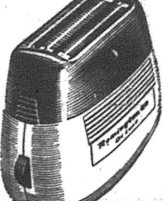

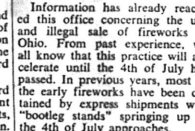

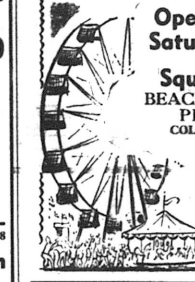
Illegal Use And Sale Of Fireworks
Information has already reached this office concerning the use and illegal sale of fireworks in Ohio. From past experience, we all know that this practice will accelerate until the 4th of July has passed. In previous years, most of the early fireworks have been obtained by express shipments with "bootleg stands" springing up as the 4th of July approaches.

This year, however, we are going to receive some very strong support through a directive issued by the Railway Express Company to its Ohio agencies. They have been instructed that each consignee for a fireworks shipment must present written permission from the fire chief of a city or village or sheriff before delivery can be made. If such written permission cannot be produced, delivery should not be accomplished and

shipment is to be returned to the shipper within forty-eight hours after the arrival at destination. Furthermore, when they receive inquiries from prospective customers as to whether express shipments can be made of fireworks from another state into Ohio, the agents should make it their responsibility to advise them in advance that they must secure permission from the local fire chief or sheriff and be prepared to offer proof of such permission to agents or vehiclemen at the time of delivery.

For the convenience of fire chiefs and sheriffs who do not have a printed form for writing these permits, the Division of State Fire Marshal, Columbus, Ohio, will supply them upon request.

A speedy apprehension of all violators of the Ohio Fireworks Laws will reduce the number of injuries. Let's all work together to bring this about.

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Marvin's MUSINGS

By AL MARVIN

The Detroit Tigers could lose more games this season than any other team in American League history — and so far you can blame the pitchers for the sad situation.

The record for most losses in one season is 117, set by Philadelphia in 1916.

If the Tigers' pitching continues to sag, the club could wipe out that 37-year-old standard.

The Detroiters are a sorry lot, 1916 games out of first place. They've dropped 32 of their first 42 games.

Fred Hutchinson, the skipper, has had to use 114 pitchers, an average of 2.72 a game. If Detroit only had a relief pitcher of some high quality his problem would be solved. Hutch claims he would be five games ahead of the St. Louis Browns, instead of eight games behind them.

Hutch's pitching problems don't end in the bullpen. The starters have left a lot to be desired. Tiger starters have completed only eight of 43 games this season. One game ended in a tie. The Cleveland Indians, for instance, have had 20 games completed by starting hurlers. In addition, Detroit hurlers have served up 35 home runs, compared to 17 for Cleveland. That's one reason why the Indians are second and the Tigers last.

Only one Detroit pitcher has a winning record. That's lefty Billy Hoelt, with a 3-2 mark. The 20-year-old southpaw also is one of two pitchers who have given up fewer hits than innings pitched—supposedly a gauge of a good pitcher. He's yielded 42 hits in 46½ innings.

The other is Ted Gray, also a lefty. He's given up 38 hits in 42½ innings. But his record is won one and lost six. If this pace keeps up they'll be hanging black-bunting on Briggs Stadium come Oct. 1.

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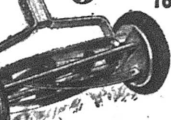

man is very active in the affairs of the First Presbyterian church at Ellettsburg, and here his services are always in demand, for he looks after the "newcomers" and takes care of the "complaints".

A UNIQUE COINCIDENCE

One morning some years ago, Mr. Beelman found a large envelope on his desk addressed to Mr. Beelman, care of The Pump Oil Co., Chicago. Realizing that the gentleman had made a mistake, Hugh Beelman called the office of the oil firm and asked for Mr. Beelman. Starting the conversation Hugh asked the party at the oil company if he were sure his name was Beelman, and if it was, to give a brief history of himself. So, the man started out: "I was born in a little town, Plymouth, Ohio." Hugh reminded his listener by breaking in and saying: "That doesn't mean a thing, for my name is Beelman, and I was also born in a little town, Plymouth, Ohio." It so happened that the gentleman at the oil firm was Harry Beelman, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Beelman, who at that time was advertising manager for the Pure Oil Co. The two men became acquainted and enjoyed numerous pleasant visits.

So that some of our "older" readers may not become confused we'd like to point out that John Beelman was the publisher of The Advertiser prior to those years in which John F. Beelman was editor and publisher. We are presenting a clipping taken from the Advertiser, the edition of November 4th, 1876, which will no doubt recall a lot of familiar names of the past generation or so, and which also reveals a social highlight of the year in the observance of the "Tin Wedding" anniversary of the J. M. Beelmans.

"TIN WEDDING"
"One of the social events of marriage life in Plymouth took place at the residence of J. M. Beelman and wife on Monday evening last, the

occasion being the celebration of the tenth anniversary of their wedding day. The house was filled in all its apartments by the friends and relatives. The ceremonies were conducted by Rev. J. H. Stough, consisting of a short address to them on the nature of the marriage relation, a renewal of their pledges, and congratulations. At the conclusion of this part of the ceremony, Mr. and Mrs. B. took "back seat" and Mr. Kneiff, Brinkhoff and Miss Alice Gregory, who had acted as groomsmen and bridesmaids, took their places and were united in marriage. The look of surprise on some of the guests who did not know what was being done, until all was over was somewhat amusing. All seemed to enjoy themselves, and agree in pronouncing it one of the pleasant events of the season."

To our friends we say, we shall ever regard their presence and presents, as so many tokens of friendship that will remain cherished and sacred, thus making the Tenth Anniversary of our wedding day a social, pleasant and memorable event.—Plymouth Advertiser, November 4, 1876."

After reading of such a colorful affair, it is but fitting to note that Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Beelman celebrated their sixtieth wedding anniversary on December 3, 1952, and from the way they look now it will not be unlikely that they'll observe their seventy-fifth year together.

"Rededicate Ourselves to Preservation", Col. Harrison Tells Memorial Day Crowd

In a brief but thought-filled address before the crowd assembled in the high school auditorium Memorial Day, Lieut. Col. J. P. Harrison, Deputy Commander of the Wilkins Air Force Depot, used Lincoln's Gettysburg Address as his basic text and told the audience that we must rededicate ourselves to the preservation of our freedoms and free enterprise in a conflict that is world-wide.

"Much of the contents of the Gettysburg address are still applicable today," he said. "The second sentence beginning 'Now we are engaged in a great civil war' could be used in its entirety by substituting 'world conflict' for civil war, and completing the sentence, 'testing whether that nation, or any nation so conceived and so dedicated, can long endure.' 'The conflict,' he said, 'is between our system of free enterprise and those governments that insist on government control of our lives. Our battlefields are four-fold all over the world, and we must be ever on the alert for enemies both within and without, seeking to overthrow us. Every private brings with it a corresponding responsibility which none of us should shirk.' The address followed the parade up Main St. and back down Mechanic St. to the schoolhouse, where the music of the pep band, jacketed high school band, which also performed in Shelby in the forenoon and drew many complimentary remarks from witnesses, were told. The blue-clad firing squad of the Ehren-Panzer Post of the American Legion in Plymouth followed the white belted, khaki-clad squad of Garret-Riet Post, behind which came the Legionnaires, Auxiliary, school children, fire trucks, etc.

The program at the school house was presided over by Harrison. Joseph Mock, who presided at the home of the Legionnaires, announced the various numbers on the program. He seems to get more gold and silver medals every year. Mrs. Waldbaus did a fine job singing the National Anthem. Della Lase made her usual splendid delivery of the Declaration of Independence. The high school quartet and band — all performed commendably and are to be congratulated for the parts they played in helping make Memorial Day a success in Shiloh.

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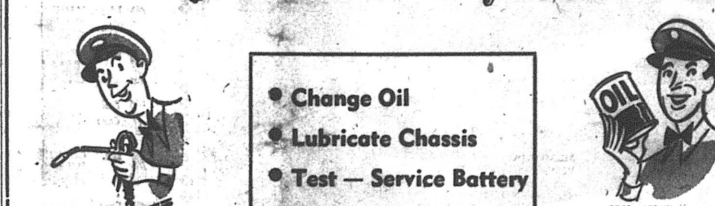

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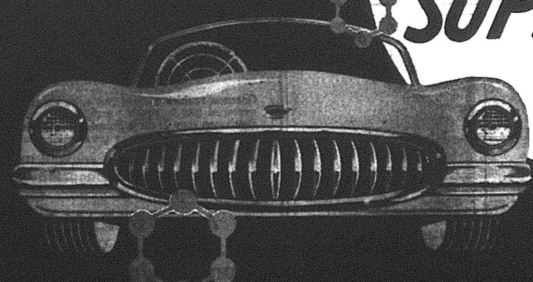
