

KROGER TO PULL STORE AFTER 27 YEARS IN BUSINESS

After operating a store here for the past 27 years Kroger's will move out of Plymouth at the end of this month.

Robert McIntire, owner of the building which is occupied by the Kroger Store, stated that the company some time ago asked for a cancellation of their lease.

McIntire also revealed that the BeVier Sales, a firm dealing in electrical equipment and appliances and operated by Clarence BeVier, has asked for the space to be moved into the store room to be vacated by Kroger.

The Kroger store was first located in the building now occupied by Wharton's Plumbing Shop, and Bill Ross, who now operates a grocery in Shelby, was among its first managers.

The store was in this position for the past 12 years, and he was succeeded by Mrs. Ethel Reed, the store's present manager.

District managers in the years gone by failed to see the need for modernization of the store, and as a result store traffic dwindled, with the decision being made to pull the store out of Plymouth.

Mrs. Reed stated that she felt that there was no definite plans for the future, but that for the time being she will take a much needed rest.

For the past several years Kroger's has been interested in securing a location with parking facilities, or other features that would give the store a better position than it had, but it was not able to secure a suitable building, and as a result interest in the Plymouth store has slowly died, not only from management's viewpoint, but customers as well.

In any event we regret to see Plymouth lose the Kroger Store, and Mrs. Reed expresses her thanks to her many loyal patrons during the past twelve years.

March Weather

After one of the mildest winters on record, March, the unpredictable month, made up for it with the roughest and most disagreeable weather imaginable.

Beginning March 1st with a snow and rain storm, "baby blizzards" on the 3rd, and later with thunderstorms, wind, and hail, the month ended with freezing rains that made driving and walking hazardous.

The thermometer dropped below freezing on 21 nights with low of 8 on the 5th; the highest was 70 on one day only—the 25th. The average for the month was 36.4 or 2.3 degrees below normal.

Precipitation totaled 4.14 inches or .26 inch above normal. Total snowfall measured 13.7 inches.

The only redeeming feature of the heavy snowfall was that it melted and pastured and relieved the water shortage.

At the end of the month little plowing had been done and practically no cuts plowed.

Now we should like to see some nice warm sunshine, April showers and May flowers. It's high time.

Police Test Shots Given Approval

The Richland County Health Department has issued the go ahead sign for the Police Test Shots. Plymouth schools sent out the blanks Wednesday and parents are to have these blanks turned in by Friday.

Medical men in general seem to support the police shots, however, in due regard to the unfavorable public and the questions raised by people concerning the safety of the shots. Supt. Coon announced that he could not give his wholehearted support to the tests. "I do not know exactly what to do as a parent in this case, and I think that every parent should make up their mind as to whether they will receive from radio, television and the press," is the statement of Mr. Coon.

The meeting was called Tuesday night in Mansfield to discuss the Police field trial vaccinations in regard to the recent publicity which has been given to the tests. The groups represented were the Richland County Board of Health, Mansfield City Board of Health, Mansfield Health Commissioner, Mansfield School Superintendent, and the advisory Board of the Richland County Medical Society.

After a review of the information received from the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, the United States Public Health Service, the Ohio Director of Health, and the Ohio State Board of Health, the meeting reached the unanimous conclusion of absolute safety in the use of the vaccine for the prevention of Poliomyelitis. This conclusion was based on the research that has been done and feel that the program should proceed in this county.

PROGRAM ENDORSED

This program has involved two and one-half years of work and an expenditure of seven and one-half million dollars to develop a vaccine which has been used by Dr. Salk in the vicinity of Pittsburgh.
