

Shiloh Bank Changes Ownership

Control of the Shiloh Savings Bank Company, Shiloh, Ohio, has been acquired by a committee of Mansfield business men. The announcement was made jointly to by L. D. Wolfersberger and A. W. Firestone, president and treasurer respectively, of the Shiloh Bank.

A special meeting of the Board of Directors was held Monday night at which time the following men were elected to the Board: John W. Cook, A. W. Firestone, Lewis F. Hartman, Dale W. Taylor, Ralph H. LeMunyon, George W. Stelts, and L. D. Wolfersberger.

The Board elected the following officers to manage the affairs of the Bank: A. W. Firestone, chairman of the Board; Dale W. Taylor, president; Ralph H. LeMunyon, vice president and secretary; George W. Stelts, treasurer; E. F. Rose, assistant treasurer; E. D. Wolford, cashier.

The Shiloh Savings Bank Company was founded in 1901. First officers of the Bank were Jerry Wolf, president; Frank Frame, vice president; Silas Ferrell, vice president; A. W. Firestone, secretary and treasurer. In 1901 the capital of the

Bank was \$25,000. Today the capital and surplus account is \$150,000. Total assets on December 31, 1953, were \$1,909,173.50.

John W. Cook, speaking as a representative of the new stockholders, stated that all the banking services which the customers of the Shiloh Savings Bank Company have enjoyed in the past will be continued without interruption at the same high standards. In addition, every effort will be made to increase the services and facilities of the bank.

With the passing of control of the Shiloh Savings Bank Company, provision has thus been made for the Bank's future.

Reflection upon the history brings into sharp relief the life and works of one of its founders, A. W. Firestone throughout the years has held on objective which is best expressed in the following letter to the public he wrote in 1933.

Tragedy struck Monday evening at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Oney, Shiloh, Ohio, when their one-half year-old son, Johnnie Keith, died en route to the Willard hospital after swallowing a foreign body, believed to have been a marble.

The child was rushed first to Shiloh for medical aid, then to Plymouth for attention, and then on to the Willard hospital. At this time he was not seriously injured but did receive a number of body bruises and cuts.

The family makes their home in a trailer north of the Shiloh school moving there last Fall from Greenwich. Prior to that time, Mr. Oney resided in a home on Plymouth street in Plymouth.

Funeral services will be held this afternoon, Thursday at 2:00 p.m. from the Bender funeral home in Greenwich, and burial will be in Greenwood cemetery in that village. Rev. Melvin Allen, pastor of the Baptist church near Plymouth, will officiate.

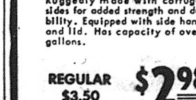

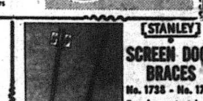

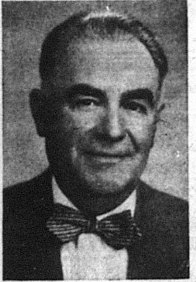
NEGLECTANCE SUIT

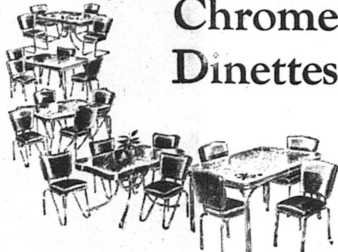

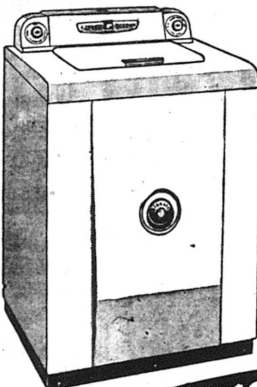

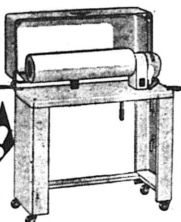
