Brucellosis Test To Be Conducted

The Huron County Dairy Service Cooperative, of which Morris Cawrie is chairman, voted at their last meeting to request the Division of Animal Industry to conduct a countywide brucellosis test as soon as possible. The Board decided to take this action since it has been informed that at least a year would elapse before such a test could begin.

John Wells, County Agricultural Agent, reported that some out-of-state milk markets are already requiring dairymen to have brucellosis free herds in order to be able to ship milk.

The new ring test that is being used to detect infected herds can be conducted in a few weeks in any one county. A follow-up test must be conducted in six to eight months since only those cows in milk are tested. Positive herds must then be blood tested to detect the infected cows. Wells stated that approximately five per cent of all dairy cows have brucellosis. Those infected that have been under experimental observation, have shown a 22 per cent milk production loss. Since there are several types of brucellosis will infect farm animals, as well as man, most of the Dairy Committees in Ohio are doing all they can to aid the dairyman in eradicating brucellosis under a program similar to that which has been used to eradicate tuberculosis.

Before any county can conduct a brucellosis test, petitions must be signed by a minimum of 251 per cent of the dairymen having at least 75 per cent of the dairy cows in the county.

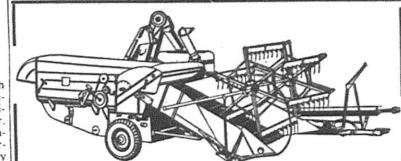

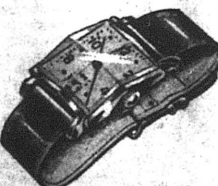

ORDINANCE NO. 25-53 AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, TRANSFERRING THE SUM OF \$525.00 FROM THE ELECTRIC FUND TO THE GENERAL FUND.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, THAT:

SECTION 1. The Clerk and the Treasurer are hereby authorized and directed to transfer from the Electric Fund to the General Fund the sum of Five Hundred Twenty Five Dollars (\$525.00) to reimburse the General Fund for part of administrative expenses incurred by the municipality in connection with the electric distribution system.
