New Books At Public Library

"The Night Of The Hunter" by Davis Grubb

Here is an extraordinary story. That part of West Virginia which lies in the valley of the Ohio River is a haunted and haunting land. The story itself is affright and dreadful as a shantytown ballad - it is the story of people at that moment in their lives when they are small and no one understands them - when no one knows that the shadow at the nursery window is really a tiger and not the shadows of the leaves beneath the moon - that the creak of sleeping rooms is the step of Doom itself, and that every midnight beneath a child's counterpane is the night of the hunter.

"Not As A Stranger" by Morton Thompson

A story long, rich and powerful telling the story of the making of a doctor. It is the story of Lucas Marsh, "a specialized human" and "a stranger in the world," who cares about one thing alone, the practice of Medicine. There has probably been no novelist in our time who could present medical detail with the combination of authority and excitement that marks Mr. Thompson's pages.

"Clipsy in the Parlour" by Margery Sharp

In Victoria's reign the Devonshire Sylvesters were a race of silent, powerful, blackhaired giants. They filled their family across vigorously, ate and drank hugely, kept their own company zealously and prospered in the modest way that farmers prosper. This was before Charlotte alerted them, and long before Fanny Davis played hob with their happiness.

PROPERTY ON SQUARE

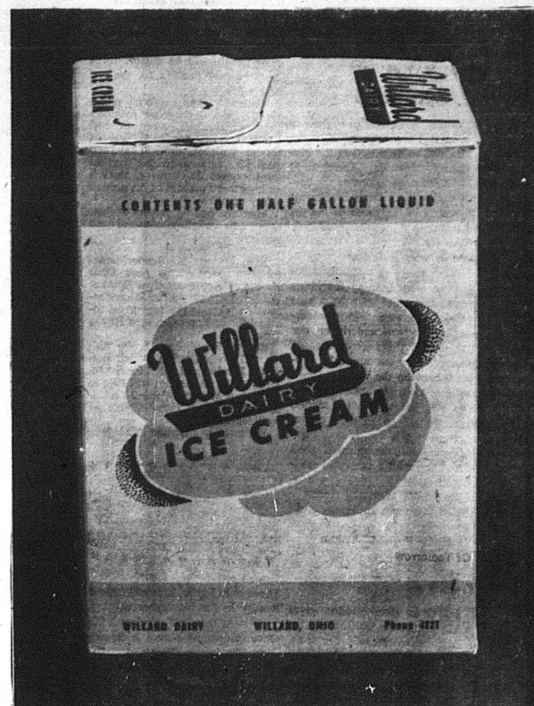
Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Nelson of West Broadway have sold their property to Chas. W. Resseger of Willard.

• A Proper Memorial

It seems fitting to this newspaper to suggest to the Board of Education that the new annex to the Plymouth elementary school be dedicated as the Plymouth Elementary School Memorial Annex, and that a suitable plaque be mounted in one of the corridors to signify that the building is an investment by the citizens of Plymouth in the youth of the future in memory and honor to those who gave their lives during World War II.

A great many of us who served our country during World War II were aware as our fathers before us were that we were fighting for ideals and principles that our nation and its people have cherished for 175 years. We were able to understand and appreciate the motives and ideals because of our willingness to fight to defend those ideals because the schools of the nation had performed their proper mission.

There is no more appropriate memorial, it seems to us, to a dead soldier than a living school. The building in Plymouth will be finished on or about Memorial Day. Even if it is not, it would appear to be an act of grace and the spirit of good sense to dedicate the building with a memorial reading somewhat as follows:

Plymouth Elementary School Memorial Annex
Built by the Citizens of Plymouth in Honor and Memory of Their Sons and Neighbors
Who Fought Yesterday For the Children of Tomorrow

• For Fairness

The report of the Ohio state auditor gives rise to certain conclusions that are worth the price of serious thought. A blind man could see from it that the village of Plymouth is managed as well as the citizens can expect. Its officers are not professionals and do not receive high salaries. Indeed, we do not doubt that many of them would be glad to forsake the small pay to be rid of the responsibilities that go with them, which is all fair because they are rewarded with much higher horaria.

The report shows that no misfeasance, that we are getting our government about as cheaply as we possibly can, and that the village has barely enough to get along on a stand-by or basic maintenance basis. By this we mean that there are no surplus funds, no money in the budget of any funds, no money to business, to overcome losses deriving from deterioration, fair wear and tear, age of equipment, and the modernization of the plant, particularly the last-named, which is the most important item we have running, for periods often longer than the manufacturer recommends as a reasonable life span, we need to have more money.

For it is a truism that government costs money, and that government on the least is entitled to come higher. If the taxpayers are unwilling to submit to higher taxation, in an era when replacement costs continue to mount, they should not expect to be paid. The village of Plymouth does not expect that amateur managers of municipal government, generally businessmen who are overburdened with the myriad of details incident to the running of small businesses, can make the kind of decisions that professional counterparts, notably city managers who make a career of municipal management, cannot make.

Above all, it is a downright act of unfairness to deprive the small merchant in a little town of the business of his municipal government merely because he is sufficiently civic minded to put up with the abuse and the inconvenience, for what? To make that point, that goes with service on the town governing body.

We call upon the Ohio legislature, and all citizens interested in honest, fair-minded municipal government, to rectify this situation immediately. A law should be drafted that will permit municipalities to do business with small merchants up to a stated minimum—say \$500 a year—without fear that an audit appearing on the scene two or three years after the purchase has been made, will disallow the expenditures. It is an insult to the character and the intelligence of our civic-minded small businessmen to suspect them of anything but honesty and to make them make no mistakes about it—of cheating the community of its substance.

• A Man to Honor

We as a people shall be entertaining later this month a man whose name should be recorded in history as the first of our age to resist the advance of totalitarianism. His name is Haile Selassie, and when he was crowned Elect of God, Conqueror of Lion of Judah, Emperor of Ethiopia, he took the name of Haile Selassie, and it is by this one that we know him.

There are many who recall the feverish reports from equally feverish Adlai Ababa back in 1935 when Mussolini's Black Shirt legions, in poses of peace, aviation, and other of the League of Nations, attacked the defenseless Amharas and Gallas who made up the Emperor's pitiful army. They fought gallantly and well, but were no match for modern weapons.

Meanwhile, their emperor went to Geneva and asked the world to apply sanctions against Italy. Great Britain and France refused to do so, and we were not even asked to join the League of Nations, and did nothing. It seems safe to say that had the civilized world stood up to lawlessness and violation of solemn treaties, the terrible days of World War II, Korea, Indo-China, and whatever comes next.

We should be glad he is here. Hewill visit with President and Mrs. Eisenhower at the White House, and, accompanied by his ambassador at Washington, will make a twomonth tour of the country when he admires so much and whose help he is getting by paying cash.

When he comes to Ohio, every good citizen should be glad to cheer him on his way. For he stands for what is good and decent and honest, and there are all too few newsmen who can match him, and there

Rep. Alvin F. Weichel, veteran Huron county congressman forced to retire from the political arena by poor health, will be eligible for a \$4,500-a-year pension for the rest of his life.

Under the congressional retirement formula, outgoing members get two and a half percent of their \$15,000 salary for each year of service. Weichel, who will have served 12 years when his current term expires in January, thus is entitled to 30 percent of his present salary annually.

Members pay six percent of their salary into the retirement fund each payday.

Rep. George H. Bender, senatorial primary victor over Ohio House of Representatives Speaker William B. Saxbe, plans to concentrate on winning the support of so-called Saxbe Republicans in Huron County.

Some Republicans broke with the GOP organization, which supported Bender, and voted for Saxbe, 1,149 to 1,109. Bender will take to the stump in the 22 counties which gave Saxbe a vote of confidence.

Meanwhile, Democratic Sen.



Thomas A. Burke, who will oppose Bender in the November election, announced that he'll conduct a kid glove campaign as long as Bender does.

The former Cleveland mayor does. Bender's campaign charge by Saxbe that Bender's past financial record is suspect.

Burke is still trying to get Gov. Frank J. Lausche to run with him as a team, but so far Lausche has refused to be asked.

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Residents of Richland and Huron counties don't pay as much for the education of their children as the national average, according to a study by the National Education Association.

NEA said every man, woman, and child in Ohio lives in \$30 a year to state and local sources for what we have in the national average of \$33 per capita.

State and local sources pay \$198 a year per pupil for education, compared with \$217 for the national average. Although Ohio ranked above the national average in salaries paid to its public school teachers—\$3,800 a year, compared with \$3,605 nationally—the state's teachers had less than four years of college preparation for teaching. The national average was only 31.8 percent.

The nation's major unions have banded together in an effort to get the government to boost the wages of its workers. The unions, including the American Federation of Labor and the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America, are asking for a 10 percent raise.

Union officials also apparently want the Mexican laborers to select representatives to discuss wages and working conditions with large employers, who in effect set the wage rate of imported labor.

The Department of Agriculture has just released survey results on 1953 crops which show Ohio's production and crop value on most major crops above 1952's total.

The state's corn crop of 194,205,000 bushels—valued at \$83,110,000 (sale value)—was the fifth highest in the nation. It was substantially above the 1952 crop of 189,051,000 bushels and \$77,972,000 in sales value.

Total 1953 value of the production was estimated at \$291,308,000, with the difference between the sale value and production value being \$11,308,000.

Ohio's 1953 wheat crop—seventh highest in the nation—was 69,136,000 bushels valued at \$138,272,000, with 12,540,000 bushels sold. The 1952 crop was worth \$11,308,000, with \$86,337,000 in direct sales.

Oats, barley, rye, popcorn, soybeans and clover, and clovered crops also showed sharp increases over a year ago.

Only crops reported by the Department to decline from 1952 to 1953 were buckwheat and alfalfa seed.

Republican voters in Huron county will be returned William Saxbe to the successful George H. Bender of Cleveland in the Ohio Senatorial primary will be glad to know that Bill's not dead yet.

Despite the fact that he was soundly trounced, Mr. Saxbe has already taken steps to keep his name before the electorate. First of all, he means to keep his campaign promise to support Bender. This will help patch up the rift in the state Republican ranks. If Saxbe goes along with Bender and swings his organization into line for the GOP candidate, the powers that be in Ray Blis's headquarters at Columbus may forgive Saxbe for the harsh words he said during the campaign. On the grounds that all's fair in love, war and politics.

Saxbe's chairman of a legislative committee to study public utility rates. He has already summoned his colleagues for a meeting tomorrow. On the other hand, Saxbe is to repair a good many fences by facing the utilities. The future of young Bill Saxbe in the Republican party will be the only development of last year's primaries.

Dawson, Democrat, and Brooks, Republican, are both in the Plymouth area. Political observers right now feel Dawson, the incumbent, has a decided edge.

A Cass township farmer, Dawson is not serving by appointment, a general election campaign for commissioner. Back in 1950 he made a bid in the primaries but was defeated by Frank E. Robinson, former county sheriff who ultimately was beaten by the late Cyrus L. Shoup.

Aside from the complimentary vote registered by County Auditor Bernard F. Kean, candidate to succeed himself, the results of the primaries of May 3 stirred up little interest in Norwalk. The victory of County Commissioner O. W. (Bill) Leech by Henry Filmer, 2nd.

Leech assures Huron county of an experienced board of commissioners for the next two years. Leech will be embarking on his second term. Commissioner Harry Van Buskirk is in his third term and Commissioner Harry Jump, of Willard, is in his second.

In fact, the extremely small size of the vote was somewhat astonishing. The Huron county side of Plymouth turned out only 26 ballots in the Republican primary. In all of New Haven township less than 35 persons participated in the GOP vote.

The people, an experienced politician once said, get about what they deserve. There is no better instance of this than what will happen in Huron county in the fall when 2,600 persons expressed themselves in the primaries for county commissioner, and 366 of them were Democrats.

Generally, win in Huron county on the Republican side, in a county with a population of well over 36,000. What it means is that 1,216 voters have chosen the county

commissioner who will start a new term in the autumn. Republicans generally win in Huron county, saving major upsets which are so uncommon the oldest hand at the courthouse can't remember many.

When Mr. Leech is re-elected, he can thank those 1,216 who voted for him in May. He owes no thanks to those who will support him in November in any larger number than this.

County Auditor Kean reports delinquent taxes amounting to \$51,930.83 in Huron county. Some foreclosure sales have been filed by the county treasurer to recover the county's equity but enforcement of the laws governing delinquent tax accounts is deliberately lax.

There is an eight per cent interest charge collected over and above the 10 per cent penalty on delinquent taxes, but Huron county is not collecting this at present. The county board of revision, which is responsible to the auditor the county treasurer and the chairman of the board of commissioners, has designated certain lands for disposal under the auditor's sale.

Auditor's sales are not common in Huron county. They are held to dispose of land on which the delinquency is deemed by the board of revision to be greater than the value of the land or what the land might bring at ready sale. Some persons with ready cash have been known to buy land on speculation and have turned a substantial profit. Auditor Kean will of course advise the sale widely.

An economy move dictated from Columbus recently resulted in the terminating of the lease on the quarters in West Main street occupied by the Ohio State Unemployment Compensation office. It has been moved to a new building in West Main street. The office is now a full time branch of the operation at Sandusky, whereas until recently it was a part-time office had Bellevue under its wing.

Although state law permits the filing of unemployment compensation claims at any office, the fact that Norwalk is a full-time office is less occupied with claims than others in larger industrial areas. The Norwalk office is now paying about \$25 unemployment compensation claims, as compared with about a sixth of that number a year ago, when both Norwalk and Bellevue offices were contributing to the overall figure.

The trend is in keeping with statewide figures. Among large areas also the state office has been receiving compensation claims from residents of such as Cleveland, Toledo, Akron, Youngstown, Columbus, Cincinnati and the like, there were 67,872 active claims in April, 1954, as against 51,013 in April a year ago. The Sandusky office in April, 1954, was paying 1,806 claims, which is a decrease with only 1,821 in April, 1953.

The Mansfield office paid 168 in April, 1953, and 1630 last month. The state office paid 24,926 in April, 1953, and 14,216 in April, 1954, an increase of about 550 per cent. Maximum benefits now are \$30 a week, under the new law.
