

Lack of Quorum Stops Passage of Ordinance

Failure to produce a three-fourths quorum prevented the village council from passing a \$300 supplemental appropriation ordinance Tuesday night. Absence of John Dick and Mayor Glenn West precluded the voting of three-fourths of the council.

The police committee told Special Patrolman Frederick Lewis it felt he could have a \$50 a year raise in addition to the \$30 uniform allowance voted him. This compared with Lewis' request for \$120 annual increase. He did not appear to be happy with the committee's recommendation, which chairman J. Ben Smith made clear was subject to approval by the whole council.

The council learned that delay in appointment of an administrator in the estate of the late Henry Chapman has prevented the Board of Public Affairs from proceeding with the water development plan. Mrs. Chapman having been named, the Board now will proceed with the binding contract executed by her and her late husband.

Interment was in Greenlawn cemetery here.

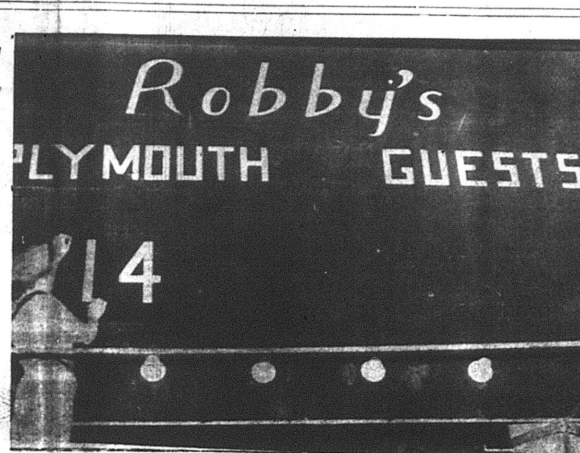

New Grid Loop Set for '56

Organization of the North Central conference for 11-man football competition among seven class high schools among which Plymouth High school - was effected Tuesday night in Greenlawn.

Plymouth Favored To Win from Losers Of Two in a Row

Plymouth's Pilgrims go after their fourth straight victory and a new lifetime record for local 11-man football at Butler tomorrow night against Butler's Bulldogs, losers of two and winners of one.

The Pilgrims do not underestimate the opposition, and will be prepared for trouble. Butler trounced Mt. Vernon Reserves 38 to 12, in the opening contest, but has taken two successive beatings, from Granville an Highland, 21 to 14 and 57 to 21. The Bulldogs have rolled up 73 points with a sporadic offense and have given up 90 points to the opposition in three games.

By comparison, the Pilgrims on paper look to be the superior eleven. The Plymouth squad has totalled 123 points in three games while giving up only 24 points of one.

And in Ed Taylor, sophomore end, the Pilgrims have what appears to be the leading schoolboy scorer in the state. Taylor has caught eight touchdowns in three games, for an average of 16 points a game. Until convincing evidence to the contrary is presented, Plymouth followers will insist Taylor leads the state.

From the beginning of the season, Coach Lew Pettit has insisted on saving the best for Butler. Heretofore, a concussed super-duper may thus be expected Friday night.

Pettit anticipates no change in his starting lineup. John Fetters, quarterback, a good player, Friday's conquest of Seville but is expected to be ready for the opening whistle. Tom Marvin, senior letterman, has what doctors think may be a cracked rib, but it is not serious.

If the Pilgrims win the toss and receive, Taylor and Fetters will go at ends, Floyd White and Frank Eekstein at tackles, Mickey Hampton and Jim Fidler at guards, and Jim Jacobs at center.

Fay Einsel will run the attack. As its principal passer - and Plymouth has scored 13 of its 18 touchdowns directly through the air - Einsel will be closely watched by the Bulldogs. Marty Hampton, who has scored 13 of its 18 touchdowns, will run at halfback with Ted Fox, and Bud Berberick will be at fullback.

One bright spot in the Plymouth defense has been the development of two newcomers, Dave Wallace, a freshman, and Jerry Lillo, a senior. Both a thicket running have progressed rapidly as defensive guards.

September Weather

September, 1955, was a dry, warm month. Rainfall totaled only 1.24 inches against a normal of 3.08 inches—a deficit of 1.84 inches. This was the driest September since 1940, when only .82 inches fell. The deficit for the nine months of 1955 now totals 5.80 inches.

The average temperature for the month was 67.4 degrees or 2.3 degrees above normal. The highest was 95 on the 17-18th, the lowest 40 on the 12th.

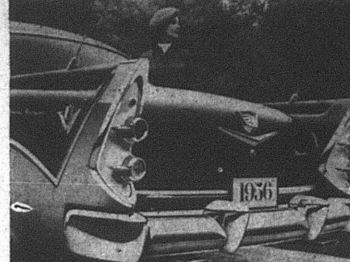

Pilgrims Wallop Seville, 44-6, Here

The brilliant running of Marty Hampton and the ever-reliable passing combination of Ray Einsel and Ed Taylor led Plymouth High's Pilgrims to a 44-6 triumph over Seville in Mary Kate park Friday night. It was the third straight win for the Red and White, the most in one season in the history of 11-man football.

The Barbers drew first blood as John Mathys and Dave Smucker combined their several talents that carried for 38 yards and three first downs before Warren Clapp pitched to Smucker in the end zone early in the first period.

The Pilgrims retaliated after the ensuing kickoff. Hampton ripped over tackle for 11 yard, 13 yards, and 32 yards on successive plays before Ray Einsel's bobble momentarily stalled the Plymouth attack on the Seville 16. The Barbers could not gain. Clapp punted to Hampton, who bulled it back 32 yards before taking a handoff from his quarterback and heaving to John Fetters in the end zone for 25 yards and a score. Hampton's buck was good.

Just as the second period began, Hampton and Fox combined to bring the ball up from their own 19 to the Seville 45, whereupon the veteran halfback took another hand of from Einsel and galloped 47 yards for another touchdown, reversing his field twice en route.

The Pilgrims broke Hampton loose for another nifty dash in the waning minutes of the half. This one went for 17 yards, and coupled with a 15-yard setback against the Barbers for slugging, brought the Pilgrims to the Barbers' 33. Hampton scooted around right end for his second touchdown, and Fox hit right guard for the point.

Don Beeman booted for Seville to start the second half and on second down, with nine to go, their own 11, the Pilgrims blocked nicely while Hampton tossed to Fetters, who covered 89 yards for the fourth touchdown.

Einsel was calling his plays almost to perfection by this time, and repeatedly caught the Barbers napping on second down with his flat passes. After the Barbers had recovered a Plymouth fumble and pushed to the Pilgrim 14, the locals held for downs. Einsel promptly heaved to Ed Taylor, who rumbled 78 yards for his first touchdown of the night. With 18 points added to his total, he became the leading schoolboy scorer in central Ohio.

Einsel was to toss twice more to the speedy sophomore end before the game was over. With five minutes of play remaining, the doctory sophomore signal caller picked out their favorite flat pass play to hit Taylor with a 17-yard pitch that Ed hauled all the way to the end zone.

If Seville thought this was all, it was mistaken. Einsel heaved to Taylor again with only two minutes left, this time from his own 32-yard stripe, and the lanky speedster galloped 55 yards for the score.

Seville's eleven, comprised primarily of unseasoned players, showed a remarkable brand of play, and gave reason to believe this squad will be a strong one to be reckoned with in a year or two. In Clapp and Mathys, Coach Chuck Comko has two effective backs who should go far in school-boy athletics after another season. Dave Smucker, a senior, was the war horse for the Barbers.

So when this issue is out on the street, its editor is going home to his easy chair with his thoughts and something soothing to his nerves to reflect on whether it's worth it all.

Only a blind man could fail to see that a heck of a lot of work goes on in this place. Our lights burn at all kinds of hours of the night, and for what? For a decent living? We doubtless could make more and work less if we followed the plumber's trade. For thanks? Gosh, the last time we got any thanks from anybody was when we picked up an old lady who had fallen in the street.

No, we work at this business because we have to eat something, and because there is something eating away inside us. All of us. It is curiosity, it is desire to know what's going on, and in those of us who are of an egghead turn of mind, it is eagerness to learn what is happening to us as a people, as a state, a nation, a civilization.

One hundred two years ago, a pretty

good newspaperman named David A. Locke founded this newspaper. It hasn't missed a week since then, though there've been times when it was a little late.

When you take hold of a thing that's 102 years old and you feel, as you must feel, the long tenure behind it, you don't get discouraged very easily. Winsty rose at the podium and began his oration. No sooner had he uttered a couple of dozen words than he spied over his bifocals our man Joe, and he interjected in his speech: "and, uh, I am glad to see among you my old friend, Mr. Joe Bailey, whom I am very glad indeed to see again."

This tied the characters around the square in all kinds of knots. They simply couldn't do Joe in, and his boasting became more and more insufferable.

Finally, one well-heeled citizen said he could show Joe up. He left sure Joe had never met the Pope, despite the fact he so claimed, and would pay all expenses to Rome to prove it.

Anyhow, they got to Rome and as they inspected the Vatican, Joe remarked that a certain balcony was the place where the Pope came to bless the multitudes.

The well-heeled friend suggested he go up and see the Pope, whereupon Joe disappeared. In 20 minutes or so he appeared on the said balcony with a small man in a white robe and skull cap. It was His Holiness the Pope.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO PROVIDING FOR ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTY DOLLARS UNIFORM ALLOWANCE FOR THE POLICE DEPARTMENT AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT: SECTION 1. The Police Department of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, shall be allowed annually, an expenditure equal to One Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$150.00) for uniform allowance for the members of the Police Department.
