

Plymouth Faces Lodi Tigers in Road Tilt

Favored on a comparative score basis by one touchdown, Plymouth's Pilgrims attempt to salvage some of their lost prestige on Richman field at Lodi tomorrow at 8 p.m.

The Pilgrims in a dismal showing went down before Buzz Wareham and the Butler Bulldogs at Butler Friday night, 33 to 6, and will be being to get back in the victory column.

Lodi's Tigers, coached by Tom Bangert, have had so far their most successful season in four years. The Tigers were beaten, 19 to 6, by Townsend-Wakeham in the opener, and defeated Wooster Reserves, 19 to 19, in their second contest.

Thereupon Lodi fortunes began to look up. The Tigers walked off LeRoy's Red Raiders, 44 to 0, and Friday whipped Seville, 37 to 7.

Lodi unveiled a passing attack

spearheaded by Jack Bittner, brilliant quarterback and president of the National Honor society at Lodi. Two hard-running halfbacks are John Egbert and John Ferguson, and Don Darrah at fullback has been an important point getter.

In the forward wall, the Tigers will play Dave Friend and Harry Baker at ends, with the possibility Tom Scott may get the starting nod at one flank; Keith Massie and Bill Daly at tackles. Larry Scott and Matt Davis at guards, and Tom Wilson at center.

Plymouth fans will recall that the Scott boys are the sons of Correll Scott, a graduate of Plymouth High school with the class of 1933 and now a prominent grocer in Lodi. The boys are the great-nephews of Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Pugh of 45

place hand will present a special last-time show.

Bangert, in his first season at the helm of the Tigers, has done a good job of instilling spirit into his squad. He came from the head coaching post at Highland, where he was used to winning. Highland romped over Butler, 57 to 21, two weeks ago.

The Pilgrims, defeated but not discouraged, will start, offensively, Ray Einsel at quarter, Marty Hampton and Ted Fox at halves, and Bud Berberick at full. On the forward wall, the Red and White will have Ed Taylor and John Fetters at ends, Floyd White and Frank Eckstein at tackles, Mickey Hampton and Dave Wallace at guards, and Jim Jacobs over the ball.

Richman field is east of the village square in Lodi, in the south side of U. S. 224 opposite the greenhouse. Fans should

continue east in Wooster street after clearing the underpass at the intersection of U. S. 42, pass the second traffic light, and continue for 600 yards to the field.

Bulldogs Turn on Pilgrims, 33 to 6

Swept off their feet early in the first period by two touchdown jolts, Plymouth's Pilgrims never regained their composure and wound up a dismal showing in equally dismal weather at Butler Bulldogs, 33 to 6.

Before the crowd of under 400 was settled in its seats, Russ (Buzz) Wareham, sophomore fullback, had scampered 48 yards for the first Bulldog score. Before the contest was two minutes old, Art Coon, another long-standing Pilgrim nemesis, returned a fourth-and-less-than-one punt for 78 yards and the second touchdown. Grandstand quarterbacks thought the Pilgrims might have done better than to punt under the circumstances - six points down and needing a retaliating score to lift morale.

But the Pilgrims had elected to kick at the visitors and apparently Coach Lew Pettit's strategy called for this move. The Pilgrims seemed to snap out of their lethargy in the second quarter. They took possession on their own 25 after Wareham's punt was nabbed on the fly by Ted Fox. Marty Hampton, who carried most of the burden for the hapless Pilgrims all night, tore off three first downs, and on fourth down, with less than three yards to go for

first down, Hampton skidded off-left tackle for a first down. It seemed the Pilgrims could get back in the ball game, but time ran out as they punched to the Butler 32.

Shoddy blocking and a let-down in attitude caused the Plymouth more heartache in the third quarter, during which Butler scored 19 points and broke the Pilgrim bubble.

Wareham's 76-yard hike with a handoff from Coon boosted the score to 26 to 0 after John Fout had nailed one of Ray Einsel's 20 aerial endeavors for an 18-yard trip to pay dirt.

Wareham was to cap his brilliant performance with one more launt before he wuit for the night. Later in the third period, he broke off tackle on his own 15 and rambled untouched for the fifth Bulldog score.

Plymouth mounted a short passing attack and Marty Hampton's running signal early in the fourth canto and punched across a score. A second touchdown on a pass to Ed Taylor in the end zone was called back and the Red and White was nailed 15 yards for offensive holding.

Butler had apparently scouted the Pilgrim offensive quite thoroughly. Even though the wet field prevented passing of the

ball so frequently as the Pilgrims had shown a want to do in three earlier games, seldom were the receivers of the short, flat passes that have characterized the Pilgrim attack allowed any freedom. The crashing Butler ends effectively bottled the Plymouth passing game. Shoddy blocking in the forward wall caused the ground attack to sputter and malfunction.

If the Pilgrims intend to defeat Lodi's Tigers, they will need to treat the Medina county eleven as tigers and not kittens. Lodi's Jack Lizzotte scouted the Pilgrims during the first three periods and went home, saying he had seen enough.

Pages Reminisce On 59th Anniversary



Sunday was a red letter day for George and Mrs. George Page of Railroad street, Shiloh. They observed with a quiet family dinner the 59th anniversary of their wedding, which took place at the home of Mrs. Page's parents in Ocean street, Cleveland, Oct. 7, 1896. The Rev. Dallas J. Osborne, pastor of the Madison Ave. Church of Christ, performed the ceremony.

The Pages came to live in Shiloh shortly after their marriage and set up housekeeping. Mrs. Page states, in the upstairs apartment over what is now Dr. Butner's office in East Main street. A millinery store, operated by a relative of Mr. Page, was in the room below. Mr. Page, who with Fred Wolfersberger edited the Shiloh Review for several years before his marriage, sold that business to his partner and set up a butcher shop in a frame building near the corner where the Tower Restaurant until recently stood.

"The buildings were much different and the business places much more diversified then than now," Mr. Page reminisces. "The buildings on the south side of West Main street were all made of wood and have since burned down or been replaced. P. B. Ward had a furniture store on the corner of Church and Main and Dr. J. O. Clowes had an office upstairs. In the Bakentowne building John Koerber had a grocery and Clem Backenstow a dry goods store. George Dickerson had a meat

market where Frank Seaman now is. William Koerber had a grocery east of there and George Newhouse had a tailor shop on the corner.

"On the east side of the tracks where our hatchery now is a man by the name of Race manufactured extracts in the upstairs part and, incidentally, the first sticky fly paper ever made in the United States. A lot of things come back to a fellow when he goes to thinking back."

The Page hatchery business started with a 50-egg capacity incubator when the couple lived for a short time in Alliance. Later they moved to the farm in the Bowman street road now owned by Vinson Reber and gradually expanded it until occupied two floors in East Main street.

The Pages have three children. Joe, of Shiloh, who with his wife, Queen, now operates the hatchery, Reed of Aubuqueque, N. M., and Dorothy, of Pasadena, Cal.

Only Joe of the three children was able to be present at the dinner Sunday. However, Mr. Page's two sisters and brother-in-law of Plymouth, Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Culver and Miss May Page, were present. Afternoon visitors were Mr. and Mrs. Will Wilkerson of North Fairfield and Mrs. Emma Slayhaugh and grandson Paul Stoodits of Shelby.

Firehouse Addition Nearly Completed

The 20x38 concrete-block addition to the Shiloh Fire department building in Main street is nearing completion. 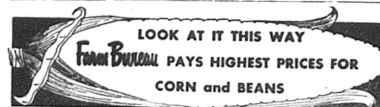

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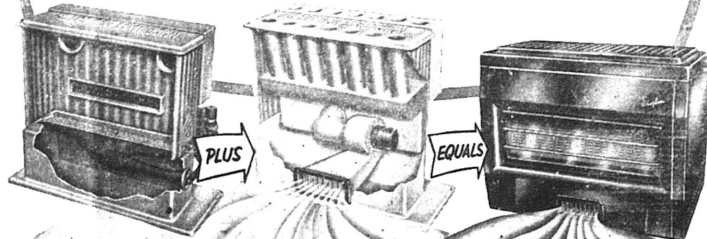
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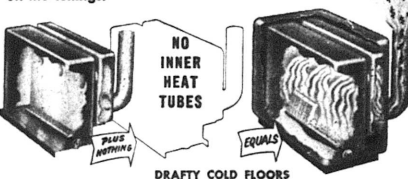

A Little Less Electioneering By Public Servants

It has become the rule more than the exception to have supplemental questions placed upon our ballot. This year the three-mill levy is the principal local question, and we have already said where we stand on that point.

The state is asking for a tax of one additional cent on each pack of cigarettes to finance improvements in mental hospitals, universities, and the public school establishment.

In principle, we are opposed to such special purpose taxes. What it amounts to is that only one segment of society - that which smokes cigarettes - bears the burden that should be borne by the whole population. Because better mental hospitals, better schools, better universities benefit all of us, not just those who smoke cigarettes.

We suppose that Ohio amendment one should be given a favorable vote, but we frankly confess we do not like the electioneering that is being carried out by employees of the public payroll. At the Ohio State-Illinois football game, we sat with 82,000 other paying spectators while some university flunkies or other told us by public address system that we ought to vote for this measure.

It is not proper for a public servant to electioneer unless that servant wants to put his name down on the ballot and take his chances with the next fellow.

Nor should those who cannot vote, and are not mature enough to know the consequences of voting, be pressed into services to electioneer for issues which may or may not directly benefit them.

School children depicted as needing facilities and materials are perfectly acceptable when presented by a newspaper or a disinterested citizen, but when so presented by their teachers or administrators are a serious violation of what little ethics remains in our political system.

Yes, we say vote for amendment one, and pay through the cigarette pack. Our mental hospitals are in a deplorable state. We need money, and if it can't be raised any other way, then let the smoker pay it. Any way is better than none.

But let us also put our foot down as regards this electioneering by all public officials, and notably by those who more often than not have no stake in the taxes which pay for what they are campaigning for.

Around The Square with Phineas Whittleseed

A true story came to our notice one night last week, and it's such a sad story that points up one of the many arguments we've been making for so long that they probably catch all kinds of hold-for putting it in here. But here goes.

In a town not more than 20 minutes from this place, there's a young Protestant minister who has enjoyed a good reputation. He has progressed gradually since he finished theological seminary and he has done a good job in every charge he's had. More or less pulled weak churches up by their boot straps.

He has a pretty and charming wife, or he did have until recently. They have three children. She went head over teakettle for the choirmaster and in due course brought home another youngster to the minister. He tried to be forebearing about it, said if God could forgive, he guessed he could, and took the child as his own. But after a bit she began the thing with the choirmaster all over again, and the minister could take no more.

So he filed suit for divorce, charging adultery. She did not defend the action. But when the case was heard, the common pleas judge awarded her the decree, gave her custody of the children, and forced a property settlement on the minister that tore his household in two.

And to top it all off, the good old biddies who make up the church (as most small-town Protestant churches, this one is primarily older ladies) now think the minister was holding out on them, that the good judge must've known something they didn't, and the minister has been told they're asking him to leave.

When we talked to him he was ready for drink. Several drinks. And we couldn't blame him a bit.

Nor could we offer him any solace. For that's the way it goes all over the country. Women have rigged the show to the extent that all they've got to do is holler wolf and a man is in the soup. If either of the judges who preside in our two counties - or anywhere else, for that matter - will be honest enough to tell us how come, we'll forever hold our peace.

Men who've known Judges Vetter and Kalbfleisch (and the intent here is not to single them out, particularly, but to bring out positive facts) or any other judge who were practicing law, they recognized this fearsome development in American sociology. What transpired after they put on the robes that caused the change of attitude?

And is it statistics they want to back up this somewhat broad statement? In one court, 81 per cent of all divorces sought were on the woman's petition. Yet 94 per cent of all decrees granted were given women. In the other court, women sought 78 per cent of all divorces (understand, we're taking the facts from one published calendar of court) yet 91 per cent of all decrees granted went to women.

And the custody of children was given the woman, whether or not the guilty party, in all but two per cent of the cases in the first court and all but one per cent in the other.

Despite the fact we feel deep down in our hearts that it was a bad thing to turn so much of American life over to women, we're smart enough to recognize that's how the land lies and any effort to overturn it will only lead one to slaughter.

But over the years we've realized that many women have good heads on their shoulders and won't put up with unfair play any more than a man will. Here is one step the ladies' organizations and clubs could take that would make them worth weight in uranium; get the facts home about women, particularly those who are no better than they should be and then throw themselves fearfully upon the mercy of the court and twist the male partner to the deal around their little fingers so badly he never can stand up straight again.

Any man who goes to a reputable lawyer as plaintiff in a divorce case knows this fact: after hearing the evidence recounted, the lawyer leans over the desk and says, more or less, "I'll take the case for \$125, but I warn you, you're going to lose, and you're going to pay."

No honest lawyer would do otherwise.

And we submit it's darn sad commentary on the kind of country we've become.
