

Wheat Men Say No, But Quotas Win Out

Despite an overwhelmingly unfavorable vote in both Richland and Huron counties, wheat marketing quota controls will be in effect in 1955.

The nation-wide support of the Department of Agriculture's program calling for reduced acreage (by 12 per cent) of wheat in 1955 amounted to about 73 per cent of those eligible to vote, but Richard county turned it down, 163 to 40. The score in Huron county was 75 yes to 210 no.

The decision of farmers all over the country means that 1955 wheat sowings will be about 21 per cent less, acreage-wise, than in 1954. Price support will be somewhere between 75 and 90 per cent of parity.

Although a strong protest organization figure in the Richland county voting, there was no discordance, officials said. Small wheat farmers—those with 15 acres or less—conducted a separate ballot to demonstrate solidarity and regional opinion. It was almost unanimous in favor of no controls.

Foster Fackler, nephew of the late Henry H. Fackler, who was a prime mover in the first national organized wheat marketing quota protest movement, led these objectors, who were to oppose the restrictions because:

1. Acreage controls would provide less wheat to be marketed, and thus squeeze farmers out of ready pocket cash.
2. Crop controls are apt to disrupt the planting cycle when wheat is used in a crop rotation scheme.
3. Federal controls are had in general, and particularly so when they are "rigged" to allow the large acreage producer of the wheat belt to manipulate wheat market.

Brother's Will Suit Ends With Verdict Against Plaintiff

A dramatic attempt by a dissatisfied survivor to nullify the will of a nearby Richard county farmer was defeated in Common Pleas court at Mansfield Friday.

George Milligan, of Greenwich route 2, had sued to void the will of his brother, Francis, invalid by reason of "unsound mind" of the testator and "undue influence" by advisers. Francis had left an estate estimated at \$21,000 to friends and his church, stipulating a bequest of only \$5 to his brother. "I leave him," Francis had written in his will, "the sum of five dollars in order to demonstrate that I fully understand the relationship to me, but that it is not my wish that he share in my estate."

Theodore Lutz, attorney representing George Milligan, indicated after the jury's verdict was announced that he would file a motion for a new trial. This would put the case up to the Fifth District Court of Appeals at Toledo.

Francis Milligan left \$10,000 to a niece and 10 others, with the balance going to his church, Mt. Zion Lutheran.

A Shiloh physician, Dr. C. O. Butler, testified for the plaintiff. Dr. Butler stated under oath that when he examined Francis Milligan on Nov. 17, 1951, he concluded the man was of "unsound mind." Another medical man, Dr. Leonard Seidenberg, a psychiatrist in the Mansfield Reformatory, corroborated this testimony.

Two other doctors, Paul Lee of Lucas and Betty Reed of Butler, who stated they examined the deceased in December, 1951, testified he was of sound mind. The jury took 16 ballots. It was said after the vote was announced that the jurors were unanimous in the belief that unsoundness of mind was not established, but they wondered if there were not "undue influence" prior to the execution of the will. George Milligan had previously petitioned the court to be named guardian of his brother, but was turned down. Subsequently a friend of Francis's was declared, and a Mansfield bank named guardian of his money.

Four Hurt in Crash At Crossing in 224 West of New Haven

Four men were seriously injured, two of them critically, late Saturday when three vehicles collided at the Baltimore & Ohio crossing of Route 224 west of New Haven.

Removed first to Willard hospital, and then to University hospital, Columbus, because of the seriousness of their injuries were:

Oliver Warner, New Knoxville, fracture above knee and compound fracture of leg above ankle.

Otis Collins, Box 60, route 1, Tiro, brain injury.

Patients in Willard hospital are: Roger Collins, son of Otis, same address, lacerated face; Raymond Warner, 105 North Jefferson street, New Bremen.

As police officers re-constructed the accident, it appeared that the Warners, driving one sedan and towing another with a draw bar, were proceeding west in Route 224 and were crossing the railroad tracks just prior to the side of the road to inspect the draw bar. The sedan driven by the Collinses smashed into the front of the Warner sedan.

Oliver Warner and Otis Collins were removed to the hospital in the McCutte ambulance. Secar of Willard transported the others.

Traffic was held up for about 30 minutes as a large crowd gathered at the scene. Police from Plymouth and Willard investigated prior to the arrival of the state patrol.

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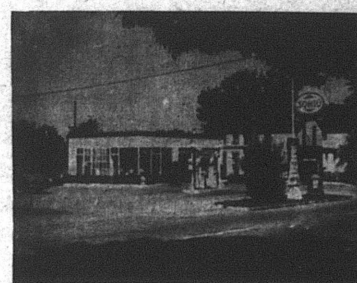

Richland County Retired Receive \$176,929 Monthly

Retired workers and their dependents in Richland county are getting about 73 percent of the \$176,929 in old-age and survivors insurance payments being made monthly in the county, William W. Martin, manager of the Mansfield social security office, reported yesterday.

Beneficiaries of all groups on the rolls early in 1954 totalled 3,964 in Richland county, he said. This is a 12-month increase of 619 beneficiaries in the county.

In making this announcement, Mr. Martin released newly available figures showing the number of persons in the several beneficiary group in the county and the total in benefits being paid. Each month 2,040 retired workers received \$110,190; 661 aged wives and dependent husbands got \$18,826; a total of \$23,959 went to 701 children, including a few children of retired aged workers; 158 mothers with minor children in their care were receiving a total of \$6,496 monthly; and \$17,458 in survivors payments went to 404 widows, widowers, dependent aged parents on the beneficiary rolls. The total in monthly benefit amounts paid in Richland county increased \$35,795 in the 12-month period.

Children of deceased insured workers made up the greater number of survivors insurance beneficiaries, Mr. Martin said. Benefit payments to children (including a few children of aged retired workers) increased by 15.6 per cent in the 12-month period ending with December, 1953.

A large percentage of survivors beneficiaries, according to Mr. Martin, was made up of widows of deceased workers with minor children also entitled to benefit payments in their care. In such cases, the age of the widow is not a consideration in eligibility for survivors payments. Benefit payments to this group increased by 15.2 per cent in the 12-month period ending with December 1953, he said.

These local figures for old-age insurance payments also reflect a national trend, Mr. Martin pointed out. In the country as a whole, more than 6 million persons were receiving such benefit payments at the end of 1953, almost a million more in December 1952.

The payment monthly of \$176,929 to 3,964 persons in this county said Mr. Martin is of real significance to the economic well-being of the community at large, and in many cases represents the greatest or only source of income to the individual family concerned.

We were pleased to afford the Fate-Root-Heath Company an opportunity to present its views with respect to the question of a water supply for a proposed sprinkling system in Plant No. 4. From what we could see, they were carefully and accurately presented.

As we see it, the difference in price between \$35.52 and \$25 a year is so small that it is hardly worth disputing in order to keep sacred the principle that once a rate for water is set, it should not submit to argument by anyone who may seem to be a privileged user.

It may be that the Board of Public Affairs erred in setting a rate of 60 cents a thousand square feet. We understand they did so after considering the manner in which Shelby handles the same question. The Board communicated its decision in late June, and the Fate-Root-Heath Company very properly appeared before the Board to present its arguments and a counter proposal.

The company pointed out that it has performed a great many services for the village at low or no charge, and its spokesmen suggested that the spirit of cooperation should prevail. It was not necessary to do this: if the Fate-Root-Heath Company's arguments in favor of the \$25 rate "hold water", they should be accorded to on merit and merit alone, not because the Board or anybody else expects to enjoy favors. Nevertheless, it did no harm for the village of Plymouth to realize once again that its biggest business is also greatly interested in the welfare of the community, and will continue to manifest that interest.

Our position is that once a rate has been quoted, particularly at a time when water is in short supply, it should be adhered to. Effective administration of the village water supply is not so old or established in this village. Until a comparatively short time ago, there were many users whose meters did not function. Others were not paying or not paying the correct rates. Everybody knows this, and the penalty of being big is that everybody suspects the big fellow is up to some shenanigans.

If the Board of Public Affairs has done wrong, we believe it should be told to that effect, so that the intent will not be mistaken. We do not think it has done wrong. Nor do we think there are differences between the Board and the company that cannot be settled amicably and without rancor. As with every question, there are two sides to this one, and so far as we can see, each has much merit.

The Board was guided by the method of assessment in use at Shelby. This was a sensible and reasonable step. It set a rate that seems fair when we take into consideration that even though not much water would ever be run through the proposed sprinkling system, a water outlet is a water outlet, and a place for the village to lose water it has not been able to afford for some years.

Perhaps, if the present plans to prove a water supply materialize, the Board will one day be in a position to do what is done elsewhere - make no charge for fire-protection water at any time. But until that day comes, it will be necessary to charge. A fair rate must be collected. We are confident that both sides to the controversy will accept with good grace the arguments of the other, and that a rate fair not only to the present applicant but to future ones will result. Above all, we hope all will realize that it is too hot to argue over \$10.52.

The passing of Miss Daisy Hanick is another loss. The old guard is slowly falling out of the ranks. Replacements from the rear keep stepping up to fill up the long, grey lines, but nowadays the grey is not so much in the uniform as in the hair.

In small towns such as Plymouth, where the preponderance of population is of older citizens, chiefly female, we must always be prepared to learn of the passing of our friends and neighbors, more so than if this were a big city. Nevertheless, it is always hard to do so, and in Miss Hanick's case - because she befriended us when we came here - particularly hard.

It escaped the notice of many, but there were important doings in Huron country this week. The first was a meeting with State GOP Chairman Ray Blum and county Republican executives from Huron and nearby counties. The second was the news that at long last, Greenwich will have its first hard liquor license soon.

Why Bliss came to Norwalk to meet with the organization leaders of Erie, Huron and Lorain counties is probably explained by the fact that Norwalk's weather was cool and the country club is a pleasant place to meet. But he had a fine chance to kill two birds with one stone - to enjoy the pleasant surroundings of the Huron country seat city and to whip up support for his organization candidate for the United States Senate, George H. Bender, who goes down in this county like a dose of castor oil.

How well he succeeded can only be guessed at. Certainly he had little time for politicking on the county level. He is a personable and attractive fellow par excellence, and he was more interested in greasing the big wheels than in inciting the small cogs.

But the anatomy of Huron county's preference for Bender's young primary opponent is worth dissecting. It is easier to explain what happened than how it happened.

It is no secret that almost every Republican who amounted to anything in Huron county was working for Saxbe. "I worked for Bill Saxbe," one veteran GOP leader told me, "and so did my wife." It seemed there were a lot of women working for Saxbe, and one long-time expert suggested that perhaps there is a development in Huron county GOP politics: that younger Republicans are coming to the fore, and they don't seem to like organization candidates of the Bender stripe.

A likely explanation is that the members of the team in Huron county are well enough satisfied with the leadership except in instances when a man like Bender - whom they don't like - is put on it. And they showed their dislike by going for Saxbe in the primary. "I don't know Saxbe from a hole in the wall," says one non-Norwalk Republican, "but I do know Bender, and that's why I voted for Saxbe." And he added, "it's why I'm going to vote for Burke."

Don't take these protestations seriously. Bender will doubtless carry the 13th District in November. Voters in the 13th simply don't vote Democratic. But the state organization is seriously concerned over the obvious defection from its choice; and is working hard through its local committeemen and contestmen to smooth over the differences. Failure to present a show of unity along the whole front will cost the organization a good many independent votes in the fall, and it can ill afford that. That's why Huron county Republicans got some attention from the state organization this week.

At long last, Greenwich will have a hard liquor dispensing establishment. The proprietors of an enterprise in the south side of Main street in that south side town were notified at the end of last week that a license will be issued shortly. The issuance is the culmination of a long battle with administrative rulings and red tape, and that the applicants won out in the long run is an earnest to their patience, their level heads, and their wise counsel, chiefly a Norwalk lawyer.

The facts are that the state liquor board had committed itself to issue a license last fall after the village voted nearly three to one in favor of a wet town and the efforts of the drys had failed to overcome the appeal of the applicants.

Not many people in Greenwich knew this, a fact which could be learned by almost any casual inquiry around the state house. I learned it by making a 50-cent telephone call, and by so doing protected myself from what could have been an embarrassing, as well as futile, effort to stand up for ethical law.

For the state liquor board has a discretionary power to issue licenses to establishments within a stipulated distance of a church, library, school or other public establishment. And that is what happened in the Greenwich instance. For the student of public affairs, the Greenwich experience points out some lesson that are worth learning:

1. A composed, unemotional campaign on issues of moral generally defeats one that is not composed or unemotional.

2. Too few of our citizens are aware that legal strings can be pulled to inform themselves as to the legitimate activities of government.

3. Too few of our citizens know anything at all about the machinery of government and the way it works, neither of which costs anything to learn. Yet there are hundreds of lawyers who make a good living every year by dispensing a knowledge of it. Many of them take jobs in government to learn the ropes so they can practice outside government and dispense knowledge of government's ways of doing business.

4. The issuance of the Greenwich license was a cut-and-dried thing six months ago, and it was well nigh criminal to keep the applicants on tenterhooks, with their investment, their health and their well being in some jeopardy, that period of time. By the same token, it was improper not to inform the opponents of the license, who wasted time, money and effort in fighting a windmill.

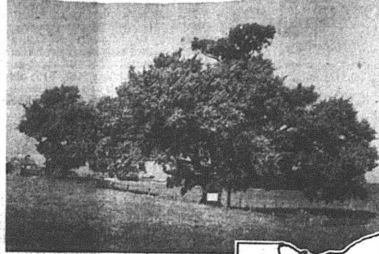

More than 44,000 people visited the Logan Elm Park last year as they followed the pathways of history through this State. This huge tree is a living tie with Ohio's past, for it was under these spreading branches that Indian Chief Logan delivered his famous speech which was recorded by John Gibson in 1775, a year before the American Revolutionary War, and which gained world-wide fame as one of the most eloquent statements by any of the former inhabitants of the Ohio Country. The Logan speech is recorded on a monument tablet at the Logan Elm. This tree stands in a five-acre park maintained by the Ohio Historical Society and many Ohio families use the picnic facilities in this historic park, which is about seven miles south of Circleville off Routes 23 and 361.

ORDINANCE NO. 14-54

AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, SPECIFYING MATERIALS AND METHOD OF CONSTRUCTION FOR PUBLIC SIDEWALKS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT:

SECTION 1. All public sidewalks constructed in said Village shall be of the following materials: (1) Sawed stone flagging or concrete, not less than four inches in thickness.

(2) Concrete mixture not less than three inches in thickness, one part cement and two parts sand. (3) Black-top, not less than one hundred pounds per square yard, T-35 mixture or equal.

SECTION 2. Said sidewalks are to be laid on natural dirt if grade is right, if filling is required said filling shall be of cinders or sand; provided, however that if the assessed valuation of any property abutting any sidewalk ordered to be constructed of the materials herein specified, shall be insufficient to pay the cost of same, under the limitations provided by the statutes of the State of Ohio, the Council may order the said sidewalks to be constructed of cinders or other material, other than the cost of which shall not exceed the amount which may be legally assessed against said abutting property, for construction of the same. Provided further, that from the date of the passage of the ordinance no sidewalks in the incorporate limits of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, shall be made or constructed either in part or whole of wood, or brick, except it be in repair of old sidewalks.

SECTION 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

A RESOLUTION DETERMINING TO SUBMIT TO THE ELECTIONS OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH THE QUESTION OF ISSUING BONDS FOR THE PURPOSE OF THE CONSTRUCTION OF SANITARY SEWERS AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL PLANT.
BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the Village of Plymouth, Huron and Richland Counties, Ohio:
Section 1.
