

Local Boy Injured In Korea In Day Truce Was Signed

It is tragic that many Americans were killed and wounded on Monday, July 27, the day the Korean truce was signed. One Plymouth boy, Joe Lee Kennedy, was seriously injured on that day when he was struck by shrapnel. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Balis Kennedy, received a brief message last Thursday night from the War Department, stating that Joe Lee had been wounded.

Since then the family has received a letter written by Joe Lee's chaplain, stating that the injuries were more serious than at first thought. From meager reports Joe Lee was struck by mortar shrapnel which inflicted wounds in his back, abdomen and his right arm. It was revealed that a tube had to be used from the nose to his stomach, and that his condition is considered grave.

The wounds were no doubt sustained during the heavy bombardment which broke loose on Monday, the day of the truce signing between United Nations forces and the Red Chinese. Joe Lee was standing outside of his tent awaiting for his commander's instructions, when he was wounded.

He entered the service on Jan. 10, 1953, and left for overseas on July 6, 1953, arriving in Korea a short time later. He was a member of a U. S. Tank Corps.

Word received here indicates that he will be rushed by plane to the States at an early date.

Cpl. Wayne L. Mathews, In Korea, Writes On Truce — Wants To Know, "Will It Last?"

First hand information on the signing of the Cease Fire Agreement in Korea was received this week by the Advertiser from a local boy, Cpl. Wayne L. Mathews and his version of it. He asks that it be printed and in his prelude to his note, states he receives his copy of the Advertiser about a month late but enjoys reading it and keeping posted on the happenings around Plymouth.

"To all of my friends in Plymouth, Ohio: This letter is being written on the night of the Cease Fire Agreement in Korea, July 27, 1953 in Camp Casey. This is the place we went to and we pulled off the front lines. It is about a three hour jeep ride from the front and about 20 miles from Seoul.

Today, July 27, 1953, 3 years, 1 month and 3 days after the hostilities began in Korea, they signed an agreement for the Cessation of hostilities. They called it a Truce. Action, but to everyone who is in a front line company, it is a down and outright war. They don't have casualties like they have over here in any type of Police Action. Ever since I've been in this Company (Co. "B" 35th Inf. Reg. 25th Inf. Division), I have seen

many men rotate and many more come in to replace those rotated. But of both types, the Rotates and the Replacements, not one, not a single one knew what he was doing over here or what mission he was to accomplish. But I can say this for those men, they did a darn good job. They put out their best every minute of the time, day or night. "Please accept my regards as I am closing now, so goodbye and good luck for now to each and everyone who is in whatever your endeavor."

Earl McQuate drove the ambulance accompanied by Bob Young and a nurse from the Shelby hospital who fed the youngster oxygen on the trip which was made in 65 minutes.

Howard Shepard, 61, of Shenandoah was killed outright and taken to the Shelby hospital as a result of the accident. Mr. Skelly, 34, sprained ankle, lacerations; Mrs. Skelly, 32, fractures of both arms, wrists and one leg; chest injury and abrasions.

JULY WEATHER

July was almost normal in temperature with an average of 73.6 degrees, or only 8 tenths of a degree above normal. The highest was 95 on the 1st; the lowest 49 on the 4th, 10th, 11th and 25th. Rainfall totaled 5.18 inches, or 1.82 inches above normal. Of this amount 2.56 inches fell in one day — the 22nd — the best soaking rain in many years. Vegetable Growers Will Hold Annual Field Day At Celeryville Tuesday, Aug. 11

Vegetable growers in Ohio's muck crop areas will meet with research workers on Tuesday, August 11, at Celeryville, Ohio, for a field day event and tour of the Muck Crop Substation. Time of the meeting is set for 1:30 p. m. (EST).

Located 3 miles south of Willard on state route 298, the muck crop farms is a research center where horticulture and agronomy experts of the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station cooperate with growers in trying to solve problems common to muck vegetable crops.

Progress made in conservation of muck soil through intercropping will be reported by Don Comin, F. Martin, and Truman Goins, who are also giving a new method of reducing onion tip burn by proper row spacing will also be explained by Comin.

J. P. Slessman, station entomologist, will demonstrate to growers how to use new methods of controlling leaf beetles on potatoes. He will also explain progress made in developing onions resistant to thrip attacks.

Seed and soil treatments, and new fungicide-insecticide materials will be subjects discussed and demonstrated by J. B. Wilson, experiment station pathologist.

E. K. Alban and W. N. Brown, of Columbus, plan to show growers results of their work on vegetable fertilizer rates and weed control methods.

General chairman of the field day is John K. Wells, Huron County Agent. Wells has announced that the day will be held at Celeryville, Ohio, for Mr. and Mrs. William Van Horn, Jr., and their two year old daughter Lynn Sue.

Ted Williams came back from the wars, July 29, and threw old Boston into a frenzy.

Thousands of fans — 25,000 to be exact — poured into Fenway Park to pay tribute to the only .400 hitter still active as a player and when they spotted the tall handsome Williams in Red Sox uniform for the first time since April 30, 1952, they rose in a body and cheered him.

Williams, smiling broadly, his grin was not put on for the benefit of newsreel cameramen. He was home, back in Fenway Park, where he has delighted millions of fans since 1939.

Dozens of cameramen and reporters swarmed around Williams and hundreds of early arrivals at Fenway Park camped around the parking space outside the dressing room for a glimpse of him.

Ted didn't intentionally try to duck the big crowd, but his first thought upon his arrival in Boston was to visit with owner Tom Yawkey and general manager Joe Cronin and as a result he failed to meet his many well-wishers.

While visiting with his bosses, Ted signed a contract for the remainder of this season and all of 1954.

It required only seconds to complete the signing. Ted was believed to have signed for the same \$90,000 he received when he went into the Marine Corps as a jet pilot.

Williams exchanged greetings with his teammates, and the first thing anyone knew he was in the dugout, garbed in his familiar No. 9 flannels.

At first he didn't leave the dugout. Fans realized he was back when they saw the battery of cameramen in front of the enclosure.

Ted then received a cheer. Fans craned their necks for a look and a platoon of Boston policemen made their way to the field to prevent fans from mobbing the dugout.

Williams gradually made his way out of the dugout and stood on the top step, swinging a bat for the fans.

That's when the crowd of 25,000 went berserk. The tribute they paid him had a profound effect upon the slugger. There wasn't a boo to be heard.

Ted was back. Could he boost the Red Sox to a pennant? That was the question. But even if he didn't, it was like old times having him back.

Here is Vital Information For Wheat Farmers Who Vote On Friday, August 14

Through the courtesy of the Plymouth Elevator and the Toledo Board of Trade we are able to pass this information on wheat control to all farmers in this area—The Ed.

The Secretary of Agriculture must proclaim wheat marketing quotas when the estimated total supply of wheat exceeds the normal supply by more than 20 percent. The estimates on July 1, were:

Million Bushels
Normal supply 1,156
Estimated carry over of old wheat, 1953 580
Estimated 1953 production (June 10 crop report) 1,132
Estimated 1953-54 imports 5
Estimated total supply for year beginning July 1, 1953 1,717

The estimated total supply (1,717 million) exceeded the normal supply (1,156 million) by about 48 percent. Since then the estimates of the total supply have gone up. The July 10 crop report indicates a 1953 wheat crop of 1,175 million bushels, raising the indicated total supply to 1,760 million bushels—more than 50 percent above the "normal" supply.

2—How much is the national wheat acreage allotment for the 1954 crop?
The national acreage allotment for the 1954 crop is 62 million acres. This is the minimum national allotment provided under the legislation as amended July 14.

3—How is the farm allotment determined?
The national acreage allotment is apportioned among States and counties according to the acreage seeded to wheat during the latest 10-year period, adjusted for trends and other factors.

The county allotment is divided among farms, based on past wheat acreage, tillable acres in each farm, crop-rotation practices, type of soil, and topography.

4—What is the wheat marketing

quota for a farm?

When the wheat acreage on the farm does not exceed the farm wheat acreage allotment, the marketing quota is all wheat produced on the farm. When the wheat acreage on the farm is more than the farm wheat acreage allotment, the farm marketing excess is figured as indicated in question 12. The balance is the quota for the farm.

5—How is the wheat marketing quota put into operation?

The Secretary of Agriculture must proclaim wheat marketing quotas when the estimated total supply exceeds the normal supply by more than 20 percent. (See question 1.) The quota proclamation for the 1954 wheat crop was made July 1, 1953. The program will be in effect unless disapproved by more than one-third of the wheat growers voting in the referendum to be held August 14. (See question 18.)

6—What will the price support be if marketing quotas are in effect for the 1954 wheat crop?

A price support loan at 90 percent of parity will be available to the farmer who does not exceed the wheat acreage allotment for his farm.

7—What if wheat marketing quotas are disapproved in the referendum?

The price support loan available to the farmer who does not exceed the wheat allotment for his farm will be 50 percent of parity.

8—How will the wheat marketing be held?

The referendum will be held by community referendum committee appointed by County Production and Marketing Administration Committees, at announced voting places where wheat is produced.

9—Who can vote in the referendum?

Each wheat farmer on a farm which is subject to quota and who has a share in the wheat crop is eligible to vote in the referendum. Any wheat farmer who will plant

for harvest in 1954 more than 15 acres of wheat on his farm is eligible to vote in the referendum. The farmer who is in doubt as to his eligibility to vote should see his County PMA Committee.

10—What farms are exempt from wheat marketing quotas?

Farms on which the wheat acreage is 15 acres or less; and farms on which the normal production of the acreage planted to wheat is less than 200 bushels.

11—What is "wheat acreage" as used in this program?

Any acreage seeded to wheat and any acreage of volunteer wheat which may reach maturity. In certain designated counties wheat mixtures and wheat seeded for use as green manure, cover crop, or hay, are not regarded as "wheat acreage."

12—What is the "farm marketing

The farm marketing excess is determined by multiplying the excess wheat acreage by the normal wheat price for the year. If the producer can prove to the county committee that the actual yield per acre of wheat is less than the normal yield per acre, the farm marketing excess may be adjusted downward. Excess wheat is subject to a penalty.

13—What is the amount of the penalty?

The penalty on excess wheat will be 45 percent of the wheat parity price as of May 1, 1954. The dollar-and-cents amount of course, will depend on the parity level at that time. The wheat parity price on May 1, 1953, was \$2.43 per bushel.

14—What can the producer do with wheat classed as his "farm marketing excess?"

A producer can pay the penalty and market the excess wheat; or he can avoid or postpone the penalty by withholding the excess wheat from the market, either by storing it or by delivering it to the Secretary of Agriculture for relief use or diversion, under regulations established by the Secretary.

15—After the producer has fulfilled one of the above requirements, can he market the rest of his wheat without penalty?

Yes. In the administration of quotas, marketing cards are issued to identify penalty-free wheat. After the producer has met the requirements on excess wheat as indicated in question 14, he will receive

ceive a marketing card as evidence that no penalty is due.

16—What about excess wheat used to feed livestock or poultry on the farm?

Excess wheat which is fed on the farm is subject to the penalty. 17—When quotas are in effect, may the farmer appeal if he believes his acreage allotment is not accurate?

Yes. Any farmer may ask for a review within 15 days after the date his notice of allotment is mailed by the county committee. A review committee of three farmers, appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture, will review the evidence and make a decision. If the farmer is not satisfied with the review, he may, within 15 days, institute proceedings for a court review of his case.

18—Can marketing quotas be suspended after they are approved in the referendum?

Yes. The Secretary of Agriculture is directed to increase or suspend wheat marketing quotas at any time in the event of a national emergency or increase in export demand. The Secretary must suspend marketing quotas if the July or August 1954 crop estimate of the 1954 wheat crop is below specified requirements.

19—In answer to other questions, see your county production and marketing administration committee.

The theme for this reading group was "Ohio Frontier Days," and the readers represented the Pioneers, in contrast to the younger group's Indian tribes.

There are going to be 13 special awards this year, besides the Certificates, for those who have been club members every year. After a student has completed three year's programs successfully, he is given a book of his choice for his own home library. Besides the many three-year awards next week, there will be one six-year award, for Bill Buchrach, and one nine-year award, for Georgianna Pizzen.
