned to cover 120 miles of county roads.

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WILCOX NARROWLY ESCAPES DEATH IN AUTO WRECK

Returning from Cleveland Tuesday morning, Mrs. Harold Dietrich narrowly escaped death when the car she was driving went off the road and was completely demolished. The accident occurred about 10 o'clock on Route 61, just north of the B. O. underpass. The road was slippery, and Mrs. Dietrich lost control of the car as it went off the side of the highway. The machine rolled off the road, turning completely over on its top. Just before the car was found dead Tuesday morning in a ditch off the Green Bush road by a passerby. He was shot in the head and died instantly. He had just recently returned from an extensive trip through the west and south. Dr. H. U. Sykes, who gave a verdict of death, said that the cause of death was such a wreck had been understood by those who viewed the car after the wreck.

Death came suddenly to Mark W. Caywood Friday evening at around 6:00 o'clock at the family home on Trux street. His death was a shock both to the family and the entire community. Mr. Caywood had not complained about his health to his wife, Grace, and Friday afternoon he was engaged in mowing the lawn. Mrs. Caywood assumes that he went into the house around six o'clock for a drink of water, and when she returned home he had quietly passed away.

Mr. Caywood, who was 63 yrs. 9 months, had resided in Plymouth for 44 years and had been employed at the Fate-Root-Heath Co. as a machinist for a period of 43 years. Some 14 years ago Mr. Caywood suffered a stroke which kept him from his work for a period of approximately a year. However, he regained sufficient health to resume his work at the local plant. He was employed in the tool room where the work is comparatively light, grinding tools being his main occupation. Mr. Caywood was a skilled mechanic and perfect in his work. During his years of employment at the shop he gained the respect and admiration of his fellow-workers who will miss him at the machines in the tool room.

Mark Caywood was quiet and unassuming, and as father, husband and citizen he was loved and held in high esteem. The years following his stroke he kept mostly to his home, and he found his pleasure in the things about his home.

Last rites were held Monday afternoon at the McGee Funeral home, with Rev. Paul Mumford, pastor of the First Lutheran Church, officiating. Mr. Caywood was buried in the local cemetery.

Surviving are his wife, Grace, one son, Jerry Caywood, a daughter, Mrs. Don Shaver, both of Plymouth, and a brother, residing in Lorain, and five grandchildren.

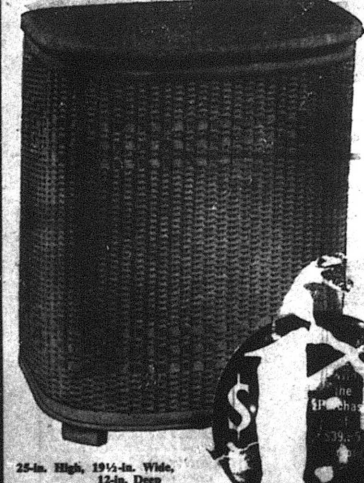

Marvin's MUSINGS

It was a tip from Ted Williams, the former Red Sox great, now a Marine flier in Korea, that prompted Frank Lane to acquire Harry Dorish, currently one of the American League's foremost relief pitchers.

"I saw Williams shortly after the Browns released Dorish to the Toronto Club in the fall of 1950," the White Sox general manager said.

Ted remarked "I don't see how they can send that guy out of the majors. He's got as much stuff as anyone in the league. If some club would give him an opportunity, he'd win a lot of games." Ted was a teammate of Dorish at Boston for three years and knew what he was talking about. So I wasted no time claiming Harry in the draft that winter.

Under Manager Paul Richards, the little guy with the rubber arm received the "opportunity" and so far this spring has kept the Comiskey club in the pennant race.

Commenting on the specific situation, Richards recalled: "I knew Williams didn't like to bat against Harry, but the first time they met in this park, Ted hit a home run off Dorish. But at that time Harry lacked confidence more than he lacked ability. He always had the stuff. His slider, in particular, is a beauty. His biggest asset now is his confidence. That's why he is so effective in the clutch."

Should the White Sox, with their outright defensive unit, prove a surprise pennant winner this year, chances are that Dorish will be as important a cog as was Jim Konstanty in the Phillies N. L. triumph in 1950.

Richards thinks Harry will surpass Konstanty in effectiveness. Big Jim worked in a record 74 games, was officially credited with 16 wins and saved some 30 others that season.

Dorish revealed he is working on the same pitch that made Konstanty so effective — the palm ball. The chunky right hander, he's 5-11 and weighs 200, gives Manager Richards full credit for his success. "Paul showed me how to throw this special pitch," he explained. "You just sort of grip it way back into your hand and let it go. I use it as the change-up."

"My best pitch right now probably is the slider. It's a little worked out, but the slider is my favorite. With a defense like we've got, they can hit that one into the dirt all they like. I know our infielders will throw them out."

It was this slider ball which prompted Williams to name Dorish as a future mound great. When Joe Page was saving games for the Yankees, he once said, "I just throw up the slider. Batters hit it into ground and fielders like Phil Rizzuto, Gerry Coleman and Bill Johnson get them out."

Permits Required For Construction Of Driveways

The State Highway Maintenance Department of Division #3 at Ashland, Ohio is experiencing some difficulty in getting the information to the public relative to the obtaining of permits to construct a driveway or Driveways for access to State Highways.

The Director of Highways states that property owners desiring to construct a driveway for access to a state highway must obtain a permit for the construction of said driveway or driveways.

These permits are required so that construction may be directed by Highway Forces and that damage will not be impaired, that the driveways will not hinder traffic, safety and maintenance of the highways for the benefit of the traveling public. These permits are required for all driveways including places of business, driveways to residences, and field driveways into fields adjacent to state highways.

Permits may be obtained without cost from the State Highway Superintendent in the county in which the driveway will be constructed.

Superintendents will cooperate with the property owner in instructing them how to properly build a driveway entrance.

SAHOR WRITES OF TOURING IN JAPAN

Lewis Schneider, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Schneider, of Plymouth, is serving the U. S. with the Navy, and is also using the opportunity to see something of this interesting world. Right now he is around the Orient, and has written a fine letter home about a tour which some of the sailors took in Japan. With permission, we have printed it for you.

April 1953 — I just got back from the Tokyo tour and it sure was worth the dollar. The first stop was the Art Gallery which took 21 years to build at a cost of fourteen million dollars. They had a lot of paintings symbolizing Japan's past. No one man painted more than two of them and very few had done two. It took a lifetime almost for each painting. They are without flaw.

The second stop we made was at the Detached Imperial Palace which was built at a cost of eighty million dollars. It has well over two hundred rooms and the estate covers many acres. It is a place for a place for visiting diplomats to reside during their visit.

The third stop was the Masekuni State Shrine. A state shrine handles ceremonies for the dead only. They have a procession walk through a gate, two young priests in front and two in back. The priest who resides within the gates of the shrine leads and they go through their Chinto rituals and then all five sing some sort of ritual. Chintism is the original Japanese religion. They never have an even number of priests presiding at any ceremony because it is considered bad luck.

When a Japanese boy is called to the colors, service of his country, he says goodbye to his family and girl, and tells them not to expect him back alive as he is the property of his country, but to meet him under the cherry blossoms at the shrine, meaning through the spirits.

The month of May is dedicated to the young boys of Japan. Any family having even one boy can fly a fish pennant from the top of their house. They fly one for each boy.

The month of March is dedicated to the young girls of Japan and each family who has even one girl likewise can wear one rose for each girl in the family. No one but the royal family can wear a 16-petal rose since it is the symbol of royalty. I watched for fish pennants on the way back but didn't see very many as the thing is not in full swing as yet.

The fourth stop was the Imperial Compound outside the Imperial Palace. It covers many acres and is a very beautiful site. You have to cross a double bridge to enter the palace and we were not allowed to do so.

That was about all we saw there except several thousand Japanese people. The first and last stop before lunch was the Diet Building which is the same as our Congress building. They convene the Diet twice a year and whenever an emergency arises. Once a year the Emperor attends to open it and any other time when an emergency

stretches the need of his presence. It is closed on Sundays and holidays so we did not get to go inside.

The next stop was for lunch at the Hotel Ambassador. We had all the luxuries there that any person could want. It was by no means considered in the royal class but it was very nice.

We then proceeded to the International Theatre for a floor show. They have countless changes of scenery and a cast completely of girls. They had 87 girls in one scene so there must have been well over 100 girls altogether. Some of them dressed as men. I am enclosing a program which should show you a little of what it was like. The theatre seats 20,000 people but there were some standing in the aisles and many behind the doors in the lobby upstairs and down. I doubt that I will see a show to equal that one in a long time.

There were 73 of us from the way on the tour and it was sponsored by an Englishwoman who speaks English, Japanese and a few other languages quite fluently. She resides pretty close to Yokohama and does that every day we are in port and for other ships as well. She pays for our expenses. I hope I'll have some pictures of a lot of those things pretty soon and will send you them.

The bill was indefinitely postponed. This is just a nice way of stating that the bill was killed in committee, but it is just as dead as it would be with any other wording.

The bill was ordered to be engrossed, and read the third time in its regular order. This is another way of saying that the committee has approved the bill and recommends it for passage. It requires a majority of the committee membership (not just the members present) to approve a bill.

Last night, House Bill 439 was killed in committee, in fact the author of the bill asked that it be

indefinitely postponed, and he did not appear before the committee to speak for the bill. This action will quiet the fears of all of you gun fanciers and owners.

The Public Affairs Committee reported a bill out, pertaining to weight distance tax for trucks. This is a very controversial issue, and had a hard time in committee. It will also be a debatable issue on the floor of the House. This should be very interesting.

Today, the lady members of the legislature were luncheon guests in the Governor's mansion. I would welcome an invitation to eat with the Governor and his wife, and would gladly settle for a breakfast invitation.

Today the Senate passed House Bill 454, this bill pertaining to placing Huron county in the inland trapping district, and when sign-

ed by the Governor, will become effective as of October 2, 1953.

Women's Groups Sponsor Bond Sales

Mrs. Dwight F. Eisenhower has made an appeal to all the prominent Women's organizations of the country to join "Women's Crusade for Security" by sponsoring a Bond-A-Month sales of U. S. Defense Bonds.

Each club that secures a Bond-A-Month subscriber for each of their memberships, will receive a framed reproduction in color of the President's Inaugural Prayer, the frame being made from the wood of the Inaugural Platform.

In March, Huron County Bond sales totaled to a total of \$131,000. This was the largest since January 1947, and represented an increase of \$81,390 over March 1952.

170 Trailers Listed In Huron County

170 occupants of house trailers over Huron County have paid their annual tax to date. This is the same number that paid their tax all of last year. Many do not occupy their trailers until later in the year, and pay for only the balance of the year, particularly those who use their trailers for vacations and fishing trips.

Letters were mailed to all who had trailer tax certificates a year ago, and many respond from all parts of the U. S. though they are not required to pay the tax in Ohio.

Due to the many other matters concerning the Auditor's office, it will be mid-summer before trailers can be checked this year, and the enforcement of the law will have to be by local officials who share in the tax. All those who paid the tax are furnished with certificates and a metal seal of the State of Ohio to be attached to the exterior of the trailer.

BUILDING ADDITION

Mr. Worley Reed has begun construction of a new addition to his home on Trux Street. Footers have been laid and Mr. Reed expects to supervise and assist with the work. A 14x20 addition will be added to the front of the present structure, a 12x12 addition to the east and a 10x32 addition to the rear.

Huron Co. Polio Chapter Elects Officers At Meet

At the annual meeting of the Huron County Chapter, National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis held in the Common Pleas Court room recently, a resume of the work done by the Chapter for the past 15 years was given by the Chairman, Ruth Friend.

The National Foundation was organized 15 years ago to "lead, direct and unify" the fight against infantile paralysis. That same year the Huron County Chapter was organized. In the first five years and braces for five polio patients who had polio prior to the organization of the Chapter. In 1944, just at the opening of the fall county fair, four cases of polio were reported in as many days. From then on, each year has seen an increase of polio in the county. And for the past nine years the National Foundation has had to supplement the funds of the Huron County Chapter from the national epidemic fund.

Since all polio victims of the county are cared for by the Huron County Chapter from the very onset of their illness until they are returned to their homes in the best shape possible to resume their normal life, the services of the chapter are legion. They provide transportation to City Hospital where patients in this area are treated; they provide all braces, splints etc. necessary in their hospital treatment; they provide physiotherapy treatments and wheel chairs; they provide permanent braces, shoes, and last but not least, they provide follow-up examinations at either Gates Hospital, Elyria or by Dr. Heyman, noted Orthopedic Specialist of Cleveland and Elyria.

Since most cases of polio are hospitalized for a long time, and special treatment is required, valence is usually effected at Elyria Gates Hospital where they have all the advantages Warm Springs, Georgia offers, only in a smaller way. Most parents must prefer to have their children convalesce here since no one, to date has every asked to have their child sent to Georgia. At Elyria, they are closer to their home and friends who can visit them frequently.

During the fifteen drives for funds in the March of Dimes, citizens of this county have been most generous, even the their contributions did not completely cover the cost of our county patients. Approximately \$86,000 has been collected and this was supplemented by \$30,000 from the epidemic fund.

In 1952, the Huron County Chapter paid \$6722.84 for hospitalization of patients stricken in 1951; \$2,666.26 for four corrective operations and 1952 patient care; medical bills were \$455.60; Physiotherapy treatments for eight were \$588.50; 2 wheel chairs \$238.50; Shoes, \$84.75; braces, corsets, crutches etc., \$823.50; ambulance and regular transportation for patients, nurses and aides, \$519.38.

Election of officers for the year returned Ruth Friend, Chairman; Guy Latham of Monroeville as Vice Chairman; John O'Hara of New London as Treasurer, and Maude Smith as Secretary. The first three have been officers for the life of the Huron County Chapter, and this is Mrs. Smiths third year as Secretary.

It was agreed to continue their present arrangement with City Hospital and Gates Hospital, Elyria; nurses and aides will be sent to City Hospital in the epidemic season since they so willingly accept Huron County patients.

At the death of Common Pleas Judge Luther Van Horn last August, Gov. Lausche appointed Attorney Don J. Young Jr., as the acting common pleas judge. In the November election Probate Judge Robert Vetter, of Willard, was elected to the common pleas position without opposition, and will take over the duties of Judge Young this month.

Gov. Lausche has now named Judge Young to fill out the unexpired term in probate and juvenile court, which Judge Vetter will leave.
