JANUARY WEATHER

The long drought, which was partially broken on December 14 with 1.07 inches of rainfall, was further checked on January 26-27 when 1.33 inches of steady rain fell. Total for the month of January was 2.30 inches, an excess of .23 of an inch. Snowfall totaled 2.8 inches. (Total for December, 1953 was 2.34 inches, an excess of .29 inch with 2.24 inches of snowfall.)

The average temperature for January was 29.6 degrees or 1.8 degrees above normal. The highest was 55 on the 20th; the lowest was 23 on the 1st. We still have had no subzero weather since December 16, 1951, when the mercury dropped to 13 below.

At the end of January, wheat and pastures looked much better, but we still need more rain to bring our soil, wells and reservoirs back to normal. With Spring just ahead, we ought to get it.

Ohio Fire Marshall Approves Township Owning Equipment

A letter from the State fire marshal of Ohio to the township trustees has been printed in the Ohio Township News, Legislative issue, and as it pertains to the purchase of the fire fighting equipment by townships, will be of interest in this area.

The unsettled issue disputed in New Haven township, would eventually be settled by the Ohio State Fire Marshal in favor of the township trustees who favored the purchase and use of their own equipment.

There has been no special levy or bond issue made against the taxpayers of New Haven township in order to purchase the equipment. The township trustees have purchased in 1953 with money saved during the past years, still leaving sufficient funds in the treasury to operate the township business. An injunction was granted petitioners against its use.

The trustees further state that the county roads are in very good shape. The township trustees have no objection to the use of the county roads. To date, the question is unsettled and unanswered.

RURAL FIRE PROTECTION BY Charles R. Scott

"The many efforts that have been devoted to fire protection in the townships have at last begun to bear tangible fruit in the form of increased insurance credits.

"The Fire Insurance Bureau is now working on the revision of the Suburban and Farm Dwelling Schedules.

"At the present time, Class 9 insurance rates apply to a distance of three miles from the engine house. This means that an average 6% reduction of insurance credit is given to the policyholder.

"The new schedule is released, this 6% credit will be extended to FIVE miles on all classes of property which will mean a substantial saving to practically all township residents.

"This wonderful step forward has been made possible through the magnificent support that the township trustees have lent to the Rural Fire Protection Effort. Without the new equipment and manpower that has been added to Ohio's Fire Service, this excellent credit would not have been undertaken.

"I wish to extend my heartfelt thanks to each trustee and fireman who has been working so hard and effort and they, each and every one, deserve the thanks and continuing support of their residents.

MITES HELD SUNDAY FOR FANK P. FORD

Funeral services were conducted Sunday afternoon for Frank P. Ford, who died last Thursday noon following a lingering illness. The Junior Class, of Rev. Paul Mueggler, pastor of the First Lutheran church, and interment was made in Greenlawn cemetery.

Coming to Plymouth about 25 years ago with his daughter, Gertrude, they entered in business here conducting a soda grill for a number of years in the building now occupied by Shurtz's Grocery. He retired from the store about 12 years ago, becoming employed in the office of the Fate-Roth-Heath Co. He held this position until a couple of years ago, when he retired. Mr. Ford resided with his daughter and her husband, Mr. and Mrs. William C. Cornell.

Through the years in which he resided here Frank (Pop) Ford made many friends and acquaintances, and news of his death last Thursday was received with great regret. "Pop" was one who possessed a reticent personality, but was admired by the younger people as well as those of his own age. He was 72 at the time of his death, being born in Collins, Ohio, Feb. 10, 1881. For many years, as a young man, he traveled a large portion of the southern states as a drug salesman.

Since his retirement Mr. Ford hadn't been too strong, but appeared to be getting along very well as far as his health was concerned. Some four weeks ago he suffered a heart attack, and for a time his condition was considered serious. However, he became strong enough to leave the hospital and was brought back to his home. After about ten days or so of convalescence, he relapsed from the home he never recovered.

Surviving besides the daughter are one son, Sterling of New London; several grandchildren; four great-grandchildren; and one sister, Mrs. C. A. Blackman of Norwalk.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, FIXING THE SALARY OF THE ASSISTANT CLERK OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF PUBLIC AFFAIRS.
