

Village Winds Up Year In Good Financial Shape

Tuesday night of last week Mayor Glenn West and members of Village Council met for the first session of the new year. Mayor West gave oath of office to the members, which was followed by routine business and several important discussions. Those councilmen, who were elected last Fall, and who took office were: Benjamin Smith, Lawrence Cornell, Elmer Markley, Omar Burkett, Thomas Root, and Royal Eckstein. Markley was the only one that had not served the previous term on council.

In making up his list of committees, Mayor West made the following appointments which were approved:

- Finance: Smith and Root.
- Fire and Police: Smith and Cornell.
- Light and Water: Eckstein and Markley.
- Sanitation: Burkett and Markley.
- Street Dept.: Burkett and Markley.

Building: Eckstein and Root. Endowment: Root and Cornell. Cemetery: Burkett and Eckstein. Rest Room: Smith and Cornell. Two additional appointments were made by Mayor West. Miles Christian, who has served on the cemetery board, was reappointed as a member of the board. Luther Fetter, a member of the Mary Fette Park Board, was reappointed to succeed himself.

During the war and the succeeding years following, Plymouth's village government has done a good job in administering fire and police protection as well as keeping up the streets and alleys. It must be remembered that the village has no income other than through taxes with a possible exception of one or two mill operating levy. And with rising costs in labor and material the past few years most local governments could barely keep their head above water. Facing the same problems in the same period of time, our own village of officials have managed to maintain the same services and according to a report read at the last council meeting, Plymouth goes into the new year in a very good financial condition. 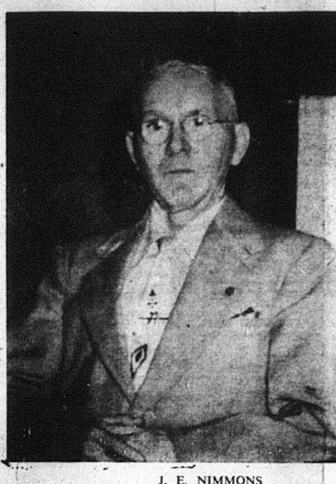

History Of Bank

Following the dinner Carl Loffland acted as master of ceremonies, and he gave a very interesting outline of the fifty years of the Peoples National Bank of Plymouth, Ohio, was signed by H. J. Wilment, R. H. Nimmons, R. G. Guthrie, H. B. Silliman, Moses Blitstein, and was endorsed by the Honorable W. W. Skiles, Shelby. It was sent to the Comptroller of the Currency on October 24, 1903, and the Charter was granted Nov. 14, 1903.

The bank opened with a capital of \$25,000 and when it merged with the old First National Bank on October 1, 1908, the capital stock was increased to \$50,000.

In going back over the history of the bank, Mr. Loffland read off the list of names that made up the original stockholders of the bank.

Rev. Paul Mumford Submits Resignation At Sunday Meeting

After four and one-half successful years in ministerial work in Plymouth, as pastor of the Lutheran Church, Rev. Paul Mumford submitted his resignation Sunday at the annual congregational meeting following the morning worship service.

His resignation becomes effective Feb. 14th when he will go to an area east of Lorain to organize a Lutheran Church. Located in a fast growing suburb, considerably larger than Plymouth, there is a great need for a church and since Rev. Mumford has had previous experience in mission work, felt it was an opportunity not to be turned down, and consequently accepted the call.

As soon as housing is available, Rev. Mumford, wife and daughter will move their household goods. Rev. Mumford came to Plymouth Sept. 1, 1949 from Crest Lutheran Church at Turtle Creek, Pa., where he had served as pastor for over 2 1/2 years. Prior to that time he organized and was pastor of the Immanuel Church in Erie, Pa., from 1940 through December 1946.

During Rev. Mumford's pastorate here, the Lutheran Church has enjoyed one of its greatest eras of prosperity, not only financially, but in membership and activities for many years, and it is with real regret that not only members of his congregation but town folks see him go. During his residence in Plymouth, Rev. Mumford has taken an active part in civic affairs, and has been a member of the Community Club as president several years ago.

Best wishes of the community will be extended to him and his family in their new field of work and we will be interested in his growth and development of his church.

Aliens Must Register During January

District Director Arthur J. Karnuth, of the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service for this area, announced today that the Immigration and Nationality Act requires that all aliens in the United States, with the exception of diplomats and foreign officials, must report their current address to the Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization during the month of January. In cases of alien children under 14, or aliens who are mentally or physically unable to make their own reports, such reports must be made by the parents or guardian. Reports must be made regardless of whether the alien has changed his address in the past year.

To report, an alien should take his Alien Registration Receipt and go to the nearest United States Post Office or United States Immigration Office.

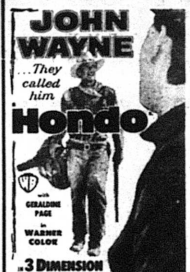

A picture of Mrs. Dan Bevier appeared on the front page of the Wellington paper last week in her half of the Polio campaign this month.

Mrs. Bevier is one of two Wellington polio victims in 1953, who was stricken on Sept. 28, just eight weeks after her second son, Greg, was born.

Critically ill for two weeks, she then began to respond to drugs and treatment, and returned to Wellington late in November. She since has been able to move about with the aid of a cane. Special treatment is being continued three times weekly at Gates hospital in Ellettsville.

In the picture, Mrs. Bevier was shown with some of the handling on which she kept herself occupied during a nine week confinement in Lakeside hospital, recuperating from the serious effects of infantile paralysis.

Her husband, Dan, is a grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. John I. Beelman of Plymouth.

"Small Business" Favored By Shelby Air Depot

Participation in the Air Force Procurement program by small business firms has increased 35 per cent in the first four months of fiscal year 1954 over the same period last year.

Wilkins Air Force Depot said today that from July 1 to November 1, 1953, The Directorate of Procurement, Wilkins Air Force Depot, has awarded \$5,696,776 in contracts to small business. The Government classifies as small business any firm employing fewer than 500 persons.

Of the \$5,696,776, valuation of contracts awarded by Wilkins Air Force Depot, prime contracts accounted for \$4,655,122, a 82.97, 638 average for the 19 contracts awarded. The rest, amounting to more than \$44,654, was divided among 227 small purchase orders for housekeeping items, averaging \$183 each.

A check on September 1 of the approximately 4,000 plants producing material for the Air Force showed that two-thirds of them were owned and operated by independent small business concerns. These plants are located in all 48 states and the District of Columbia.

Maj. Gen. David H. Baker, Director of Procurement and Production, Headquarters, Air Material Command, said, "One of the major factors contributing to the successful operation of the small business program has been the decentralization of procurement of commodities applicable to small business concerns."

He continued, "The intense Air Force small business program, now in its third year of operation, has aided and advised small businessmen throughout the country in becoming successful Air Force contractors and sub-contractors. It has been due to the exemplary manner in which this very vital program has been executed that Government procurement and small business have derived the mutual benefits which are so necessary to build our great Air Force."

AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, AUTHORIZING THE EXPENDITURES OF SIXTY-SEVEN HUNDRED AND TWENTY-NINE DOLLARS AND SIXTY-SEVEN CENTS FOR A POLICE CRUISER AND APPROPRIATING FUNDS FOR THE SAME.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT: SECTION 1. The Mayor and the Clerk are hereby authorized to enter a contract for the purchase of a police cruiser and the Clerk is authorized and directed to issue a voucher in the amount of Sixteen Hundred and Twenty-Nine Dollars and Sixty-seven Cents (\$1629.67) for the purchase of the same, and the said sum is hereby appropriated for that purpose.

SECTION 2. This Ordinance is an emergency measure necessary for immediate preservation of the public peace, health welfare and safety, and shall go into effect immediately. The reason for this emergency is that the provisions of this Ordinance are necessary to obtain a police cruiser for the Police Department for the protection of lives and property of the citizens of the Village of Plymouth.
