Dog Licenses Due

Dog licenses for 1955 have been available during December at the County Auditor's offices and at the customary locations over the county, for the convenience of dog owners. Many dog owners also make application by mail, Auditors Norman L. Wolfe and Bernard F. Kean report.

While the law extends the final date to obtain a dog license to Jan. 20th, the attorney general ruled last year that dog owners have no protection if they do not obtain tags by Jan. The ruling pointed out that the Jan. 20 date is merely an extension of time, without penalty.

Standpipe Freezes, F-R-H Takes Water

Freezing of a float valve in the Fate-Root-Heath Co. standpipe two days before Christmas resulted in a demand of 30,000 gallons of potable water from the village water supply Christmas day, the Board of Public Affairs learned Monday night.

The demand was filled promptly without difficulty, Supt. of Water and Power Lincoln Sprowles informed the Board. At the same time, a substantial water loss occurred when the foundry sprinkler system at F-R-H was set off. The demand was of an unforeseen, non-recurring type, the Board decided, and was not of any consequence.

In routine business, the Board discussed the failure of Christmas lights after Christmas eve and discussed, so far as it was able, that a misunderstanding of responsibilities was the cause of the failure. The lights were taken down Tuesday.

The Ohio Power Co. informed the Board that pole rent for the current calendar year would be \$49, payable in advance, which figure the Board authorized for payment. The bill is rendered in pursuit of a 1944 agreement with the company.

Board members voted to make two of their number available to the village council Tuesday night in the event matters pertaining to the Board's ultimate jurisdiction were discussed.

A Plymouth woman narrowly escaped serious injury yesterday at 9:10 a.m. when her 1951 model sedan skidded, left the road, snapped off a telephone pole, and wound up in a ditch in Route 61 opposite Plymouth Drive in theatre.

Mrs. Mildred Eby, 33 Park avenue, was taken to her home by Plymouth police only shaken up and muddled. She was thrown from the machine, which was removed from the scene completely demolished.

Police Trace Clews As Thief Gets \$10

The intruder or intruders who ransacked the office of Supt. M. J. Coon in the high school Sunday night was the same who vandalized the Greenwich and Jeromesville High schools, police say.

Dwight D. Derr, of the Mobile Crime Laboratory at the state prison farm at London, after investigation at the three schools announced Tuesday that footprints found on the scene were identical.

A young suspect rounded up Monday at Ashland has been fingerprinted and his prints are being compared with those taken at the scenes of the crime. Police hoped for a confession yesterday morning.

Police reason that the robberies were initiated either at Jeromesville or Plymouth, and rule out Greenwich as a starting point.

Most recent acquisitions of the library are two gifts, "Gertrude Lawrence as Mrs. A," by the late actress' husband, Richard Aldrich, personally inscribed to the library by its author through the intervention of Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt Whitney, and a volume by Mrs. Vera Chaffield, the author, of pen and ink drawings illustrative popular fashion between 1830 and 1860.

Some of the books received by Plymouth Branch library during 1954 were selected by the Mansfield Public Library, its parent unit, which sent volumes suitable for general readership so far as its funds would allow. It is the intention of the Mansfield library that the Plymouth branch will complement its purchases.

Dear Mr. Eckstein:

Acknowledgment is made under date of December 17, 1954, of your application for renewal of permit No. 76-1. Without supplemental information there is no means of determining what conditions should be recommended with reference to the renewal of this permit.

It is realized that the bond issue in the amount of \$125,000 was defeated at the last November election. This, however, does not relieve the village of responsibility of moving ahead using other means to solve the sewerage and sewage treatment problem.

I will hold your application pending the receipt of supplemental information. I would suggest that you advise us as to the adoption of the sewer rental ordinance which was contemplated after your last conference here in Columbus with representatives of the Division of Sanitary Engineering. We will need to know how the village intends to meet the condition set forth by the Board in its January 22, 1954 letter, namely:

"Complete the studies, report and revised general plans with estimates of cost of needed project to provide the minimum necessary sewers and sewage treatment works for Plymouth and secure the approval of said revised general plans by the Ohio Department of Health."

As soon as I receive the information concerning what the village's plans and action will be in this matter I will attach it to the application and see that appropriate consideration is given for renewal of the permit.

23 Teachers Get \$100 Raises; Sewer Usage Tax Imminent

Board Seems Settled in Decision To Ask New Levy in November

Teachers in the Plymouth public school system received a belated Christmas gift Monday night.

By unanimous vote, the Board of Education raised salaries of 22 teachers and Supt. M. J. Coon \$100 annually, and contracts for the 1955-56 school year will probably show additional increases when they are sent out in March.

The Board took note of figures furnished by Richland County Superintendent of Schools Dale C. Kinney, showing Plymouth's minimum starting teacher salary at \$2,600, lower than any other school district in the county.

Other districts start teachers at the following minimum: Belvidere, \$2,800; Butler, \$2,800; Lexington, \$2,800; Lucas, \$2,600 (this is a scale figure but not the actual starting salary); Madison, \$2,900; Milford, \$2,900; Shiloh, \$2,700; Springfield \$2,000; and Union, \$2,800.

Additionally, the Board realizes that competent teachers cannot be held in the system unless salary increments are voted. For these reasons, the Board plans to raise salaries with the next contracts, which will be sent out to teachers whom the Board wishes to retain in March, so that incumbents will not "shop around" for higher wage scales later in the year.

To do so, the Board will require additional operating funds

over and above the present 6.5 mill levy, and is about decided to ask them at the general election in November in a "package" arrangement. That is, the present 6.5 mill operating levy and the desired additional levy of two mills would be combined into an 8.5 mill levy, to be voted for five years.

The general election in the village decided anew by the citizenry, and the Board is of the opinion that maximum participation at the polls will serve its interests best.

In its organizational meeting for the year, J. Harold Cashman was selected president by the Board and John Hebig vice-president. Earl C. Cashman has another year to serve in his appointment as clerk of the board.

Committee appointments are as follows: Judson A. Morrison and Haldon Cheesman, transportation; Cheesman and Morrison finance; Hebig and David Cook, buildings and grounds. The first-named will serve as chairman in each case.

The Board will meet regularly in the high school at 8 p.m. on the second Tuesday of each month. Petitions for those desiring to be candidates for election to the Board may be had for the asking in The Advertiser business office at 3 East Main street. The terms of (please turn to page 3)

A sewer usage tax ordinance will be considered by the village council on first reading at its next meeting Jan. 18.

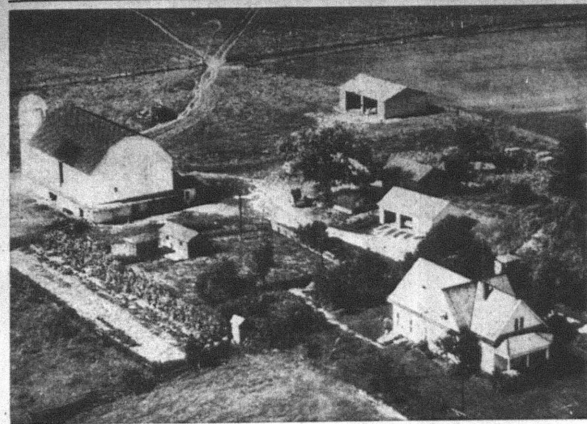
Informed by the state water pollution control board that the permit to dump raw, untreated sewage into the Black Fork of the Huron river, which expires Jan. 17, will not be renewed unless the village shows some evidence of complying with the conditions of the permit issuance in 1954, the council instructed Solicitor Joseph F. Dush to draft an ordinance for consideration at its next meeting.

Acting Mayor Royal W. Eckstein will, in the meantime, communicate with the board to this effect. It is hoped this display of good faith by the council will result in issuance of a new permit.

The sewer usage tax is not new. When officials of the council discussed the renewal of the permit with state authorities in December, it was understood that Plymouth would consider enactment of a sewer usage tax.

The questions for immediate consideration are two:

1. How shall the tax be assessed?
2. How much shall be assessed?
Solicitor Dush reminded the council that sewer usage or sewer service taxes are constitutional in every respect so long as every citizen pays them without discrimination. He said the major weight of (please turn to page 8)



Arnolds Aim at Farm of Grass

"My goal is to establish a 100 per cent Holstein milking herd and switch the farm to permanent pasture, mostly," says young Don Arnold, who farms the place belonging to his dad, R. L. Arnold, in Route 178 just east of Plymouth.

"I don't think it's too important whether you have registered Holsteins or good grade Holsteins, so long as they give you 60 to 75 pounds of milk a day, and that's what I'm shooting for," he says, after seven years of building up a herd of 16 milking animals. There are 43 cows on the farm, and of late, young Don Arnold has had a string of bad luck - cows bred to his registered Holstein bull have been dropping only bull calves.

He figures his luck is bound to change in that respect, and he's happy with the sort of rains of late. "It should be a good year for grasses - alfalfa and clover. Last year, I didn't get such a good grass crop. The result is that I have to feed too much hay, which is expensive. It's better to get as much grass as you can into 'em."

Young Arnold, only son of his parents, who both help him out now and again, as well as his three-year-old son, David Earl, has the right attitude of a young farmer: "I don't know it all and I don't like to tell anybody how to do anything, but I sure like for them to show me how they do it."

In addition to the cows, which have produced a regular eight cans of milk a day for the past year, the Arnolds run hogs. "We like a cross between Yorkshires and Hampshires - I won't feed a true York - and we buy 'em when they're six to eight weeks old, big enough to feed for themselves, and we keep 'em about 22 weeks. I've

got one run about ready to go to market - maybe about the first of February - and right after that I'll get another bunch."

Don Arnold is trying an experiment in keeping 70 hogs penned up in a barn near Shelby, which he rented. "It's working out, I think," says Don Arnold. "They don't run all that fresh off, but the secret is to have an enclosed place big enough to get enough hogs in so you'll make out with concentrated feeding."

Making out is, of course, the chief interest of the farmer, and Don Arnold is no exception. "I've learned a lot in the last two or three years. Now you take milk prices. At \$4.78 a hundred, by the time the farmer figures his labor and his costs, he barely makes expenses. But that check every two weeks helps him 'make out,' and besides, it's not so hard in the summer as it is in the winter."

It's a wiser course to keep your own bull, if he's a good one, thinks Don Arnold. His own is an ornery cuss who needs to be watched. Right now, he's fathering a string of bull calves, but in the long run, his own figures he'll worth than artificial inseminators.

The Arnold place - counting the Brickley farm adjoining, which young Don Arnold farms also - measures close to 300 acres. There's a 20-acre woodlot, and across the road, a 16-acre field that's usually sown to wheat. Otherwise, it's all on the south side of the road, and it stretches almost as far in one direction as another.

"It lacks 20 acres," says R. L. Arnold, who owns the place, "of being an exact square. It makes is pretty easy to handle if you get up early and get to it."

General farming is the profes-

sion of R. L. and Donald Arnold, and they do very well at it. Two silos which gleam in the sun are a big help, says Don, "because after October 1st, we have to go on ensilage and hay for those cows." Come spring, the cows will be out on pasture that every year is more permanent than it was the year before. Grass farmers is what the Arnolds aim to be, raising only enough grain to supplement the grass food for their cattle and hogs. They're a good way on the road to that objective, and it's rising at 5 a.m. every day that helps.

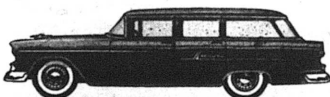

More School \$\$

It is no secret that the school system needs more money to operate at maximum efficiency, and the Board of Education is wisely taking steps to get the money as soon as possible.

There are, it would appear, two questions to settle:

1. How much should be asked for, and
2. How it should be asked for.

Experts have suggested to the Board that it would be wise to combine the present 6.5 mill levy for current operating expenses with the amount which is required as a supplemental levy so that one tax will suit the whole purpose. This will make for more efficient administration of the schools because the present levy and the new tax will be made to run for the identical period of time.

Unfortunately, the law is so constructed now that to do so would mean some sacrifice if the Board decided to ask for the money in a special or primary election. It would mean that combining the two requirements into one will result in a shortening of the term of the 6.5 operating expense levy. This is so because under the law a levy voted at the primary can run for two years only, and if at a special election, only one year.

For our part, we would wish the combination levy to run as long as is legally possible, which is five years. To obtain that term, it would be necessary to vote the money at general election time, in November. This is additionally desirable, because participation of the citizenry at the polls is usually higher in November than in May, and it is a good thing for all of the people to have a say in the running of the schools.

But it may be that the schools cannot wait that long. Teachers' salaries need to be raised. They need to be raised promptly, and a new teacher needs to be hired, as well.

Whatever the Board decides, we feel confident, the electorate in the school district will support, as it has in the past. Money spent on schools is money well spent. It is an investment in the future.

A New Clerk

The appointment of Richard L. Hamilton, a young Mansfield accountant, as clerk of the board of county commissioners is good news.

We supported his candidacy for county auditor in November for reasons which appeared to us to be cogent ones. Those reasons have not changed for the worse since he was narrowly defeated by a 1,200 vote margin. He is a young man of character, intelligence, and perseverance, and his abilities will, we think, grow with him.

The commissioners of Richland county are to be congratulated that Mr. Hamilton has agreed to serve in the post, for they have shown good taste and a sound judgment of a sound character.

It is difficult for us to comprehend, however, the duties of clerk to the commissioners would be such as to occupy more than a small part of the valuable time of a useful man. We think it would be wise for the commissioners to look about them to see if there are not some other jobs, perhaps those done by less satisfactory employees, that can be given to Mr. Hamilton, so that his salary can be raised to the point where continued service to the county will become attractive to him. It would be a grave mistake to hire someone to do a good job and then lose him because we do not make it worth his while. Good family men do not come cheaply, and children have a way of wanting to be fed 12 months a year.

The commissioners would do well to remember that.

Survey Shows Cost Of Running Schools

Just what does it cost to run a 500-pupil school system? Electors of Plymouth local school district may well be asking such a question between now and November, when it is likely the Board of Education will ask for an additional levy of two mills for operating expenses.

Figures furnished by the clerk of the Board, Earl C. Cashman, show that eight categories of appropriations require funds from the general revenues of the Board.

Personal services is, of course, the largest single category. Plymouth local school district appropriates \$195 for salaries for members of the Board, \$1,200 for the clerk's salary, \$50 for the school census taker (Miss May Fleming), and \$5,400 for the superintendent, M. J. Con.

The clerk or secretary, Mrs. Kenneth Myers, draws \$1,890, and the sum of \$62,000 is paid to teachers in the schools. Bus drivers draw another \$2,835 and custodial staff receives \$7,218. 59. A total of \$50 is reserved for special lectures, including the commencement speaker. The grand total is \$80,358.59.

Supplies cost a total of \$9,700, of which \$300 is for the administrative office, \$1,200 for motor vehicles and \$8,200 for educational supplies, \$3,300 for fuel, \$1,100 for custodial supplies, \$50 for recreational materials and \$50 for miscellaneous.

Maintenance materials, covering buildings and grounds costs, amount to \$850 annually, and equipment replacement funds total \$200. The item "Contract and Open Order Service" is often misleading. It covers repairs to the school building, \$3,375.22; motor vehicle repairs, \$700; educational equipment, \$250; other repair to educational equipment, \$25; water, \$300; electricity, \$1,150; telephone, \$250; travelling expenses, \$150, and \$40 for legal advertising of bids, etc.

Insurance on the school properties comes to \$970 annually. Capital outlay for new motor vehicles, and other capital outlay such as building altera-

tions, changes, etc. - totals \$3,797.41. Health examiners' fees amount to \$400 annually, and the bond requirement fund has \$18,900 in interest serial bonds, \$7,200 in interest on serial bonds, and \$14,917.41 on "incidental expenses" - read payment of debt.

This all adds up to \$141,011, of which \$41,000 is for bond retirement. This, operation of the 500-pupil school system in Plymouth local school district amounts to \$100,000 a year, give or take a few dollars.

The funds with which to pay for the cost of operating the schools derive from property tax and state aid, plus other funds as established by law. Tax on property re-realizes \$48,378.24 with the present 6.5 mill operating levy, and the state assistance totals \$44,553. Other funds amount to \$6,461.75.

The balancing of income versus outgo thus shows that outgo exceeds income by roughly \$1,000. An additional two mill levy would realize roughly \$9,000, with which the Board would be able to:

1. Hire another teacher in the high school, as seems desirable.
2. Read here a cost of, say, on the average, \$3,000, leaving a balance of \$6,000.

By comparison, salaries of 23 teachers in the system, or an average of \$270 annually, which means \$5 a week.

The question is: Is the kind of technique we are getting worth a \$5 a week raise?

Mr. Helbig and Mr. Cheesman expire this year. Nominating petitions must be filed by Feb. 4.

The Board received an audit report of its accounts as kept by the clerk from E. Clifford Gilmer, state examiner, with an annotation of excellence. "Records of the clerk were found to be in excellent condition," the examiner said. "The minutes were well kept, neatly typed, and were clear, concise and complete, including a report of finances each month. The receipts journal, cash journal and appropriation ledger were properly posted and the cash journal reconciled with the bank each month."

"Bills were properly vouchered and showed evidence of being properly audited by the clerk and finance committee before being presented for payment."

The examiner found two small discrepancies in his report: encumbrance against funds for the following year in connection with the purchase of typewriters, which the examiner found to be incorrect and purchase of school buses on the installment plan. The Board noted that shortage of funds and the need to take advantage of lower price levels necessitated the actions, and the reprimands are procedural rather than substantive in nature.

The Board's general fund had a balance of \$599.53 as of Jan. 1. Revenue from property tax is figured at \$48,378.24 and from the state foundation \$44,553. Other revenue will be \$6,461.75. Annual revenue to the school district will thus be \$99,393.52. Bond retirement account balance as of Jan. 1 was \$12,943.35. Property tax revenue for the year ending bonded indebtedness will be \$27,074.06, with the total of indebtedness to be retired in the year 1941, \$1,017.41.

Lions Lose to Greenwich in Tourney; Graders Turn Back Plymouth, 34 to 24

Shiloh's Lions dropped a 66-52 decision to Greenwich's Shamrocks in the Union Holiday Basketball tournament Thursday night after tipping Union in the first round, 70 to 64.

Shiloh was unable to keep up with the killing Shamrock pace in the last period, when Greenwich outscored the Lions, 17 to 11. Shiloh dropped 10 of 15 tries at the charity line, while the Shamrocks had 10 of 22.

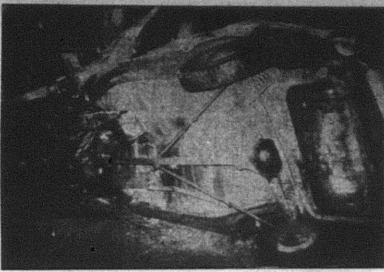

J. A. R.'s Weather Report

Precipitation totalled 1.91 inches, or .04 inch below normal. Snowfall totalled 3.6 inches.

The average temperature for the year 1954 was 52.2 degrees, compared with a normal of 50.7, or plus 1.5 degrees. Precipitation totalled 38.78 inches, compared with the normal of 35.54 inches, or plus 3.24 inches.

The highest temperature was 97 July 14 and again Sept. 5. The lowest was two above zero on Jan. 13.

Precipitation was below normal in six months, the driest being February, May, July, September and November, with a total of only 7.96 inches. June was the wettest month, with 7.52 inches, followed by April, 5.29; October, 5.24; and August, 4.42 inches. Snowfall totalled 22.9 inches of which 13.7 inches fell Mar. 1.

At the end of the year, wheat looked good, and despite the dry months crops in general were very good, although market prices were not up to last year.

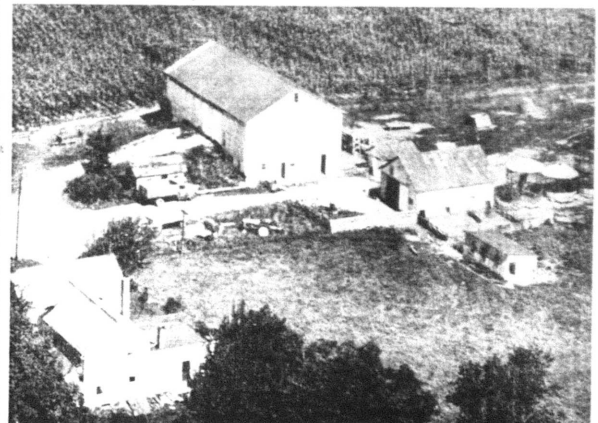
