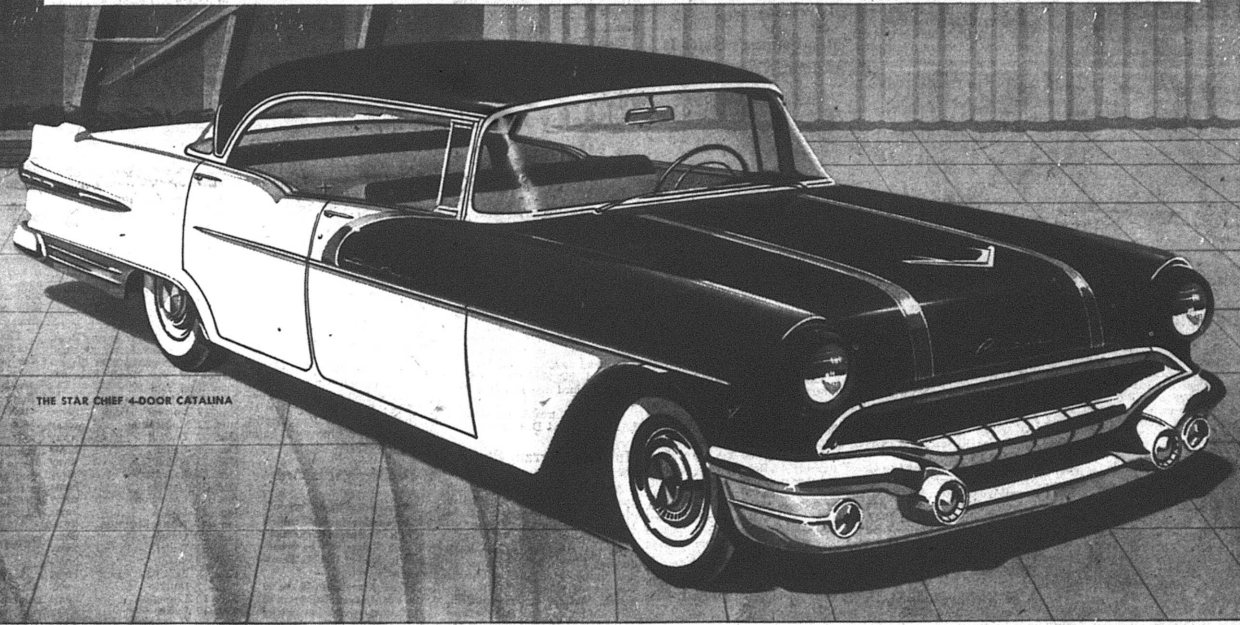
Three Give Papers On Noted Women

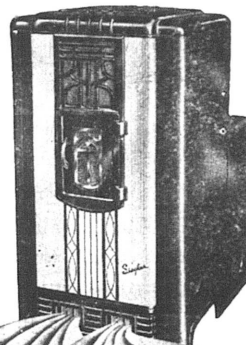

This week there appears in this newspaper an advertisement submitted in behalf of organized labor to induce registered voters to approve Ohio amendment four.

The amendment relates to the raising of unemployment compensation, and we are opposed to it with every fiber of our being. To enact the amendment with the support of the majority of the voters would be to perpetuate the idea that the "government owes folks a living", initiated and nurtured by the late Franklin D. Roosevelt of unhappy memory. For the amendment makes

sitting down more profitable than standing up and working.

We urge our readers to defeat the amendment. But there is one point we want to make abundantly clear: we respect the right of the labor group to have its own opinion, and to speak and write that opinion, wherever it may choose, subject to the usual rules of decency and good taste.

We find nothing objectionable in the advertising copy submitted to us, except that the whole idea is wrong. But we accepted the advertising because we believe it is our obligation as a newspaper to present both sides of a controversial issue.

Had we not received the advertising, we would have refrained from comment upon this issue, because we could not honestly present both sides. This was not only because we do not believe in the labor side of it, but because our space availability precluded the exhaustive treatment necessary.

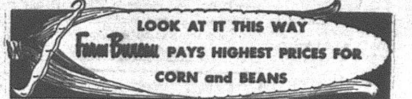

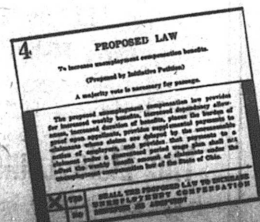

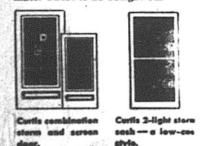
