

REV. L. E. SMITH RETURNED HERE

Rev. L. E. Smith was returned to Plymouth as pastor of the Methodist Church for the sixth consecutive year at the close of the North-east Ohio Conference held this past week at Lakeside, according to an announcement made by Bishop Hazen G. Werner of the Ohio area. Approximately 100 changes in ministerial appointments were made at the close of the 15th annual session.

Sunday afternoon 40 deacons and 19 elders were ordained by Bishop Werner.

Rev. Smith who is also pastor of the Shiloh Methodist Church has been very successful during the past year. In addition to many new members in Plymouth, the completion of the annex was made while Shiloh the complete church was renovated.

In the Norwalk district there were few changes made within the Plymouth area. It was the intention locally to know that Alan J. Davis, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. S. Davis of Rocky River has been assigned to the North-Royan charge. He has just completed his work at Yale Divinity School.

The conference voted to support a huge program of church building and church missions totaling more than \$1,600,000. June, 1953 was the driest June on record at this station (20) years. Total precipitation was only 1.10 inches, a deficiency of 3.84 inches. Light showers fell on only 8 days - the greatest, .29 inch on the 8th. To make matters worse, the sun shown bright and clear on the 10th with 8 partly clear and only 5 cloudy days, so the scanty rainfall was soon absorbed.

The thermometer hit 90 and above on 6 days with a high of 96 on the 20th. The lowest was 46 on the 2nd. The average for the month was 71.4 or 2 degrees above normal.

At the end of the month corn was only about "ankle" high, and soybeans were only about "knee" high. Wheat, which we have a surplus and no place to store it, looks good and about ready for the combine. It was a good month for haying - but everybody doesn't eat hay!

Plymouth Drive-In Theatre Will Open Sunday Night

With the opening of the 400-car Plymouth Drive-In theatre Sunday, the citizenry of Plymouth should be justly proud of the courage and faith Ed Ramsey has in the community. The opening Sunday night climaxes many months of serious and thoughtful planning, and weeks of hard work.

Coming to Plymouth in 1953, right in the middle of the country's worst depression, Ed Ramsey, who had been operating for years by Reuben Deiser until his death, the show house was on the rocks for many months, with promoters taking a crack at local firms that wanted to keep the theatre open.

Following the sad disappointment of those who gave their time and money, and still without a theater, Ed Ramsey came to town. He looked over the situation and took over the theatre. Sure, the going was tough, but Ed Ramsey had the perseverance and patience and the know-how. The theatre was gradually passed away, and so the silent movies. Box office receipts grew when Ramsey installed sound and secured better picture.

The theatre became popular and the town the entertainment it wanted. This was true all over the country. The theatre had revived the picture business. There is no doubt with the combination of gorgeous colors and sound, the film industry exhibitors thrived for more than a decade.

Now, for the past two years, film producers and exhibitors have faced an unusual situation - low movie attendance. Theaters like a cyclone, closing many houses from coast to coast. True, television became widespread almost overnight, and with it spread from coast to coast, theaters became dark. Then, to combat the situation, the "drive-ins" started to sprout.

At the entrance is the colorful marquee with its changeable light and exit ways are illuminated with ten huge individual signs each consisting of six 40-watt night lights. Almost opposite the screen is the box office where cars pass by and receive their tickets. The admission price has been set at 12¢ for adults, and children under 12 at 8¢.

There are twelve ramps or drive-ways on which are located individual speakers mounted on posts. These are the newest design, having two sound channels which give perfect reproduction of voice and music. The speakers are mounted on a soundproofing and can be conveniently hung within the car. There are four hundred speakers on the ground, one for each 40 feet of space. The drive-ways are 40 feet wide, giving ample room for parking.

The mammoth screen, which is especially designed for outdoor movies, is 44 feet wide and 50 feet high. The projection room is some 275 feet from the screen.

The most modern equipment has been installed in the concession building, which is 20 feet wide and 50 feet long. The concessions include two individually refrigerated coke and root beer machines, and a public appeal.

GRADING WAS BIG JOB

With the purchase of a ten-acre tract of land from Dominic Dorio, just on the south-edge of town, the moving equipment rolled in the first of April.

However, heavy rains and inlets of water, which came during April and most of May, which delayed construction. With favorable weather during the latter part of May and most of June, a hardworking crew went into the field in the past few weeks unbelievable progress has been made on the project.

Through Mr. Ramsey's ingenious method of co-ordinating men and material the final stage of completed work was completed without any delay. The theater and grounds are constructed to conform with all state regulations.

The concession building is 24 feet across, the south side is 24 feet across. The area of the grounds, which had to be levelled, was 1024 feet deep. The area was graded with an 18-foot fall to the high end, which will take care of all drainage. The entire field is covered with crushed stone.

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a "orange drink" dispenser. Besides ice cold drinks, the concession will feature hot dogs, candy bars, popcorn and other concessions.

At the rear of the stand there are modern rest room facilities. Above the concession counters are the two huge projection machines with ample room for operators and other equipment. The projection stand is of the latest and most modern design, and can be adapted for third dimension pictures when the demand arises. The concession stand is fireproof and houses all necessary electrical equipment of the theatre. It is finished in green with a green with an orange colored baseboard.

Through the cooperation of materials suppliers, contractors for earth-moving equipment, carpenters, plumbers, electricians and painters, Mr. Ramsey is able to open his show Sunday after several weeks of hard work by everyone involved.

The materials for the theater were furnished by the Willard Woodworking Co., who also supplied the carpentry work under the supervision of Mr. Ramsey. The concession building was built by the Roscoe Hutchinson Co. The building, the bulldozing, Dale Osborne of New Haven was the one who cemented the work. Joe Burrer of Plymouth did an outstanding job of electrical installation. William Wirth and C. O. Osborne engineered the plumbing, while Burr Foraker looked after the sanitation facilities. Bob and Fred Blackford had the huge job of spreading stone all over the place, and Wesley Gardner of New Washington put the finishing touch on with paint.

Mr. Ramsey states the drive-in will feature a double feature every night, with one and one-half shows. The picture will start at dusk, run for two full features, and then come a short feature. He is followed by one feature. He also shows that a good run of films will be shown at all times, with changes being made each week.

One of the reasons for the belief that the Plymouth Drive-in will be a popular spot for several miles around, and that the greatest of community entertainment will be found here. Not only is the theater expected to pull a good crowd, but it is believed that the drive-in will benefit the community by providing a place for the extra crowds attracted to this new and popular entertainment.

Mr. Ramsey's untiring effort to give Plymouth the best; for his faith in the community, and his belief in the drive-in in promoting the success of the drive-in.

We are also happy to announce that with the closing of the drive-in, Mr. Ramsey will reopen the theatre in Plymouth during the winter months. This news is well received by the movie-goers and businessmen of Plymouth.

Guthrie Writes From Alaska

Last Monday we received a very interesting letter and paper from Myron (Bill) Guthrie mailed from Myron, Alaska. Both contain material, we think, of local interest and we are passing much of the letter and excerpts from the paper along to you:

Nome, Alaska, June 22, 1953. "Arrived here last Thursday. Met the line crew that Reynolds is working on and all of us are enroute north."

"Since last Thursday the wind has been blowing in off the Bering Sea, which is still full of ice, and it has been so foggy that no one can get out here just sitting for four days and don't know how many more before it clears. To-night the ice has blown into shore and is a nuisance to boats of your heat and look out the hotel window here and see large chunks of ice."

"This place is just like the stories you read in the books, just unpaved streets, wooden sidewalks, plenty of old time miners and prospectors, mostly all of the population is Eskimo, plenty of local interest and 24 hours of daylight. Reynolds is surely enjoying it up here, and all of us are eating reindeer steaks — no more steaks in the town. I guess they don't know what cows are here. There's just one horse in the place, and it's everyone's pet. Plenty of dogs leading the town."

This week we received a letter from M. C. Guthrie, formerly of Shelby, but who is working up in Alaska who renewed his subscription and sent along cash for the "Air Mail Stamps." He writes:

"We really enjoy getting the paper here and the mail service couldn't be better. We receive the paper here on Saturday, not bad for being mailed from Plymouth on Thursday."

The weather has been perfect with very little rain. An enclosing our weather report for Wednesday, June 3 (Daylight today 18 hrs. 48 min. Sunrise 2:32 a. m. Sunset 9:23 p. m. Temperature yesterday, Max. 76, Min. 45).

Planted our garden on Decoration Day, May 30, and due to the long days with plenty of sunshine, the lettuce, radishes and onions were all up thru the ground yesterday, June 4. However, six miles south of here, on the highway to Seward, you can still see snow banks six and eight feet high on both sides of the road.

The fishing season is just starting. The salmon are coming up the river followed by the rainbow trout. Of course there are plenty of fishermen here also. The best fishing is of course where there aren't any roads and can only be reached by plane.

GASOLINE SUPPLY WILL BE MAINTAINED

If a bomb attack, storm, or other disaster causes an electric power failure in Richland County, the gasoline supply will be maintained to meet the emergency.

This will be accomplished by the old-fashioned method of pumping by hand, Harvey W. Burghard, county Civil Defense director, was informed in a letter from S. A. McHugh, Sun Oil Company's Toledo district manager.

Hand pump assemblies are installed as emergency equipment on one pump at most of the Sunoco service stations in the Richland county area, Mr. McHugh said. In certain areas, Mr. McHugh explained, Civil Defense authorities asked for a list of service stations that could continue to pump gasoline in the event of a power failure due to an atomic attack.

"They feared that without power, their ambulances, fire trucks and other emergency vehicles might be immobilized in the critical hours following a blast, thereby paralyzing rescue and rehabilitation efforts," he added.

Mr. McHugh said Sun officials had been discussing for some time the problem of converting the pumps to meet any emergency power, and that Civil Defense installed in emergency fuel sources caused the company to hurry its plans.

The new pumps are now equipped so that if the power fails they can be switched to hand operation in six to eight minutes by disconnecting the motor and attaching the hand crank. They are ready for trouble, should any trouble ever come.

While the conversion kits are designed for use on Sunoco pumps, the idea can be adapted to other pumps by mechanically-minded station operators, Mr. McHugh reported.

He supplied the Civil Defense office with a list of Sunoco dealers in the area.

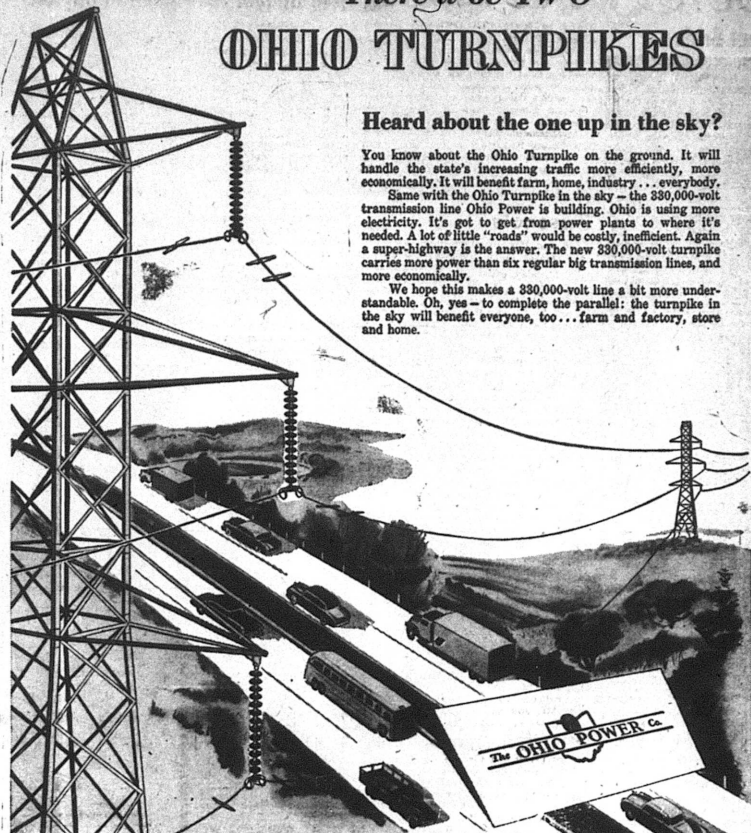

Marvin's MUSINGS

By AL MARVIN

As of Monday night the 29th of June the New York Yankees, who recently missed by one game equaling the American League's longest winning streak, now have a losing streak to crow about.

Dropping their seventh in a row to the Tribe Sunday they have the distinction of owning the longest Yankee losing streak since 1945 when a team managed by Joe McCarthy lost nine straight.

The Yankees never lost more than four in succession while

Bucky Harris guided the club in 1947 and 1948 and they never lost more than five straight in Casey Stengel's first four years at the helm.

In fact, they lost five in a row under Stengel only once. After winning a double bill in Cleveland last July, they dropped two to the Indians and then went to Detroit and lost three straight to the last place Tigers.

Their current streak began a week ago last Sunday when the Tigers beat them in the second game of a double header. The Chicago White Sox came in and swept three straight and the Tribe kept in step with three straight.

The Yankees, once 11½ games ahead of the Indians, now hold a 6-game lead. The Tribe once trail-

ed by 7½ games last season and overcame that deficit in the space of a month.

That "oldie" about the Fourth of July, the league leader at the time and the World Series ahead is upon us again, with July 4 just around the corner.

The American League team holding first place after Fourth of July games, has a big percentage edge favoring its pennant chances.

In 52 American League seasons, the team that held undisturbed possession of first place went on to the pennant, 34 times, as against the 17 times in which clubs with undisturbed possession at the same point failed to take the flag.

In 1938, New York and Cleveland were tied for first place after July 4, with the Yankees going on

to the championship.

Powerhouse New York clubs contribute most of the backing to the old saying about the July 4 leader and the bunting. Fourteen times have the Yank's led on July 5 and also at the end of the season.

The last time in which the top end was crossed up was in 1951, when the Chicks led the Yank's by a half game, but New York eventually took the pennant, five games ahead of second-place Cleveland.

RESERVISTS TRAIN FOR 2 WEEKS AT FT. KNOX; MANY LOCAL MEN LEAVE ON 11TH

Did you know that many Plymouth residents who you know in such capacities as farmers, businessmen, and laborers are also part time soldiers?

The entire complement of the United States Army Reserve unit in Plymouth is made of ordinary citizens, some of whom you see many times a day.

The official name of the Plymouth Army Reserve Unit is Company "A", 865th Aviation Engineer Battalion. It is commanded by Dean Freytag, of RFD 2, Ashland, Ohio, the manager of the Ashland branch of the Capital Finance Corporation. He is known to Uncle Sam as First Lieutenant in the United States Army Reserve.

Every Thursday night he dons his army uniform to attend training meetings of the 865th at the Plymouth American Legion Hall. There he and other Plymouth residents practice administrative and supply procedures necessary to keep an aviation engineer company ready to fly airplanes. If the unit were called to active duty to meet a national emergency, the unit would be prepared to serve the air force in building combat air strips and the roads and buildings necessary to operate them. In time of war these personnel many times risk their lives to defend the construction from enemy guerrilla attacks.

Thus one of Mr. Freytag's primary jobs is to see that his unit gets the very best training possible. Some other Plymouth "Minute Men" are Master Sergeant John C. Sneringer, RD 4, Ashland, who owns and operates Club "42". He is known to the men of the 865th as the first sergeant. Corporal Richard R. Baird, RD 1, Shelby, Ohio is a warehouseman at the Wilkins Air Force Depot, and is assigned the duty of tractor operator in the Army Reserve. Corporal Charles E. Pugh, 64 Portner Street, Plymouth, is a supply clerk in civilian life and construction draftsman in the Army Reserve. Private First Class Dallas Reed, RD 1, Plymouth, Ohio is assigned the duties of supply sergeant in the army reserve and works as a storekeeper in civilian life. Pfc William C. Trauger, Plymouth, O., 23 W. High Street, Plymouth, Ohio works in Distribution at the Wilkins Air Force Depot as a civilian and in the Army Reserve he is known as a Toolroom Keeper. Private First Class Robert Danhoff, 412 Woodbine Street, Willard, Ohio is a heavy truck driver in the Aviation Engineers. His civilian occupation is a mechanic. Sergeant First Class Billy Vanderpool, RD 1, Plymouth, Ohio is a construction supervisor, Corporal Charles F. Goodite, 410 Pearl Street, Willard, Ohio is a personnel management clerk, Corporal Clayton W. Sage, Box 23, Willard, Ohio is a senior carpenter, Corporal James C. Vanbremen, 118 W. 4th, Street, Ashland, Ohio is an assistant truckmaster, and Corporal Donald R. Vanderpool of RFD 1, Plymouth, Ohio, is a heavy truck driver. While these men have had previ-

ous military service, new members may become citizen - soldiers before they serve on active duty. The universal military training and service law of 1951 requires all men now to serve at least two years on active duty with the armed forces and six additional years in the active forces reserves.

Young Plymouth men may begin to serve their six year obligation. Then they may go on active duty as full-fledged soldiers, possibly even with rank, and not as draftees.

Among Korean veterans who have joined a unit to fulfill their reserve obligation is Billy Vanderpool, who holds a sergeant first class rating. Because of his military service in Korea, he has become construction supervisor in the unit.

To keep ready in peacetime to serve America in war, Plymouth's citizen-soldiers attend two weeks summer camp training. Here they get actual experience with field equipment and the running of their battalion. They get a full day's army pay for each day at camp as well as for each weekly meeting. They will go to Fort Knox, Kentucky for two weeks, beginning July 11.

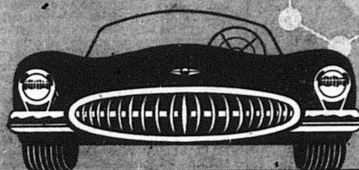
