New Tax Rates Aid Phone Users

Telephone Subscribers will benefit materially by the New Federal Excise Tax Rates effective April 1, 1954.

The Old Tax Rate was 15% on local service and Long Distance calls under 25 cents and 25% on toll calls over twenty five cents. The New Excise Tax is 10% on both local and long Distance Service.

During 1953, Northern Ohio Telephone Company collected from its subscribers the staggering sum of \$1,069,397.22 in Federal Excise Taxes.

The Telephone Company estimates that the new tax rates will effect a savings to the subscribers of \$40,635.12 per month, or almost one half a million dollars per year.

The New Federal Tax rates apply to all service billed to the subscriber on or after April 1, 1954.

We heartily endorse the editorial in last Monday's Cleveland Plain Dealer that it is time NOW to call a halt to these crime-breeding books which hide under the misnomer "comic books."

The idea of teaching and entertaining pictorially is a good one, but the deplorable and uncensored use of glorify brute strength, teach prejudice, incite abnormal and precocious sex activity, show adolescents how to steal, wield a switchblade knife in one instance, and then tell where to buy one! Those parents who allow their youngsters and teenagers to read any comic book on the stands because it helps keep him quiet, had better take a look at the inside pages and also at the abnormal mind which the child may well be developing. You can teach a child habits of hate as easily as habits of kindness and industry.

CAN YOU remember how those mosquitoes buzzed last summer just when you got all settled down for a nice nap or a rest with a good book? About slayed you, didn't it, all that buzzing and zooming. Well you can get even before long. For they have perfected a machine that can send out sound waves at a frequency high enough to kill the pesky insects. 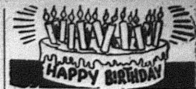
