Council Passes \$125,000 Budget

A 1955 village budget of \$152,364.38 was approved unanimously by the village council Friday night in a special session called to pass the ordinance on an emergency basis.

The budget shows that the village is self-supporting, except for \$18,423.86, which derives from such as the gas tax, motor vehicle fund, and tax on bank deposits and sales tax. And to these each citizen contributes in proportion to his earning power.

The general fund of the village carried a Jan. 1 balance of \$7,120.08, the budget shows, and revenue from the general property tax will be \$113,388.04, the Richmond county budget commission anticipates. Classified property tax is estimated to be \$3,400, down \$400 from last year, and revenue from "other sources" will be \$10,298.86, up about \$500 from last year.

Revenue from the general property tax will increase by about \$1,120 because of increased tax valuations in Huron county, it developed.

(Ed. Note: This would indicate additional village taxes collected in Huron county because of the recent tax adjustment in tax valuations would be \$280.00.)

(The tax duplicate in the village corporation shows \$3,024.510, as compared with \$2,779.264 last year. The increase is about \$250.00.)

Total paper appropriation from the budget commission is \$32,956.98, from which the auditor deducts \$1,800 as the village's share in certain overhead costs including workmen's compensation payments, leaving net appropriation of \$31,156.98. However, the balance of the general fund is \$7,120.08, leaving the remainder of \$24,036.90 for appropriation from the budget commission.

Earl Huston Likes Hampshires

His folks have been on the place for nearly 60 years, or at least his father has, and Earl Huston has a long heritage of smart farming to live up to.

He does a pretty good job of it because he sticks to Hampshire hogs and Hampshire sheep, because he has mechanized just about everything on the farm but the udder, and because he works hard at it.

His dad well remembers when the two-team hitched of horses tugged grain wagons across the mud flats through Planktown en route to the grist mill at Milan. In those days, water power was the only means of turning grinding wheels in the Western reserve and Milan was the nearest point.

The road, now Route 178, was in, but it was a muddy stretch in wet weather, and there were no modern conveniences such as telephones, natural gas heating, flush toilets, or electronic communication such as radio or television.

"I wouldn't go back to the old days without the modern conveniences for the world," says Mrs. Huston, "but the fact is we've lost something over the years. Folks aren't the family people they were then we were young."

One of the reasons why the Huston spread is a good place to farm is that it is well supplied with water. "Earl puts those Hamp hogs out in that alfalfa field and we don't have to do a thing to 'em all summer," says Mr. Huston, "There's a stream that waters 'em and except for what supplement he gives 'em, the hogs fend for themselves all summer."

Shiloh's Father Dies at Columbus

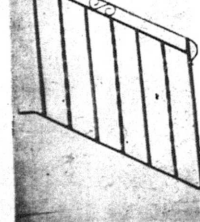

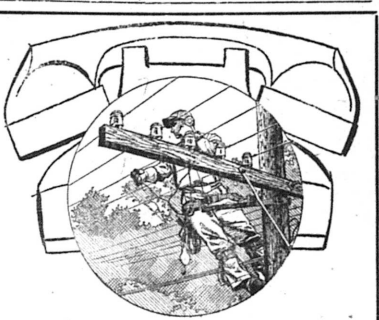
The farm: the Huston place, east of Shiloh in Route 178.

The Hamp-Poland cross has worked out well for Earl, the oldest of the three Huston boys ("We raised three boys," says Mr. Huston, "because we had to - we didn't know how to make 'em girls" and Mrs. Huston says "He had all the help out-of-doors, and I had none in the house.")

The Hamp-Poland cross has been varied, genetically, on the Huston place by selecting a purebred Hamp boar with a crossed sow, by sending a crossed boar in with grade sows, and by crossing two crosses. Most of them work out well, and the Hampshire name has earned a place of respect on the farm.

Not only in swine production, either. In the matter of mutton and wool production, the Hampshire strain is equally good. Earl Huston had about 210 lambs this spring, and he sold off about half of them and is fattening the others until he can profit by a little firmer market.

"That Hamp sheep feeds well, and isn't much bother," his father says. "The lambs are strong, and they look after themselves pretty quickly." All good re-

The Budget

The village council in special session has approved the budget for 1955. Some facts about that budget need to be called to everybody's attention.

First, our village affairs are big business. Apart from what the schools and the Board of Public Affairs take in and disburse, the village itself is a \$150,000 a year proposition.

Second, it takes money to dispense the civil services which the citizens require, and it will take more as years go by.

Third, the present budget is one with no fat in it. It is highly doubtful that any funds could be safely cut out of it. There is even something in it, although precious little, for a civil defense organization, for which there is no local sympathy.

Fourth, once again the budget brings up the question of whether it is desirable for the council, under existing law, to be careful with moneys placed in the general fund. Actually, we are getting less money this year than last, because the balance in the general fund at the year's end was higher. The council refrained, wisely, it thought, from purchase of certain needed equipment in December, whereas it now appears the council would have done better to purchase the device. More money would have been received from the county.

Fifth, the budget has some planning in it, planning that while it may not be much, is important all the same. There are plans for the civil defense organization, and plans to cope with added fire protection responsibilities if the contract with New Haven township should materialize. This is sound practice, and should be encouraged.

The budget is a matter of record. But we very much doubt that the failure of citizens to attend the meeting is an indication they do not care. At the budget hearing last year, only the mayor, the clerk, the editor and the editor's son appeared. A game of canasta was played. Nevertheless, when it comes to paying up, the citizens care. We would wish it could be shown at the right time.

Sewers, Again

We took pride in publishing so prominently last week the letter of the Water Pollution Control Board. It was a civic duty to publish it, we thought, and even though the cost of doing so was heavy, we went ahead because we respect the right of the people to know the truth.

Our acting mayor and the village clerk have agreed to appear, with the approval of the council, before a special committee of the Ohio Senate on Jan. 20 to discuss the problems encountered by small communities in complying with directives of the Water Pollution Control Act.

We think this is highly proper, and we think the gentlemen who will appear know local problems well. They were remarking the other night that when you come right down to it, our debt is not so high. The water and electricity debts have built-in amortization, and so long as people need water and electric current - which we presume will be for a long time to come - we can service those debts satisfactorily. Only our school debt is large, and tends to grow larger.

To this, we think the right answer is, "Well, show us another small community in the state whose school debt is proportionately any lower than ours."

It is a knotty problem. We very much doubt that state help will be forthcoming. There is no sentiment for it in Columbus. The truth is - and it is a truth we have pointed out before - we are going to have to do something, do it quickly, and do it on our own. Every day we delay will cost us money.
