

F-R-H Sales Convention Sees New 5-Ton Locomotive

The Fate-Root-Heath Co. invited its sales representatives from a dozen states to Mansfield and Plymouth last week for a look at a small diesel-driven mining locomotive.

The small five-ton machine, which has been on the drawing board at F-R-H since Nov. 2, 1953, was built to meet a need in gas-filled mining shafts. Unveiled before sales representatives like Larry Beattie of Philadelphia, who has dealt in Plymouth locomotives for three decades, the new mine locomotive made a big hit.

The sales conference was the second, the last one was in October, 1952 and was called by Fate-Root-Heath to lay plans for a campaign that will cope with specialized needs for industrial locomotives in the post-Korea market. Executives of the company pre-

sented the meeting "a success so far, but we won't know until the orders come in just how much of a success it was."

The conference opened at the Mansfield Leland hotel Oct. 4 with 37 sales and export representatives and guests, including R. S. James of the U. S. Bureau of the Mines, on hand to hear lectures on the techniques of selling and technical talks on the properties and potentials of Plymouth locomotives.

Experts sent by suppliers of integral parts of Plymouth locomotives were on hand to discuss their equipment. Caterpillar Engine Co., Buda Company, Cummins Engine Co., Fuller Manufacturing Co., Hercules Motors Corp., International Harvester, Twin Disc Clutch Co., Allison Division, General Motors Corp., Detroit Diesel Division, General Motors Corp., Westinghouse Air Brake Co., and F-R-H had a staff of its own experts ready to conduct detailed classes and answer questions. F-R-H employees who participated included Roy J. Johnson, sales manager; G. Lyle Grabach, assistant sales manager; Ivadale A. Good, Norman McQuinn, Karl Lindauer, Stanley Shaver, Vance Snyder, Robert Haas, Glenn Mackey, Emerson Shields, Kenneth Place, John Dick, Joseph Balzert, Walter Donnenwerth, Roy Carter, Kenneth McDougal, Clarence Donnerwerth, Donald Markley, J. Phillips Moore, F. B. Carter, Francis Guthrie, Madison Frick, Rolfe Van Wagner, George Henshner, Jack High, Luther R. Fettes Francis Miller, and Madeleine Smith.

The roots also took part: John A., president, P. H. Root, vice president, H. F. Root, secretary, W. E. Root, John F., H. James Thomas Paul, and Bob as did general manager and Miles S. Christian.

For many, the highlight of the meeting was Monday's banquet, which was a real success. The representative, opened the evening by introducing "our venerable and beloved president, who has treated me so squarely these 30 years, John A. Root." Mr. Root responded briefly and R. A. Sanction, representing F. H. Hopkins & Co., Ltd., of Montreal, a comical fellow with a very dry wit and a style reminiscent of Groucho Marx, assumed responsibility for the music program. Were he not a success in business, Mr. Sanction could very well make a good living on the stage. Assisting Mr. Sanction, Emiline Christian played the accordion and Marie Guthrie played the electric organ and Lawrence Manning Jr., of Atlanta, Ga., played the month organ.

Fun-wise, the evening were ideally arranged. Business-wise, the eyes were on the Model FMD (F is the symbol assigned in the shop, MD meaning mine diesel) locomotive which has been the "baby" of Donald Markley and Madison Fitch for nearly a year. It measures 50 x 50 by 115 inches, and it puts out 48 horsepower, and it is a neat and tidy little package for a special job that the F-R-H management hopes will see on mine-lands in the months to come.

Competitively, it faces opposition of a storage battery and trolley locomotives that sell for more. The Bureau of Mines is testing the Model F. M. D. to overcome the presumption that it might be dangerous in gas-filled mines, and the signs are, Mr. James, the Bureau's representative, told the meeting, that it will succeed.

Cesspool-Septic Tank In Lieu of New Sewer Said 'Unsuitable'

The installation of individual septic tanks at Plymouth will not satisfy the requirements of the Ohio Water Pollution Control Board, it was revealed today.

Homer Knox, principal assistant sanitary engineer of the state health department, notified The Advertiser that his headquarters considers such a solution unsatisfactory. Further, he said, "the property owner would do much better to share in the cost of a publicly owned sanitary sewerage system than to attempt to dispose of the sewage from his property by a septic tank which is certain to become offensive and unsatisfactory."

The Advertiser made inquiry in response to a number of verbal and written inquiries suggesting unfairness in coverage of news developments in connection with the proposed \$125,000 bond issue. Their gist was that a septic tank-cess pool arrangement would be suitable, satisfactory, less expensive, and equally effective.

To determine the fairness of these statements, the Advertiser applied to Columbus for clarification. Mr. Knox's detailed reply was received today.

This department probably received a number of complaints regarding nuisances caused by the discharge of the effluents from septic tanks to storm sewers, small streams and roadside ditches than from any other cause," Mr. Knox said.

"A septic tank is intended to remove the solids from sewage and to liquify the solids. The effluent from a septic tank is a dark, foul-smelling liquid. Its discharge into a storm sewer causes foul odors from the catch basins and manholes on the storm sewer, and of course causes pollution of the ditch into which the storm sewer discharges.

"There is not sufficient area on the ordinary lot in a village to permit the installation of a leaching field to receive the effluent from a septic tank. With the impervious soil encountered in most localities, leaching devices soon become ineffectual and overflow rises to the ground surface."

Septic tanks with or without leaching devices are expensive, Mr. Knox said.

This information is not new to the village council, but it is the first time the council has had the official viewpoint in writing. Meanwhile, Mayor Glenn West was busy this week preparing for the public meeting to be held in the elementary school Thursday at 8 p.m.

Board of Education Ups Clerk's Salary; Cafeteria Said Cause

Plymouth Board of Education raised the salary of its clerk by \$20 a month Tuesday night, bringing his stipend to \$100 monthly, retroactive to Oct. 1.

Additional bookkeeping brought on by the opening of the new cafeteria was cited as the reason for the raise.

In other action, the Board read a communication from the Huron county sanitarian with respect to the school buildings operated by the school district.

"First of all, may we compliment your board and the people of Plymouth on the addition to your grade school, just completed. Your high school building is in apparent good condition. Lighting in some rooms is still inadequate, Mr. Coon informs us that the school board survey made recently and that as funds are available new fixtures are being installed.

"Decor is not modern. If you find it impossible financially to replace them, we suggest that the old dark finish be removed from the tops and that they be refinished in a dull natural finish.

"If it has not already been done, a schedule should be set up to repair and paint or clean all plastered walls regularly a few rooms each year, so that the building will always be in good condition."

"Our general impression of the housekeeping in both schools is good. Everything was clean and orderly.

"Your kitchen facilities in the new addition are ideal. All surfaces from floor to ceiling are easily cleanable. We particularly like the planning of the kitchen because the food preparation, storage, dishwashing, and serving areas are separated in such a way that there is a minimum of traffic between the areas."

Shop Cuts Work To 32-hour Week

Because orders are only 34 per cent of what they were last year at this time, the Fate-Root-Heath Co. will cut back to a 32-hour work week commencing tomorrow.

The cutback is indefinite in nature, company officials said, and is entirely because of economy reasons. The company after consultation with union officers determined the policy of reducing the work week by eight hours for all except engineering employees, who will now work a 45-hour week for all employees in lieu of furloughing junior workers.

A fortnight ago, F-R-H furloughed about 20 employees who were well in seniority. By the terms of union contract F-R-H is required to furlough those employees with less than a year's seniority first. This provision could not be utilized in the present instance, the company says, because all low seniority men had already been furloughed.

The company hopes, officials said yesterday, "that this cutback will be of short duration, but we do not wish to gloss over the facts, which are that business right now is less than what it was a year ago, and for the sake of economy we are reducing the work week to 32 hours effective Friday."

Amid reports that disposal of the Silver King tractor line to a Clark, W. Va., firm during the summer had something to do with the cutback the company said that only a combination of unforeseen circumstances makes this partly true, as of now.

The purchaser of the Silver King line has been struck since July 12. Orders for castings which the company would normally make for F-R-H have been held in limbo for this reason, F-R-H officials said, and when the strike is settled, orders should recommence.

Adjustment to economic conditions in our business comes slower than in other trades," a company officer said, "and for this reason our adjustment happens now. Whereas other lines have been there on the way back to full production. We have every reason to hope that this will occur with us, and for the sake of economy we are reducing the work week to 32 hours temporary only. However, we want to be honest with our staff and we are telling our employees that the cutback is indefinite in nature."

Pilgrims Meet Lodi In Last Home Game

Hoping to regain stature from what threatens to be a dismal season, Plymouth's Pilgrims close their home schedule here tomorrow night against Lodi's Tigers under the lights of Mary Fete park.

The Tigers have yet to win a game, and the experts look for an evenly matched contest. If there is an advantage, it falls to the Pilgrims' account. The Red and White lost to Buckeye local 32 to 0 in the opening game of the season, whereas Lodi took a 61 to 0 pasting.

Coach Fred Kreutzfeldt has been experimenting with younger players over the past two weeks, and it is likely that a number of combinations will see service behind the line. The Pilgrims will probably start John Fox and Ed Taylor at the ends, with Franklin Eckstein and Francis Doran at tackles. Bud Berberick, who will wear a face mask, and Mickey Harrison will get the call at guards, and Jim Jacobs will be at center.

In the backfield, Ottis Port will start at tailback, with Jimmy Hunt calling the signals at quarter, John Fetters at fullback and Tom Marvin at wingback.

There is some confidence in the Plymouth camp. The feeling that the worst part of the season is over has generated this week. If the Pilgrims can deliver Lodi a good thrumping, optimism for a victory over Wakarusa will run high. Seville, the final opponent of the season, had an easy time with the Tigers with an eleven that is admittedly very weak.

The Lodi Tigers are "pointing for Plymouth" this Friday night at the Pilgrims field. According to Lodi fans, the contest should prove to be more on an equal basis than have the Tigers' other fays.

Lodi has not chalked up a single victory this season - - - and time is running out. The first four games of the year proved strictly lopsided affairs, with the Tigers showing little roar and manicured claws.

In the opener of the year, Coach Ted Herrick's eleven was beaten by Wakarusa to the tune of 14-0. This was Herrick's first game as Lodi's coach. The 25-year-old grid member was discharged from the army last spring. He is a native of Twinsburg and formerly coached at that suburb's high school.

The Tigers were badly trounced in their second game, one that saw Highland roll over Lodi in racking up a 40-7 win.

Next on Lodi's schedule was Buckeye, a strong club that had little difficulty in piling up 64 points, as Lodi failed to score a single point in the uneven contest.

Friday night was homecoming night at Lodi's home field - - - and once again the Tigers proved no match for their opposition. A "just fair" Seville team rolled over Lodi in compiling 33 points. The Tigers managed to score a solitary touchdown that saved them from being victims of another shut out.

Herrick has announced that he will shuffle his lineup against Plymouth. It is believed that he may start some of his freshmen, rather than varsity players in his winged T-shirt.

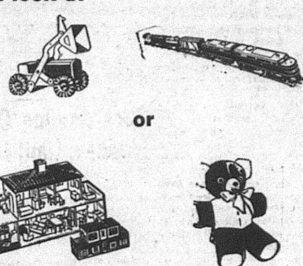

Duck Hunting Opens Monday; Limit Four

Got your duck stamp yet? Waterfowl hunting season opens officially Monday at 12 noon, and it continues until sunset Dec. 11. After the first day, you can start shooting half an hour before sunrise.

Daily bag limits are four ducks, not to include more than one hooded merganser. Wood ducks cannot be hunted this year. The possession limit on ducks is eight. On geese, the daily limit is five, the possession maximum also five, and mergansers - fish ducks - taken this season must be counted in the daily bag limit of four ducks, and also in the possession limit of eight ducks.

Stamps cost \$2 and can be bought at any U. S. post office. Any person over the age of 16 who hunts waterfowl must be in possession of a waterfowl stamp. Postmaster, Claude E. Sourwine has a stock of the stamps, and will accommodate hunters during business hours.

For McGregor and Baumhart

The Honorable J. Harry McGregor, representative to Congress from the 17th Ohio district, is a candidate for re-election. We see no reason why he should be turned out. He has done very well. Some of his achievements would, in other times, qualify him for greatness. The work on the roads and on standby legislation to take up unemployment slack if times worsen - and that is what the installment - buying plan of building federal structures really is - are a great credit to him, and to this district.

We understand that some dyed-in-the-wool voters are a bit sour on Mr. McGregor because he doesn't change the wheat marketing quota regulations. It does no good to tell these fellows that Mr. McGregor can't change them, that it takes a great many more representatives in Congress to do that, and that the administration isn't of a mind to change them, anyway. The only answer to these idle arguments is to turn out at the polls and vote for Harry McGregor. He deserves a vote, he has done well, and besides, he is a prince of a fellow in the bargain.

Which brings us to the contest in the 13th district. A. D. Baumhart, Jr., of Vermilion, who has been on the Republican National committee in high office, is the Republican candidate. He has had a wonderful opportunity to do things for his district. If they have not been done, it is not entirely his fault. When a man is in Washington, he can learn about what's needed only if the people back home keep him informed. We are not sure that they have done that.

We recommend a vote for Dave Baumhart. And once we've elected him, let's keep him informed, and he will work for us to get the things we want, we want, and have a right to have.

The Mills of Justice Grind Finely

The mills of justice grind slowly, but they grind exceeding fine. We should have remembered that fact when we got so excited a few months ago on the subject of Senator McCarthy.

It is certain he will be brought to book now. Senators of his own party, who are notoriously pro-Joe, voted unanimously to censure the junior Senator from Wisconsin on two points, the insulting refusal to file financial data with a sub-committee, and his treatment of General Zwicker.

This newspaper tries to avoid comment on national issues. First, because it thinks its readers do not rely upon its columns for national information. Second, because there are many local issues that would not otherwise be commented upon. Third, because it is difficult from this vantage point to have a clear and unobstructed view of national affairs.

But we feel the need to comment on Joe McCarthy because he represents a perfidious evil that was - and is still - penetrating to the heart of each home in this area, and every other area in our country. We hope the Senate hangs him higher than a kite.

Joe McCarthy is not the only evil in America. But he is a big one, and the sooner we stamp him out of political life in our country, the better we shall all be for it.

Credit to the Mayor and Council

Anybody who is in his right mind knows that the village council has done its level best to get the facts and bring them before the people. Thursday night is the time set.

The subject is the proposed sewage disposal system. The purpose is to give the facts as they are now known, and to submit them to the scrutiny of the voters of Plymouth.

If you have questions, ask them. That's what the meeting is for. It seems unlikely that you'll get to make a harangue, for one side or the other. But you can ask a legitimate question and if it's at all possible, you'll get the correct answer.

Win or lose, the issue is as clearly presented as time and effort can make it. Hats off to the mayor and council for doing so! If for no other reason than that, they deserve your attendance.

Like hundreds of other young ex-GIs in Richland county, young Dick Hamilton has a wife, three kids, a mortgage, a going business that keeps him working like a dog, - and an ambition.

The ambition is political. He wants to be auditor of Richland county. Dick Hamilton is one of those personable, good-looking chaps that served in the armed forces who got a yen to indulge an idealism that a goodly number of servicemen brought out of the war with them.

What he's got didn't come easy, he admits with a smile, and he's not over the hump yet. And sometimes he didn't play it smartly. He got married right out of high school, and left his wife, the former Eleanor C. Maurer, behind when he went into the Navy.

After service in the South Pacific, he won release in January, 1946, and had to make a living for his wife and small daughter. (Since then, young Judith, now nine, has been joined by two boys, Tom, now seven, and Alan, now two.) All he knew was figures, and he figured he couldn't make a good living at figures unless he knew more about them. So he went to college under the GI bill and prepared for a career in accounting.

At the same time, to augment the allowances paid by the bill, he bought half interest in an accounting firm and leased a hotel. He

continued in both of them until he sold out in June, 1947.

Apparently he did well in his accounting studies at Ashland college, because the administration hired him to teach the stuff after he received his diploma. He stayed on the staff two years as instructor in that subject, while operating his private accounting firm.

The business, says Dick Hamilton, has a lot of "accounts receivable," dandy from the accountant's standpoint, not so good from the economist's point of view. "Around Mar. 15 (Apr. 15 this year) he's busy as the proverbial one-armed paperhanger in a swarm of flies. There's something about a busy fellow - he always can do more, and do it well. If you want a thing done - and done well, runs the old saw, give it to a man who's got lots to do."

During the post-war period, Dick Hamilton has found time to indulge three hobbies: sports, the theatre, and music.

Athletically, he likes anything with a ball in it, and enjoys contact sport except wrestling, which he thinks is mostly corner vaudeville. Once he tried his hand with the boxing gloves, had three matches. Lost 'em all, too.

He played guard on the Navy football team at Camp Peary, and had a shot at basketball. None of these diminished his enthusiasm for his second love, music. A fine

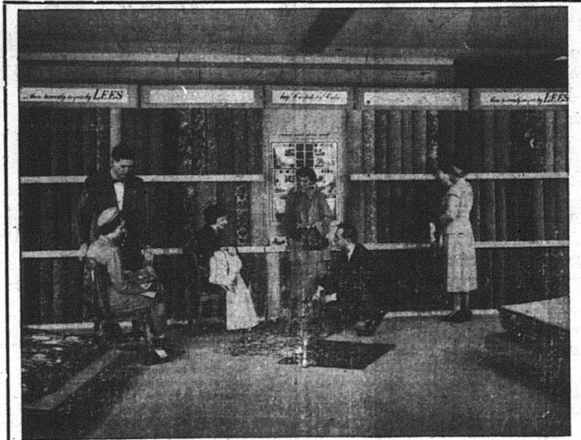
bass soloist, he sings each Sunday in the Mayflower Congregational church.

Self-Employed Can Earn Up to \$105 Monthly, Lose But One Security Check

Under the amended social security law, self-employed workers and employed beneficiaries may earn up to \$105 per month and lose only one month's check.

"Under the old law, workers would have lost all 12 checks for the year," William W. Martin, office manager of the Mansfield Social Security office, says.

Now workers also may earn \$400 in each of three months and lose nothing where under the old law they would have lost three months' payments.

Martin says if a worker who receives monthly social security payments earns more than \$1,200 per year he will lose his right to one month's check for each \$80 or fraction of \$80 over \$1,200.

For example, the worker will lose two checks if he makes as much as \$1,281 in a year. Under the new law, however, he will lose only one check.

no check for any month in which he neither earned more than \$80 as an employed person nor performed substantial services as a self-employed person, Martin says.

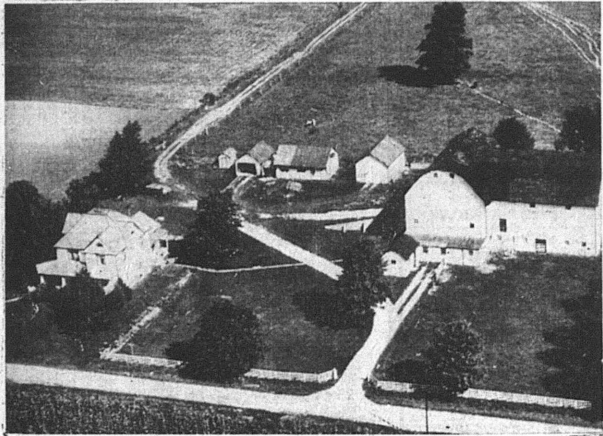

O. Dawsons Milk 21 Holsteins



That neat establishment in Hazel Brush road belongs to Mr. and Mrs. Dawson. They have a couple of four kids who are doing a bar-g-up job of dairy farming.

The Dawsons have been on the place since 1947, when they bought it from the Kuhn estate. Prior to its change of hands, the farm had been in the Kuhn family since it was first sold to a Kuhn as a land grant in the days of the Western Reserve.

Today, the farm - all 223 acres of it - supports a dairying establishment that operates from two basic principles:

1. Feed your cattle at home.

2. Feed ensilage when you can. Orvie Dawson has followed those two precepts and it has paid off. He has a milking herd of 21 head, Holsteins all of them, and by selling his milk in Shelby and raising the feed for his cattle on the farm, the Dawsons have a comfortable living that will take a lot of beating by city-folk who claim that a dairy farmer can't make out with prices what they are.

Of the 223 acres, about 165 are tillable. On them, the Dawsons raise all the wheat the government will permit - 38 to 40 acres in seasons past, but cut to a sharp 22 acres for next spring. Orvie Dawson says he can't stand the gaff much longer, but he can't afford to fight the orders and so he goes along with them. But he's not happy with them, not by a long shot.

There are about 50 acres of corn, and 15 acres filled three silos, so the Dawsons will feed the rest. Seventeen acres are in permanent pasture, and some 27 acres are in rotated grass crops, and the remainder is in oats, hay, and other feed grasses.

When that silo's full, Orvie Dawson figures his cattle will feed well throughout the winter. He jots the milkers on ensilage about Oct. 1 and hopes it will last till May 1.

"My cattle were fat and healthy all last winter, and the ensilage lasted until they were able to get out on good pasture this spring," he says. The herd numbers some 45 to 50 head, and from that lot he culls heifers and milkers to get the type of producer he wants: a big, easygoing, heavy uddered animal that's tractable, easy to bring up to top condition after parturition, and a veritable generator of milk. Holsteins are that type of cow. Of late, Mr. Dawson has stuck closely to artificial insemination in breeding, and hasn't quite made up his mind if it's all he's cracked up to be. After a bit, he plans to return to selected breeding, limiting only registered cows.

and measuring the production of each animal as a means of increasing the value of his herd.

The milking rank is a thing to behold. It's neat, clean, efficient, easy to manipulate. It's a one-man operation too and after the cattle have been herded into the barn one man can manage the whole milking in about 75 minutes. Twenty-one cows in 75 minutes means a little over three minutes an animal.

He loads the stanchion feedbox with prepared meal: wheat, corn and oats ground from the produce of the farm, mixed with 32 per cent cattle concentrate and a little salt. He tries to get 10 pounds of dry feed down each milking animal.

Once the stanchions are ready, he pulls on a rope connected through pulleys to the sliding door. Door slides open, cow shuffles into stanchion, stanchion is locked. Door slides shut.

It's as simple as that. The udder for their heads down with warm water and soap, rinsed, and then the milker waits a minute or so for the milk to let down. Then the rubber suction cups are affixed.

Orvie Dawson has learned some short cuts. "I strip by machine. All you have to do is know how and train your cows to put up with it. It works just as well as the other way, it's faster, and less work. Why, I don't think I could milk more than two cows by hand anymore."

The milk goes into the stainless steel container through a plastic tube, and then into the cooler.

But where's all your help to-night, Mr. Dawson? "Right there," he laughs, pointing to three of his four youngsters. "I do all this myself, but I've got to cut out some of this custom work. I filled nine silos for my neighbors in return for their help when I need it, but I've got to cut that out. Don't have the time anymore. You can't keep ahead of the work around a place this big unless you're at it all the time."

That somebody - and probably Orvie Dawson himself, a strapping pink-checked ex-GI on the sunny side of 40 - has been doing just that is apparent. It's one of those farms you'd want to show your prospective mother-in-law from the city to prove that her Genevieve isn't going to the dogs marrying a farmer.

"This summer I was lucky, one of the kids got so he could run a tractor pretty much by himself. Next year he'll be in 4-H, and that'll keep him busy, so I won't have him too much of the time," says Orvie Dawson.

How Mr. Dawson finds the time

himself to do the work on the place and participate in P.T.A. work, Grange work and the like is a mystery only to those who don't understand that a good man can do many things well. Orvie Dawson is one such.

With the Pilgrims on their own 40, later in the period, Jimmy Hunt undertook a heave to Ed Taylor. Buzz ran through the Pilgrims for 52 yards after he nailed the ball, not a hand being laid on him. Dave Hathaway placekicked the extra point.

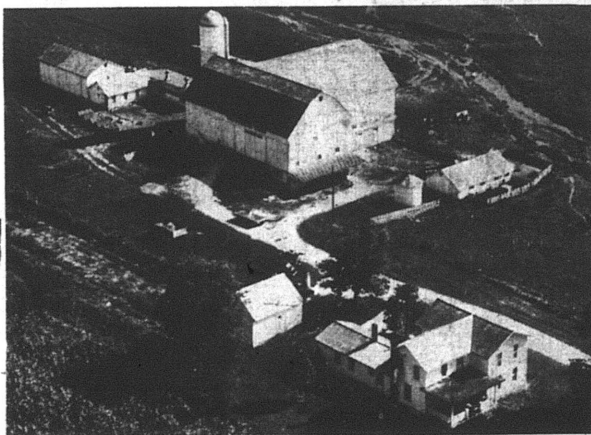
