Mortgagor Agrees, Board to Prepare Sale of Useless Lot

Sale of property its considers will again be up for consideration by the Board of Public Affairs at its meeting Monday night, but now the Board has the approval of the mortgagor to sell.

The Board now needs the approval of the village council. The signs are that council approval will be forthcoming if the Board makes a formal request. This is expected to be set in motion Monday night.

Village Solicitor Joseph Dush is aware of the Board's intention to sell the property, which lies against the A. C. & V. tracks, and will be required to do a good bit of research work to prepare a fair description of the land. The property will have to be sold with the proviso that the right-of-way and access by the railroad remain intact.

Some neighbors have expressed a desire to buy the property and the question of law as to whether the village could sell the land at auction has been investigated. A tentative opinion is that the village could sell the land at auction, but sealed bids would be necessary has been given. This will require that the village advertise the sale and receive sealed bids in due time. If none of the bids is deemed satisfactory, they can be rejected and a readvertisement of bids conducted.

In the absence of a zoning law, property owners who live adjacent to the land in question would wish to buy it up to insure that undesirable buildings cannot be constructed or operated on it.

The village council will meet at 8 p. m. Tuesday with the almost certain knowledge that the bridge across the Huron river in North street will be built by Huron county. The approach voted by the council at its last meeting paid off almost immediately when the council's delegation, headed by Councilman Elmer A. Norwalk, at Norwalk to request county assistance. The delegation pointed out that when the sewage disposal plant begins to be constructed, operations will be severely handicapped if the bridge should be closed, since traffic would have to be routed over other roads.

There are signs also, that county assistance can be obtained from both Mansfield and Norwalk in the repair of West Broadway, although the village may be obligated to assist to some extent.

School Board Ups Entry Age for 1955

Only school pupils who will have reached their sixth birthday by September 15 will be permitted to enter in Plymouth public schools effective with school year 1955-56.

The Plymouth Board of Education so decided at its last meeting, and instructed Superintendent M. J. Coon to put a progressive scale of raising age requirements into effect. At present, a new pupil must have reached his sixth birthday by January 1 of the term he is entering.

For school year 1955-56, the deadline date will be set up to December 15, following year to November 15, and for school year 1956-57, the date will be October 15.

The decision culminated a discussion of three-months length. The points of departure was that a child must be six years of age to sustain a full-time school program. Most of the school districts in nearby counties are following the same policy.

The Board in other action hired Mrs. Russell Barbour to manage the new cafeteria, which will open with the fall term in September.

School lunches will be available to all children from grades one to 12. They are being planned in cooperation with state and federal school lunch programs and will contain a third of daily calorie requirements. Surplus and abundant foods will be used to a large extent.

Ceremonies at the cemetery will begin promptly at 11 a. m. The orator of the day will be Robert Howard of Willard, past state commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. A firing squad of Legionnaires commanded by William Vandervort will execute the volleys in honor of the dead.

All this week members of the Legion, its auxiliary, and the Union of Daughters of Civil War Veterans leave their homes to gather in the vicinity with flags and flowers.

Lyle Bittinger, sexton of the cemetery, has been engaged during the week in the decorating of graves of deceased veterans. This is paid for by the American Legion. The marchers will reform after the ceremonies and return to the elementary school for dismissal.

Library Receives Some New Books

Never Victorious, Never Defeated, by Taylor Caldwell.

A new book by Mrs. Caldwell is always welcomed to the best seller list. Already it is climbing on the Cleveland list. This newest work is the story of a railroad and the family behind it. Like all her other books, it gives a colorful saga of a family through the changing pattern of the last century.

The Cobweb by William Gibson. This is a powerful story about human interrelatedness and about real people responding to the real things. Their types will be recognized everywhere. The author has drawn them as unforgettable people.

Minutes of the Last Meeting by Gene Fowler.

This could easily be called "Some Misadventures." It is a book which is both comic and sad. If there is any plot at all, it is that of John Barrymore, W. C. Fields, and John Decker helping the author to write a biography of Sadakichi Hartmann, poet, self-proclaimed genius and just plain rogue. For the Barrymore and Fields fans, this will be most interesting. It shows both idols of the early motion pictures in their everyday humor.

The Narrows by Ann Petry. Like "The Street," Mrs. Petry's earlier best-seller novel, this is written with tremendous narrative power. It is the story of a fierce and overpowering love and of the terrible and unreasoning fury it evokes. Most of the characters are Negroes, and their problems are common to all peoples. The story is alive and compelling because it is told without bitterness.

The Spider King by Lawrence Sanders.

Louis XI is the subject of this absorbing biographical novel, which is based on historical fact. Mr. Sanders has handled his subject with loving care, and has given a rather unknown French king the place he deserves with his interesting interpretation of the "Spider King."

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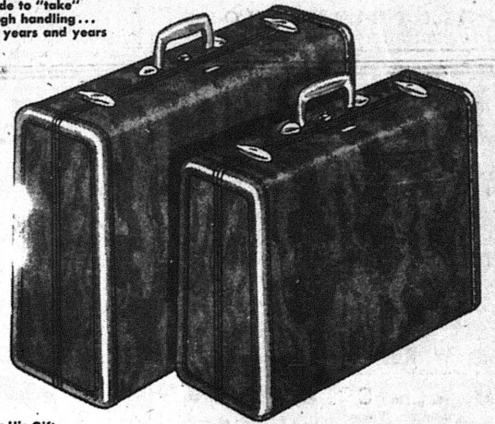

Goings on in Government

from Mansfield

The on-again, off-again test of automatic voting machines for Richland county is off again, and Republican Commissioners John C. Friday and John W. Selby are reported about ready to drop the tests altogether.

When it was first proposed by the election board, the commissioners liked the idea of testing both types of voting machines over a period of two elections. Their attitude changed, however, after they learned the test would run the county between \$1,500 and \$2,000.

That amount, so far as Selby is concerned, is \$1,500 to \$2,000 too much, and he has blocked any final action all by himself. Friday last week was ready to go along with the election board and Commissioner Fred C. Dawson, the only Democrat. But when he saw Selby would not vote with him, Friday changed his mind, for the time being at least.

As it stands right now, the commissioners are supposed to contact the Shoup Voting Machine Co., of Canton, to get a written statement concerning rental charges. The Canton firm originally offered the county the use of 10 of its machines free. Their representative, however, told the commissioners Shoup would expect the same terms received by the Automatic Voting

Plymouth taxpayers who may be worried that the 1951 appraisal of real estate for tax purposes will boost their tax bills need have no fears; any increase will be slight.

Back in 1951, figures showed that assessment of land and buildings was slightly over 51 per cent of the average sales of 36 pieces of property that turned over in the survey period. The State Board of Tax Appeals fixes the figure of 50 per cent as the ratio between assessment and fair replacement value, 1941 standard.

If a survey is to be taken this year shows that property turnover of any given number of properties is on the average more than 50 per cent of the average tax assessment, the tax assessments must be adjusted to reach the 50 to 100 ratio.

Naturally, the reappraisal resulted in an adjustment in the amount of tax assessment. In those tax districts where the assessment valuation increases, there can be a com-

parable decrease in tax rate, assuming the amount of tax revenue to be produced remains constant. But the tentative figure for the increase in assessment of real property in all of Huron county is in the neighborhood of \$136,000, only a very small portion of which is in Plymouth corporate village. So taxpayers need not expect sharp increases in the amount of their tax bills.

The method by which the appraisal is arrived at is worth noting. First, the appraisal firm sends a man to call at the dwelling and examine it. He marks his findings on a card. This is then handed to an appraiser, who may pass by the property (but not necessarily enter it) to estimate its fair replacement value.

The fair replacement value is then given to the auditor, who halves it, and then applies the tax rate against it. The product is the tax bill.

But the assessment value is subject to adjustment as the turnover value of the land and buildings of a similar kind sold in the tax district varies. If, say, 50 properties are sold in one year for a total of \$150,000, the average turnover price is \$3,000. The average assessment for tax purposes of those 50 houses must be equal to or higher than \$1,500. If it is not, the assessment must be raised.

There are some counties in Ohio, notably villages newly incorporated in Cuyahoga county, where the adjustment of tax assessment has been as much as 103 per cent. Huron county will require only a very small adjustment, one or two per cent perhaps.

Tax statements for the second half of 1953 real estate tax in Huron county were mailed on Friday, May 21st, according to a statement released by Harold B. Collier, Huron county treasurer.

Final date for payment without penalty has been indicated on the statements as June 20, 1954, after which date the 10 per cent penalty provided by law will apply.

The treasurer reports an unusually good collection so far this year, and it is anticipated from all indications that the June collection will continue in good form. The treasurer further remarked that all should have their statements not later than the first of the week beginning May 24th, and in the event that there be a few who have not received their statements, this will be due to the fact that either a former or new owner has not properly advised the office, or a change of address has not been reported.

Machine Corp. of Jamestown, N. Y. The New York company has demanded a flat \$150 per machine per year.

Selby said last week he couldn't remember the statement by the Shoup man about expecting the same terms as the Automatic company. As a result, he said he would not make any decision until the Shoup company clarifies its position.

So far as Selby is concerned personally, he is ready and wants to advertise for bids from the two firms and start buying. This cannot be done without either a resolution to buy from the election board or by a public vote of the people.

Selby knows (and so does Friday, Dawson and all the members of the election board) he can get a resolution, but only with a fight. The two Republicans on the election board, Jim Will and Earl McFarland, will vote for buying. The two Democrats, Marshall C. Moore and Mrs. Marie Bell, will vote against. To break the deadlock, the resolution will have to be forwarded to the secretary of state, and Ted W. Brown, a Republican, will probably go along with Will and McFarland.

It looks like it will be the Republicans against the Democrats with the outcome in favor of the Republicans and the purchase of voting machines instead of the proposed tests.

Members of Richland county's two central committees were busy electing officers last week. The Democrats won along as expected but the Republicans reshuffled leadership.

Marshall Moore was re-elected chairman of the Democratic central committee. Mansfield Attorney Leslie K. Wagner was elected vice chairman. Mrs. Marie Bell, secretary, and John Whitcomb, treasurer. This week, the party's central committee officers were to be named. Without a doubt, chairman of the executive committee again will go to Mansfield Attorney William A. Calhoun.

All was not quite so harmonious with the GOP. Philip Wolfe, with the backing of Earl McFarland and company, was defeated in his bid for re-election to the Republican central committee. The new chairman, aided by Jim Will and company, is Ralph Hughes, county probate officer and common pleas court bailiff. Hughes received 34 of the 54 votes cast and will take over for the next two years. Other officers named were Prosecutor Theodore Lutz, vice chairman; and Mrs. Ethel Klopferstine, secretary.

Elected from the northern townships to the Republican executive committee were Commissioner John Friday, Ben L. Nelson, Shelby R. D. 1, and Haldon C. Myers. Another dispute, this time over leadership on the GOP executive committee, was expected again this week when a new chairman will be elected to replace Ralph Hardy, who resigned to become postmaster of Mansfield.

Jim Will is the leading candidate for the job, and he probably has the strongest to take it. But he won't get it without a fight. Publically, Will says he is not a candidate and
