

'Start Mailing Now' Says Postmaster; Avoid Xmas Rush

"It's time to start those Christmas mailings!" Postmaster Claude E. Sourwine warned today, launching his 1955 "Mail Early for Christmas" campaign.

"On the calendar it's a month away but here in the Post Office it's Christmas time and every day until Dec. 25," he said. The post office inkwells have been filled and in fact everything is ready for the mammoth flood of Christmas mail that is expected to smash all records.

The post office has already sent a heavy quantity of gift packages to members of the armed forces overseas. Christmas cards for service personnel can still be delivered in time if they are sent by air mail before Dec. 10. In the continental United States, smart people are now mailing gifts to friends and relatives living in other states.

Postmaster Sourwine especially calls on housewives to hurry in his effort to deliver every package and Christmas card before Dec. 25. "The lady of the house," he emphasized, "is really in charge of each family's Christmas mailing program. She selects the Christmas cards, buys most of the gifts and sees to it that the mailing list of friends and loved ones is up-to-date."

"Actually, success in having all Christmas gifts and greeting cards delivered on time is largely a matter of advance planning and preparation which should be done this week," Postmaster Sourwine points out.

He urges the following steps be taken at once: Get out the Christmas card list and carefully check through it. Make sure each address includes the full name, street and number, city, zone and state. Then stock up on stamps (use three cent stamps on your Christmas cards for first-class mail service) and ask any questions you may have about mailing regulations.

This can be done in a leisurely way if you will come to the post office before 10:30 a.m. for between 1:30 and 3:30 p.m. thus missing the rush hours. On your way home pick up a supply of heavy wrapping paper, sturdy cartons, strong cord and Kraft paper adhesive tape. A modest investment in these necessities will pay big dividends in safe delivery of your cherished Christmas gifts. Plan your mailing schedule. Packing is complete, plan your mailings so that those off the most distant points go first. Try to get all long-distance mailings into the office before Dec. 5 and then for nearby points should be mailed by Dec. 10.

Pilgrims Vie for Homecoming Win

With an opportunity to set a new record for victories in a single season, Plymouth High's football team met Townsend-Wakeman's Rough Riders in Mary Fate park tonight before a Homecoming crowd.

The game will be broadcast by Station WABG, Ashland, at 8. The Pilgrims take a record of four wins and a single defeat into the contest against a team which has been weak this season, but which always manages to give the Red and White a battle.

Townsend-Wakeman started off with a 19 to 0 defeat of Lord's Tigers, and thereafter dropped contests to Boston, Buckeye, and Norway, before defeating Seville's hapless Barbers at New London Tuesday night, 19 to 0.

On form, the Pilgrims should be rated five touchdowns better than the Rough Riders, but not even the most rabid supporter

expects such a lopsided score. Coach Lew Pett, who scouted the Townsend-Wakeman eleven Thursday, will settle for a one touchdown margin.

For the Pilgrims, the contest closes out the home season, with only a contest against Jackson-Burgoon at Burgoon remaining. For six seniors, it will be the last performance in grid tots before a home crowd.

They are Marty Hampton, workhorse halfback; Bud Berberick, fullback; Tom Marvin, end; John Fetters, end; Jerry Lillo, tackle, and Floyd White, tackle.

The Pilgrims will keep a weather eye peeled for two blue-bladed players in tonight's contest. Bill Bailey, quarterback, engineer's Coach Dick Ziegler's offensive. Bill Jackson, who never played football before this, his final season, is the scabback. He has romped for 57, 63, 65, 81 and 34 yards for Rough Rider scores this sea-

son, as well as through the line for shorter touchdowns. Leading scorer of the Townsend-Wakeman team, he favors the right side for end sweeps.

Another back who can bluff through for heavy gains on off-tackle plays is Jerry Gillman, a junior.

The Rough Riders will have an all-veteran backfield of four seniors on the field at the starting whistle if Ron Link's ankle injury mends in time. Bill Bement and Dick Jarrett are two senior flankers who will play for the first time against Plymouth. Ron Hauptnick, a senior, and Neale Timbs, a junior, are the tackles.

Sophomores and juniors comprise the center of the line. Ken Bement, a third-year man, and Lynn Ballitt, a soph, at guards, and Fred Rippon, another soph, at center.

The Rough Riders are the

heaviest team in the Lorain-Medina conference, from which competition. Townsend-Wakeman seconds this year to join the newly formed North-Central Conference.

For Plymouth, Coach Pett anticipates no change in his starting lineup. The backs will be Ray Emsel, Marty Hampton, Ted Fox and Berberick. Up front Pett will go with Ed Taylor and John Fetters at ends, Frank Eckstein and Floyd White at tackles, Mikes Hampton and Dave Wallace at guards, and Jim Jacobs at center.

If the Wakeman band accompanies its team, Plymouth supporters will see and hear a fine small aggregation under the direction of a Negro instructor who favors modern music.

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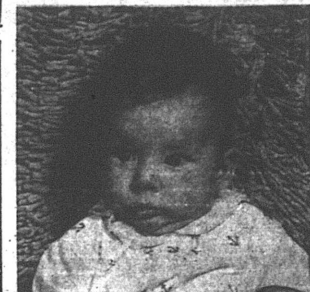

Two weeks are left before it will be our duty to cast our ballot for the first time in Ohio. We are frankly disappointed with the prospects for the coming election.

Because for the first time in our lives we wanted to vote on issues. Personalities aside, we wanted to have things so clear cut in our own minds that by voting one way we would be striking a blow for good citizenship and good government, and by voting another we would be doing the converse.

We have tried very hard to induce

those who seek the offices for which the incumbents are candidates to succeed themselves to set down what they consider to be the issues. Two or three have invited us to go to hell, and another said "I won't have nuthin' to do with the press, 'tain't any of your business."

In another time, another place, we would not hesitate to publish the names of those who responded in that manner. Because the citizenry ought to know who they are.

But by observation we discover these candidates do not act that way only toward us, but to others as well. And thus we have learned a lesson: a man who is personally an ass cannot but behave like an ass when he gets into public office.

We have watched the affairs of this, our village, more closely than those who hold office in it, because we have attended the meetings of every public board on a regular basis. We have seen good and bad, but we hasten to say the

most of it has been good.

And so we shall be guided by these principles when we go to the polls.

1. We are for progress, for building this community into a bigger and better place in which to live, for civic and municipal improvements that are likely to induce a responsible small industry to settle here. Those candidates who seem to us to be for those same things, and who have acted - whether publicly or privately - in accordance with those beliefs will get our support.

2. Whenever a citizen holding public office, for what little there is in it for him, has done a good job, and is willing to run again, we think he deserves a vote of confidence. But only if we are sure that the man who is running against him cannot do a better job. Without casting any aspersions against any candidate, we do

not believe that any incumbent who has done a good job is opposed by a candidate who can do a better one.

In the next year or two, as sure as he made little green apples, we are going to have to take action on a school addition, a new sewer system, and a new industry. The state will see to the first two, and we will see to the latter one. You can bank on it. And you'd better vote right at the polls.

In principle, we are opposed to sending money for charitable purposes out of town. We feel it can and should do so much more good at home. Which is why we have given for the last time to any charity drive except one of, by and for this community.

An exception to this rule is the UNICEF drive Monday night. Only those who have seen the pitiful situation of a good portion of those 28 millions can be really appreciative of what even a dime does. Give generously.

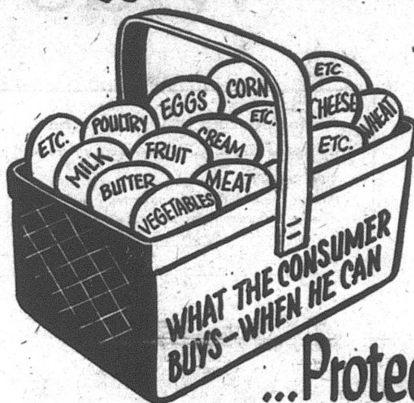

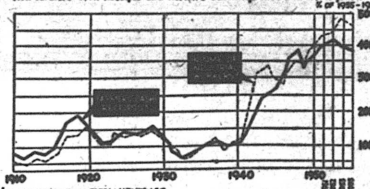
