The Old Tax Rate was 15% on local service and Long Distance rails under 25 cents and 25%, on soil calls over twenty five cents The New Excise Tax is 10% on both local and long Distance Service.

During 1953. Northern Ohio Telephone Company collected from its subscribers the staggering sum of \$1,09,397.22 in Federal Excise Taxes.

The Telephone Company estimates that the new tax rates will effect a savings to the subscribers of \$40,635.12 per month, or almost one half a million dollars per
