NOTICE TO ALL DOG OWNERS

Due to the many complaints from the citizens of Shiloh regarding dogs running at large and destroying gardens and shrubbery, I am hereby notifying all dog owners to co-operate in the enforcement of Ordinance 1924 as passed by the council of the village of Shiloh, which provides:

Sec. II. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons being the owner or having in charge any dogs, or other animals, or any geese, ducks, chickens or other fowls, to suffer the same to run at large in any public road or highway, on any street, lane, alley or public ground, or upon any property in the Village of Shiloh, not his own, or suffer such animals or fowls to be herded, kept or detained for the purpose of grazing the same, on premises other than those owned or occupied by the owner or keeper of such animals or fowls.

Sec. II. Any person, firm or corporation who violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than One Dollar (\$1.00) nor more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) and the cost of prosecution.

A number of owners of dogs who have no gardens of their own apparently feel there is no harm in allowing their dogs to roam at large over the property of others. Disrespect for one law tends to breed disrespect for all laws.

If this notice is not respected, other action will be taken in compliance of law.

Marvin's MEATS

Dave Hoskins, Cleveland Indians' right handed pitching rookie, is a modest young man whose only extravagance is his fondness for expensive slittor shoes. Aware that it's rather difficult to purchase high priced shoes on a minor league salary, Hoskins has set his sights on a permanent berth with the Indians. His fine performance in the last two weeks would make it appear that in his second full season in organized baseball, the 27-year old hurler might become a valuable member of Cleveland's strong mound staff.

After shutting out the New York Yankees in a five inning relief stint on May 5, Hoskins blazed N. L. for three innings on Sunday, May 10, and hit a homer with two on to help his mates overcome a three run deficit in the eighth inning. Manager Al Lopez has indicated that he plans to use Hoskins in relief roles for the present, and the newcomer may be Cleveland's best right handed reliever since Satchel Paige, who recommended Hoskins for a trial to General Manager Hank Greenberg in 1949.

Greenberg signed Hoskins as an outfielder although he was aware that Hoskins had done a little pitching. Dave had hit .393 for Grand Rapids in the Class A Central League in 1948, but was released and spent the following season with the Cleveland Buckeyes of the Negro-American League where he continued to hit well.

Cleveland assigned Hoskins to its Dayton Club in 1950 and there Hoskins batted .318 until he was benched by a pitched ball. It was while he was lying in the hospital that Hoskins decided to try his hand at pitching. However it wasn't until midsummer of 1951 that he was given an opportunity to pitch, as Bill Norman, then his manager at Wilkes-Barre, had high regard for his batting prowess.

Hoskins won five and lost one for Wilkes-Barre and at Cleveland's farm club training base at Dayton Beach in the Spring of 1952, Greenberg and Farm Club Director Mike McNally advised Hoskins to devote himself solely to pitching, and assigned him to the Dallas Club of the Texas League.

Hoskins, first Negro to play in the Texas circuit, was a sensation from the start and quickly became the league's number one attraction. He won 22 games and lost but 10, to pace Dallas to its first pennant in many seasons. His earned run average of 2.12 led the league as did his 26 complete games and 280 innings pitched.

For one who has pitched such a brief period, Hoskins boasts excellent poise and control. At Dallas, he walked but 70 men. Dave's best pitch is a curve which he throws at several speeds.

He resembles Paige on the mound, although he is not as tall and not as fast as 'Satch. However, he has many of Paige's mannerisms and his delivery is much the same.

Against fireballing Virgil Trucks on May 10, he blasted a double and a homer and will probably be utilized as a left handed pinch hitter besides being called on for relief hurling chores. In any event, buying those slittor shoes should be a little easier from now on.
