## Plymouth's Quota Is 129 Pints

### HERE'S YOUR CHANCE, CITIZENS OF PLYMOUTH AND VICINITY —

Plymouth's first visit of the Red Cross Bloodmobile will be held Thursday, June 18th at the High School Auditorium in Plymouth.

Donor hours will be scheduled from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m. A Physician and nurses will accompany the Red Cross Unit here and volunteer nurses and helpers from our own community will assist the Bloodmobile staff.

The need for blood is still urgent and the National Chapter has pledged an additional million pints of blood this year for use in the national globulin program. This will increase the National Blood goal during 1953 to five million pints of blood. Gamma Globulin is being used for infantile paralysis research workers in preventing and lessening the paralysis in polio.

By participation in the Red Cross program, our local hospital can get blood from Cleveland blood bank in cases of emergency.

2-Plates For Ohio Car Owners In 1954

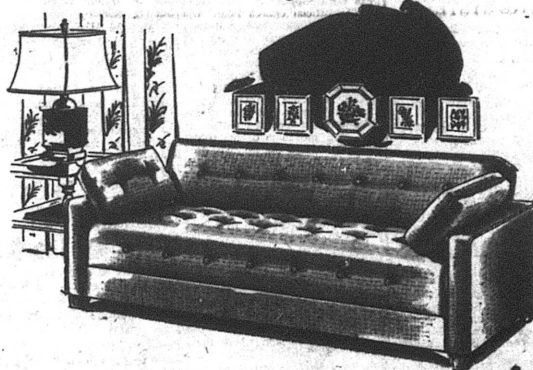

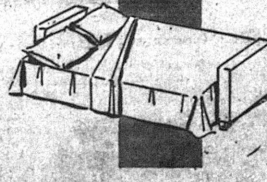

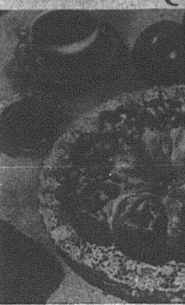

## FAVORITE QUICK BREADS



By BETTY NEWTON

If the family is tiring of apples and cranberries in their more familiar forms, they will surely enjoy an Apple Coffee Cake or Cranberry Nut Bread. Both have a different and appealing flavor.

Cinnamon Rolls are easy to make when packaged roll mix is used. Half of this recipe can be baked and the other half stored in the refrigerator for fresh rolls the next day. Follow directions on package for storing refrigerator roll dough.

## Apple Coffee Cake

2 C. sifted all-purpose flour  
2 tsp. baking powder  
1 tsp. salt  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/4 C. shortening  
4 C. milk  
1/2 C. soft butter or margarine  
2 C. finely chopped apples  
1/4 C. sugar  
1 tsp. cinnamon  
1/4 C. confectioner's sugar

Sift flour with baking powder, salt and sugar. Cut in shortening to form a fine meal. Make a hole in the center of the mixture. Add the milk and stir until smooth. Turn out onto a floured board or pastry cloth. Roll into a large rectangle about 1/4 inch thick. Spread with soft butter or margarine, then cover with mixture of apples, sugar, cinnamon and salt. (Mix just before using.)

Roll in jelly roll fashion starting on a long side. Lift to a large shallow pan with an edge to catch any dripping. Shape into a circle. With a sharp knife cut into center at 1-inch intervals all around circle. Do not cut all the way through the roll. Turn cut pieces over so cut edge is on top. Bake in gas range at 350 degrees 45 to 50 minutes. Brush with confectioner's sugar moistened with enough water to make it pour. Serve warm. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

# Marvin's MUSINGS

By AL MARVIN

Although he has played less than two full seasons in the majors, Mickey Mantle already rates with the top power hitters of all time. The 21-year-old Yankee soon may be having already dwarfed the long distance slugging achievements of the great Joe DiMaggio. Casey Stengel calls his blond bomber the most powerful swing-batter who ever lived.

Casey says "only Jimmy Fox rates with him for power as a right handed batter and only Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig can be classed with him from the left side of the plate."

In placing Mantle on a high pedestal alongside these three greats, Stengel means that Mantle is better than DiMaggio. Not as an all-around ball player, of course. Not yet, anyway. But in sheer power there has been nothing like him since the three great sluggers who have been enshrined in baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, N. Y.

Mantle, of course, will have to wait 20 years or so to be voted in to the shrine. However, he has put his foot in the door because a memento of his will be placed on display there at the end of this season. That's the ball which he hit in Washington on April 17, the longest measured drive in major league history. That swat over the left field bleachers of Griffith stadium traveled 562 feet and is the mightiest on record.

It was Mick's tremendous strength which prompted Stengel to make him the Yankee cleanup hitter. A decision reached during spring training in St. Petersburg, Fla., in March. Casey also had the hope that Mickey would become a better hitter, for the average. Now he is convinced that the boy, by curing some batting weaknesses, will be challenging for the league batting title in a year or so.

"He's the only man who ever had to cure weaknesses from both sides of the plate," Casey says. "And he's licked most of them. If he can cut down his strikeouts left handed, he'll have a chance to lead the league in a year or so."

Stengel, happy to admit mistakes, now concedes that he was wrong a couple of years ago when he decided that Mantle was a better, better left handed than right.

"That was my idea and my coaches agreed with me when we first saw him in Phoenix in 1951," Casey reveals. "I must stepped in and told him to stick to batting left handed. Now I'm glad I didn't," the old man smiled.

Mickey hit his record home run right handed against left hand pitcher, Chuck Stobbs of the Sen-

ators. Last year Mantle batted .333 righty and .239 lefty for an overall mark of .311. That would give the impression that he is more proficient from the right side. Seems doubly true because he seldom gets a bunt hit while up righty but is able to bunt safely, due to his great speed, often from the left side.

### OFFICIAL VISITOR

Mr. Edgar E. Harris of the United States Office of Education visited the school Friday to check on the number of pupils whose parents are employed at the Wilkins Air Force Depot or other Federal projects. Mr. Harris reported everything in order as far as records and reports are concerned at Plymouth and gave us helpful information concerning future reports and further Federal Aid.

### SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

Plymouth Schools completed the school year with 436 pupils in attendance. The average attendance for the last six weeks period was 93.1%. The class having the best attendance for the period was the eighth grade with a percentage of 97.6 for the entire period. It was interesting to note that the girls in Mrs. McGinnis' room had perfect attendance for the period. On the whole the attendance was quite low since the flu epidemic in the winter with many pupils having mumps and measles.

### PROMOTION REPORT

Ninety-five and seven-tenths per cent of the pupils in the first eight grades of Plymouth were promoted to the next grade at the end of the year with 4.3% of the pupils being retained in the grade for another year. In high school the pupils passed 430 courses out of a total of 449 courses taken. This amounted to approximately 4% of the courses being failed by members in the upper four grades. Eight high school pupils will not have enough credits to advance with their class unless they take additional work before next fall. Sophomores have to have three credits, Juniors have to have seven credits, and Seniors need eleven credits. Sixteen academic credits are required for graduation.
