LET'S EXPLORE OHIO



The group of mounds and earthworks at Newark are among the 10,000 or more evidences left in Ohio by the prehistoric Indians known as the Mound Builders. Today the Ohio State Archaeological and Historical Society maintains a public park of 138 acres including the remains of the original works which have survived to this day.
Visitors from all over the world have journeyed to Newark to see these earthworks. The great circle encloses some 25 acres with a wall from eight to fourteen feet in height. In the center of this circular earthwork is an earthen reproduction of a bird with outspread wings. The large octagonal earthworks is connected with a small circular enclosure by parallel walls.
