**WRITES OF PR-LENTE CELEBRATION IN GERMANY**

An "Fichentierfieren" letter from Umland Strasse, Schwetzingen, Germany came through this week for the Advertiser.

The news and word pictures are now making their home in that land miles away where WO Brown is stationed with the United States Army. We would like to share it with you, and make the world neighborhoods seem a little closer together.

"Dear Mr. and Mrs. Thomas:

Better late than never — so the old saying goes — but just wanted to tell you how thrilled we were when we opened the "Advertiser" and saw the nice picture of you and Mrs. McKinney. Our best wishes go with the picture. The boys especially are enjoying themselves. Personally I'd rather be back in good old G.A., U.S.A. You know, you can take a guy out of Alabama and Georgia, but you can't take Alabama and Georgia out of the guy's last letter. This is the time for witty speeches aimed at just as good as Alabama and Georgia.

"Tommy, there's something good on here in Germany now that you may be interested in. It is very similar to our 'Mardi Gras' in New Orleans dressed in costumes. The Germans call it 'Fasching' (pronounced Foshching).

Traditionally Fasching jumps off on the 11th day of the 11th month, when carnival counsils throughout Germany huddle over beer-laden tables to concoct the idiocies of the coming year. This is the time for witty speeches aimed at prominent persons, particularly the pompous politicians. By custom, the speeches are made from the innards of a wooden bathtub.

The revelry parties, masked balls, parades, drinking bouts, sweep into high gear in the last days before Ash Wednesday when business is virtually suspended and the good burghers jump into the final hours of merry-making with both feet. Every town along the Rhine is now a bedlam of grotesquely masked parades, blaring horns and bands, and unquenchable pranks.

**ORIGIN OF FESTIVAL**

"Hundreds of legends obscure the birth of Fasching, which has its roots in religious celebrations of the Middle Ages. In medieval times was a period of fasting that preceded Ash Wednesday the beginning of Lent.

**DISMISS INJURY ACTION AT HOGGETT'S REQUEST**

After having been pending in common pleas court for several years, the \$75,000 personal injury action filed by John T. Hoggett, New London, against the Ohio Edison Co., as successor to the Ohio Public Service Co., was dismissed by Judge James L. McCrystal on the request of the plaintiff.

Case was based on injuries suffered by Hoggett at night four years ago when an auto he was driving struck a tree, having better, crashed into an abutment of the subway.

**REPORTS FOR INDUCTION**

Ronald Trauger, of Akron, reported Tuesday at Toledo for induction into the U.S. Army. Ronald reported in at Norwalk, and was sent on to Toledo for examinations. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. H. Trauger, who has been employed at the Goodyear Aircraft, of Akron.

**Some authorities however, track its origins as far back as ancient Greece and Rome to festivals celebrating the Gods of Bacchus and Dionysus. The citizens of Athens donned masks representing the souls of the dead, and professional-folks were permitted to mock individuals and institutions without fear of punishment.**

"When the revels developed into wholesale orgies under the Romans about 600 B. C. they were banned by the senate. The festivals then remained blacked out until the first Christian churches revived them. In time the fun-making became dominant and today Fasching has lost most of its religious significance, erupting into sustained madmen every year at January 5, the eve of the Feast of the Holy Kings.

"Even sober, crisis-ridden Berlin squeals into the act, although not like the predominantly Catholic cities of the Rhine and Moselle in Germany. Mainz, already has nominated its prince and princess of merriment, known locally as "His Goofyness" and "Her Loveliness." The Rose Monday parade, the climax of the weeks of celebration, has shifted to Sunday so that more Berliners may participate.

"Last year one German drank himself to death during the Rose Monday parade at Mainz, while in Fureth, police arrested a young lady who appeared at a costume ball in a thin nylon suit and then dressed completely nude. She was just masquerading as "Eve," she said! The judge gave her a month in jail.

"The gayest celebrations are taking place along the Rhine. Possibly because of the proximity of the Rhine-land vineyards. Some of the cities are Aachen, Trier, Essen, Dusseldorf. Dueseldorf is completely nude.

"As I said before, there are many legends connected with Fasching — one here in Schwetzingen is about the early Germans use of the period to dress like the devil and beat the earth with sticks to chase the winter away so they could till the soil earlier, harvest, having better, crops.

"I hope we haven't bored you with this long winded letter, but we thought that it would be of interest to you back home. We have enjoyed watching the fun makers, wondering how they can be such clowns with the Russian Bear breathing down their necks.

"Looking forward to seeing you when we return home. Auf Wiedersehen!

## Gift From Netherlands Arrives In U. S.; Carillon To Be Placed In West Potomac Park, Washington D. C.

One of the most unusual cargoes to reach American shores from abroad this year was discharged at the Locust Point Terminal of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad.

The cargo consists of a carillon made up of 49 bells being presented by the people of the Netherlands and the Netherlands Antilles in token of their gratitude for American aid during the war period and the postwar years.

The bells are being discharged from the MS Bloomersdyk of the Holland American Line, on the west side of Pier 6, Furness Withy & Company, Ltd., is the agent for the vessel. The cased shipment weighs approximately 57 tons.

The carillon will be moved to Washington where it will be placed on a temporary site in West Potomac Park pending the construction of a permanent tower, the site of which has not yet been definitely established. William D.

G. Scarlett, Netherlands Consul in Baltimore, is supervising the movement.

The gift of carillon was an outgrowth of a visit of her Majesty, Queen Juliana, in April 1952, at which time a temporary carillon was placed in Meridian Hill Park in Washington. During that ceremony Queen Juliana presented a small carillon bell, named after the youngest Dutch princess, little Marijke, which was accepted by President Truman on behalf of the people of the United States. This small carillon bell was symbolic of the larger gift which is being discharged at Locust Point tomorrow.

On May 5 a simple ceremony will mark the transfer of the carillon. This has been arranged to take place during Music Week, May 2-9. Netherlands Ambassador J. H. van Roijen will officially represent his government, while Dr. L. K. Kortenhorst, chairman

of the Second Chamber of the United States General and also chairman of the Dutch National Committee, "Bells for America," which raised the funds for the carillon, will journey from Holland to represent the Dutch people.

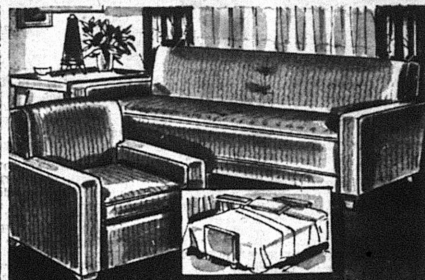

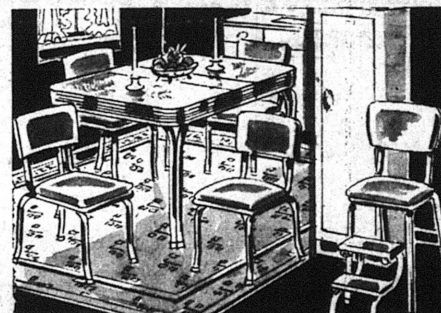

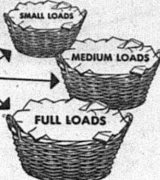

Pleased By Ruling

Clerks in all 18 townships in Richland county whose budgets exceed \$5,000 will benefit personally from a ruling by Atty. General C. William O'Neill.

Norman L. Wolfe, county auditor, listed the following townships whose clerks will benefit from the recent ruling: Plymouth, Bloomington, Butler, Cass, Franklin, Jefferson, Jackson, Monroe, Mifflin, Madison, Perry, Springfield, Sandusky, Sharon, Troy, Worthington, Weiler and Washington.

In an opinion to Hamilton County Prosecutor, C. Hovey, O'Neill held that "total expenditures" on which a part of the clerk's salary is based, must include monies withheld from the townships by the county auditor and paid by him directly to various public agencies in the township's behalf.

Clerks of townships spending more than \$5,000 annually receive additional salary equal to two per cent of "total expenditures" over that amount.

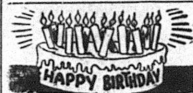
