Snowstorm Brings Snowmen To Kids In Usually Sunny Biloxi, Mississippi

"Greetings from the (Not So) Sunny South!" say Pvt. and Mrs. Kenneth Humbert to Shiloh and Plymouth friends and Ye Editors, from Biloxi, Mississippi.

THIS is a different kind of a news letter from the South, and one you probably will not read again for a good many years. Pvt.

Humbert is stationed at the Keesler Air Force Base down in Mississippi, and he and his wife did not expect to be making snow men in March down in that southern state.

"They were kind enough to send us a description of the unusual event."

"It was like a typical Ohio winter

scene last Saturday morning, Mar. 6, when we looked out our kitchen window and saw SNOW! We were awakened to the sounds of laughter and shouting and could not understand the commotion until we saw the covered ground.

"Parents had gotten their children out of bed at 6 a. m. to see the spectacle. You see such a thing has not happened here for about 61 years. In 1939 some snow fell but it didn't stick. It melted as it hit the ground. It was amusing to hear their shouts 'Is this what snow is like?' Doesn't it feel funny when you walk on it? And then the snow balls started flying.

"The evergreens were soon bending over with the weight of the snow. Camellia bushes still in blossom were surely wishing for the sun and the Azaleas just now bursting into bloom soon drooped with the cold.

"Soon I was a kid again and realized these neighbor children would want a snow man. The snowballs soon began to grow in size and took the form of a snowman, broomstick for arms, dried sprigs for eyes and buttons for a coat. Not for nose, tops of tin cans for ears, straw hat, pipe, check scarf and all.

"None of our neighbors had a whole lot of pictures. The neighbors (natives) took orders for plenty of prints of the pictures!"

"I never knew Biloxi Base and the city of Biloxi, people were making the most of the chance of the lifetime, playing in the snow. We service families were just enjoying a touch of home, where it was just an everyday winter sport for us. In fact I don't honestly believe we appreciated it at times. Perhaps we did when as kids school was closed because of snow-blocked roads. Ohio has her snow storms, and Biloxi and other coastal cities usually have their hurricanes."

The Sunny Mississippi coast was really turned into a Winter Wonderland for one short morning. We thought you might enjoy a first hand account of this once in a lifetime spectacle.

"We wouldn't want to miss an issue of the Advertiser, and how about getting after our Shiloh people for more news!"

Everybody talks about the weather and the water shortage, but the state of Ohio has been trying to do something about it. Present and future shortages of Ohio's most vital natural resource — water — was discussed at a conference called by Gov. Lausche, for Ohio Forestry, conservation officials and civic leaders.

The consensus of opinion was that we still are in for a bad time. Rainfall deficiency for the last 22 months is 18 inches. Increased population is one more reason for the lower water table. More important than immediate relief, they decided, was a long range program of careful use and proper storage of available water supplies.

Some suggestions discussed were: Reforestation and the planting of covering crops, construction of headwater dams, advancement of pollution abatement, construction of farm ponds in greater numbers, complete exploration of the feasibility of piping water from Lake Erie and the Ohio River to the interior of Ohio within the drainage areas. Committees were named to further plans for action this year.

Jim McDougal With Medics In Berlin

Pvt. Jim McDougal has arrived in Berlin, Germany on his assignment with the medical unit of the 6th Infantry Regiment and Mr. & Mrs. Dalton McDougal are sharing the news with the Advertiser readers.

His letter to the home folks tells of the crossing and brief view of England. From his statement in the letter, we would understand that Jim is stationed somewhere near the "Iron Curtain", and we wish he could raise it just a little for us to see in and for them to see out.

"Well I have finally landed in a permanent company here in Berlin. We left Kilmer on the 6th. It took us 9 days to reach South Hampton, England. We stayed in dock there a day and a half, and left on Monday.

"I went out on a pass on Sunday afternoon. Had a very nice time. I found the English quite ancient in their ways. The prices however are very cheap except for bicycles as they travel almost entirely on bicycles.

"We went up the English Channel and through the Straits of Dover into the North Sea. It was very cold and we saw many ice floats, or small ice bergs. We docked in Bremerhaven, Germany on Tuesday, Feb. 16, and took a train back to the families for sharing the letters with us.

to Saarbrücken. It is also in the French zone of Germany.

"We processed in there and left at noon Friday for Berlin. Arrived here at about 6:45 this morning and was sent to the Medical company of this 6th Infantry Regiment which is the only U. S. A. outfit here except for the air force.

"My permanent address will be Pvt. James W. McDougal, US 52304216 MED Co. 6th Inf. A P O 742 c P Post Master New York, New York.

"Please do not write Berlin on the address as they will send the mail back and will not deliver it."

"So far I like Berlin very much. Our barracks building is almost like a hotel. We have all the comforts that can possibly be given. It is twice as good as anything I have even seen in the states, including officer's quarters. There were nine other fellows that came along with me, all medics. We haven't been assigned to any special duty as yet.

"Things seem to be real nice and the duty they say is the best in all Europe. Well, I must close for now. Will write more often now."

With so many of our Plymouth boys stationed around the world in strategic areas, the globe neighborhoods seem to be getting closer and closer together. It is always interesting to hear from them and learn how they are doing and adjusting in new environments. We thank the families for sharing the letters with us.

Red Stop Signs For Ohio Soon

Red stop signs have been authorized for Ohio. The new red stop sign will eventually replace nearly 30,000 yellow stop signs on the rural state highway system.

"The yellow stop signs are still legal and in force," said Director Linzell, "and they will be used until the Highway Department can replace them gradually. To replace them all immediately would entail prohibitive cost."

The Highway Department's Deputy Director of Operations, C. W. McCaughy said that the journal entry, which he presented to Linzell for signature, specified that the minimum size of the new sign be a 24 by 24 inch octagon, with the word stop at least one-third the height of the sign face. On rural state highways a larger, 30 by 30 inch, sign is specified.

McCaughy said, "The colors used shall be either black letters and black border on a yellow background, or white letters and border on a red background."

McCaughy continued, "When black and yellow are used the yellow background may be reflectorized. When red and white are used the word STOP must be reflectorized and the red background may be."

Harold Eckhardt explained that the traffic sub-committee of the American Association of State Highway Officials had unanimously recommended use of the red stop

sign to a joint committee composed of members of the A.S.H.O., the Institute of Traffic Engineers and the National Conference on Street and Highway Safety.

EASTER SEAL MONTH
IN OHIO IS FROM MARCH 18 — APRIL 18

In a proclamation designating March 18 to April 18 as Easter Seal month in Ohio, Gov. Frank J. Lausche Thursday officially launched the annual campaign conducted by The Ohio Society for Crippled Children and its 101 affiliates in the state.

Pointing out that "costs of services to cure for crippled children have greatly increased, just as other costs have increased," Governor Lausche's statement urged "all public spirited citizens to support this appeal as generously as they can, and thus lend a helping hand to our crippled children and adults."

Funds derived are used locally to provide medical care, therapy, and rehabilitation for crippled children. Also benefiting from the campaign is the Project for Epilepsy, Ohio being the first state to have a voluntarily supported program of this nature.

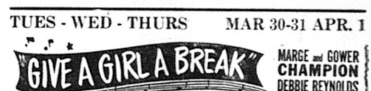

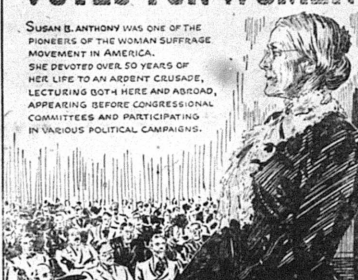

LAWNS NEED FERTILIZER; NOT LIME

Fertilizer, not lime, will make thin lawns denser and greener, says Victor H. Ries, extension floriculturist. People often think the lawn needs something, so they put on lime because it is cheaper, he adds.

On lawns that need fertilizer, and most of them, Ries suggests spreading 20 to 30 pounds of 4-12-8 or 5-10-5 fertilizer per 1000 square feet in March.

The specialist says fertilizing and mowing at least 1½ to 2 inches high will go a long way toward controlling crab grass.
