SEMI-ANNUAL OHIO SALES TAX REPORTS NOW DUE

The Ohio Department of Taxation is reminding vendors that the semi-annual reports for the period ending June 30 must be filed by July 27 to avoid a penalty of \$1 a day.

Joseph E. Skelley, examiner for the district, gives the following information regarding the semi-annual reports:

"Vendors must answer correct-

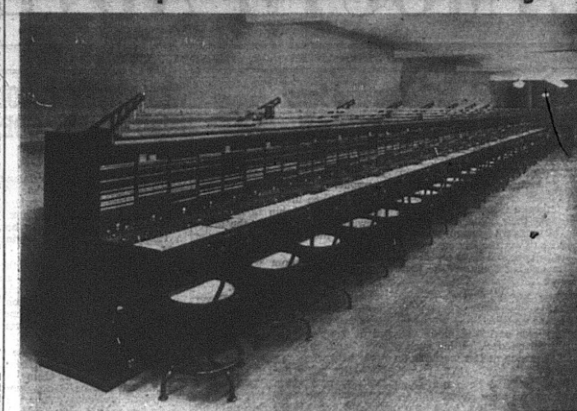
ly all questions appearing on their report blanks sent out recently from the department, including Schedule C which appears on the reverse side. No report is complete without this information. It is suggested that vendors list their stamp purchases (See pink receipts), January 1 to June 30, only. To avoid delay in making up reports, it is also suggested that vendors list said pink receipts prior to contacting the examiner.

Vendors who discontinued business to July 1, 1953, should bring with them the metal plate, as this will be their final report. All persons, firms or corporations to whom a vendor's license was issued prior to July 1, 1953, and are still active are required by law to file a report, regardless of whether or not they have made sales or purchased stamps."

Install New Telephone Switchboard at Norwalk Exchange



\$166,000 Unit Will Boost Available Toll Operators By 50 Per Cent

Shown above is the new toll switchboard which was placed in service at Norwalk, Ohio on July 11, 1953.

This 30 operator position switchboard, largest in operation by Northern Ohio Telephone Company, was installed by Automatic Electric Company of Chicago, Illinois, at a cost of \$166,000. It replaced the 19 position toll switchboard formerly in service and made possible an increase of more than fifty percent in available Toll Operators for the handling of long distance calls. Included in the installation are all of the most modern features including "Key Sending" equipment. Key Sending or "Key Pulsing" equipment replaces the dial on the switchboard with a miniature key board, similar to an adding machine, which allows the Operators to complete calls faster and more accurately. This feature, together with the existing Operator Toll Dialing, will provide the most modern and fastest Long Distance service yet devised. Between 15 and 20 Equipment Engineers from the factory in Chicago worked on the installation since March of this year.

By July 20 there will be added 6 more circuits to Clyde, making a total of 18 between Norwalk and Clyde. At the same time 4 additional circuits will be added to the Huron group, making a total of 15 to that exchange.

Norwalk is the largest toll Center for Northern Ohio Telephone Company, handling Long Distance from Norwalk, Bellevue, Clyde, Willard, Huron, Milan, Monticello, Greenwich, Berlin Heights, Olenia, and Townsend. More than 100,000 toll calls originate from these exchanges each month.

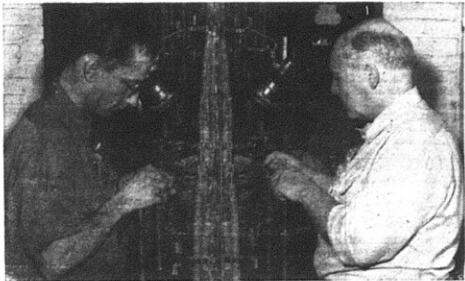
SAVINGS BOND SALE HIGHER IN JUNE

Higher Ohio sales of Series E and H Savings Bonds in June, over the same month last year, showed the state kept pace with the national gain of 28 per cent for the first half of 1953. Avery C. Hand, Chairman, Richland County Savings Bond Committee, revealed today. Sales of E and H Bonds in Richland County were \$194,747

and compare to \$142,125 invested in the two bonds in June, 1952. In Huron County the sale was \$96,978 and compares to \$88,862 invested in 1952.

Six-month total of E and H Bond sales nationally this year reached \$2,231,000,000, for a 28 per cent increase. Ohio sales of the two bonds in the same period reached \$150,933,264, for a dollar gain of \$33,037,115. State purchases last month were \$24,298,283 and compare to \$20,585,853 sold in June, 1952.

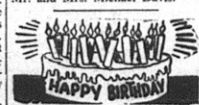

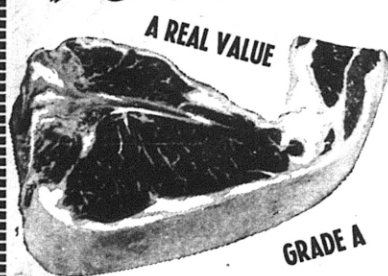
