20 Century Circle Discusses Religion

Mrs. Grace Brown was hostess Monday evening to members of the Twentieth Century Circle.

Mrs. Marian Ruth Cashman, president, presided for a short business meeting before the program, "What Others Believe."

Mrs. Robert Haas gave a very interesting paper on the Mormons (the name popularly applied to the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter Day Saints). Joseph Smith was the founder of Mormonism, and at the early age of 15 (1820) he received his first heavenly manifestation. Other visions followed including those which revealed to him the "Book of Mormon" (Record of the Early Inhabitants of America), first published to the world in 1830. From the English version, translations have been made into fifteen other languages.

The first church was organized at Fayette, N. Y., with six members. A Mormon temple at Kirtland, Ohio, was built in 1836 and is still in use today.

Following trouble with non-Mormons Joseph Smith was killed in 1844. Later, led by a new leader, Brigham Young, the Mormons traveled west to settle in the valley of the great Salt Lake, Utah. From the beginning the growth of the church has been rapid and steady in spite of the ridicule and persecution to which it was subjected. The Mormon church has grown to a membership of over one million, one hundred and eleven thousand in 1950, with headquarters in Salt Lake City, Utah.

The theology of Mormonism was also summarized by Mrs. Haas as she gave the Articles of Faith of their church and she pointed out that no mention of polygamy was mentioned in their Articles of Faith.

The re-organized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints was started in 1852 with headquarters at Independence, Mo., and it has grown to a membership of about 150,000 in 1950 and does not wish to be called "Mormons." The Quakers

Mrs. Earnest's interesting paper was on the Society of Friends or better known as the Quakers, a religious organization founded by George Fox, (son of a weaver) who started first by travel ministry. She told of the Quakers, known as friends of the truth, with a strong and deep belief in fellowship of the Spirit.

The Quakers have no ordained clergymen. Services are held in churches with no steeple, and their services have no ritual, music, and they believe in silence. The church has no converts and to become a member one must have a formal request. They have no form of baptism, weddings are very simple and they do not believe in divorces.

The plain clothes of the early Quakers have somewhat disappeared. They are among the conscientious objectors considering war opposed to the spirit of Christ. They were among the early opponents to human slavery and refuse to swear to oaths.

Christian Scientists
Christians Scientists was the interesting subject prepared by Mrs. McIntyre.

She told of the founder, Mary Baker Eddy, born 1821, on a farm near Concord, N. H., as being a beautiful but delicate child, very thoughtful, well educated and deeply religious. In distress of mind and body she turned to the Bible for consolation.

In 1866 after an injury and near death, she turned to her Bible, which led to the discovery of the Principle of Christian Science, and she recovered in a seemingly miraculous manner.

Then followed profound thought and study of the Scriptures, resulting in her first published book, Science and Health, in 1870. In 1896 the first Christian Science Association was formed with Mrs. Eddy as teacher and a few years later the first church called the "Mother Church" was founded in Boston, Mass. At the age of 87 she founded the paper, Christian Science Monitor, which is widely read today.

This religion teaches that all cause and effect is mental and that sin, sickness and death will be destroyed by a full understanding of the Divine Principle of Jesus' teaching and healing.

Roll call with assignment topics was given and the meeting adjourned to meet in two weeks with Mrs. H. Fackler.

SHILOH SEEKS POSTMASTER THRU CIVIL SERVICE

An examination for Postmaster at Shiloh, Ohio, \$4028 a year, under revised and more exacting eligibility requirements agreed upon by the U. S. Civil Service Commission and the Post Office Department will be open for receipt of applications until Feb. 16, 1954, the Commission announced today.

The position of Shiloh postmaster was left vacant with the death of David Bushny. Shiloh is a third class postoffice.

Competitors for the postmaster vacancy must show that they can deal with the public agreeably and effectively and that they are reliable citizens who would command the respect and confidence of patrons of the post office. They must also show that their background enable them to maintain simple records of accounts or that it has given them a knowledge of postal procedures.

Applicants must take a written test. Those who pass will be assigned final ratings on the basis of this test and their experience, ability, and character. There is a 1-year residence requirement and applicants must be at least 21 years of age and must not have passed their sixtieth birthday.

Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the post office for which this examination is being announced. Application forms must be received in the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C. not later than the closing date.
