New Haven Crash Kills Shelby Man, Hurts Companion

A Shelbyan was killed instantly and another seriously injured Sunday night when their sedan was struck broadside by a truck-trailer rig in front of the Seward Shell station at New Haven.

The dead man was Carson Blake Gose, 25-year-old Kentuckian who lived at 74 Second street, Shelby, driver of the car which drove from the station into the stream of Route 224 traffic. A truck driven by Edward Kemp, 26, of Dorset, smashed into its side.

Gose and his companion, Wilson Coover, 42, 42 Simeon avenue, Shelby, were thrown from the vehicle. Kemp's wheels passed over Gose's head and crushed his skull. Coover was taken to Willard Municipal hospital where his condition is still listed as serious.

The dead man was a press operator at Miller-Shelby Products Division, where he had been employed nearly a year, born in Sayreville, Ky., Aug. 5, 1910, he is survived by his wife Beverly and two children, four, and Ju-ene, 11 months; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Reginald Gose Willard, four brothers and two sisters.

Selecting Parkinson by Huge Majority —

Pupils' Straw Poll Right On Mayor, Nothing Else

In a straw vote that indicated almost exactly how the main political wind would blow, students in Robert N. Whitaker's problems of American democracy class at Plymouth High school supported Alfred Parkinson for mayor by a 25 to 3 count.

The students heard tape recordings of both candidates for mayor before voting.

Council choices were Glenn West, 26; Lowell Keith, 24; Thurman Ford and W. L. Fortney, 18 each; Omer G. Burkett, 17; W. Lawrence Cornell, 16; Maurice Bachrach and Clarence Ervin, 15 each; John T. Dick, 13, and I. D. Brougher, 4.

Board of Public Affairs nominees Francis Burrer and George W. Cheesman found favor with the students, all members of the Class of 1956. Burrer drew 19 votes and Cheesman 18. Robert L. McIntire and the other candidates with 15. Donald H. Levering had 14; Luther R. Fetters 11, and B. R. Scott 9.

Glen R. Evans was returned to the post of trustee of New Haven township (the students used the Huron county ballot), 24 to 3.

Twenty-four students voted for J. Harold Cushman for Richland county Board of Education, with runs for Earl Huston and four for Lewis L. Rinehart.

Board Studies Policy Over vs. Under Wires

A property owner who has installed underground electrical cable between his house and the village service line asked the Board of Public Affairs for a statement of policy as to whether he is entitled to reimbursement.

After lengthy discussion, the Board voted to consult with Ohio Power Co. and with other nearby municipalities to ascertain existing practices before reaching a policy decision.

Clerk Carl V. Ellis told the Board he had inquired in both Willard and Shelby and learned neither community is now making reimbursement.

It is customary for the village to install at its expense an overhead connection, which costs about 50 per cent less than an underground connection.

Property owners are installing underground connections to avoid the overhead lines, which they believe to be unsightly.

The oft-quoted sewer tax policy was cemented in other action by the Board when it voted to forego tax on vacant dwellings after 30 days, provided the landlord has notified the clerk of the vacating of the premises.

A \$2 refund was voted to Donald B. Bowersox, whose water meter was read mistakenly, and another \$19 to A. M. Koser, to reimburse him for repair work done for his account later discovered to be properly for the account of the village.

Glenn Burrer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Francis Burrer, has been re-elected president of the Lake Erie chapter of Paralyzed Veterans of America. The chapter comprises seven states. He is the only paraplegic who is licensed to drive a car, which enables him to visit other hospitals.

Recently Mr. Burrer was among the patients of Crile Veteran's hospital in Cleveland who presented a record album to Mayor Celebrezze of Cleveland. The album, "Nine Days for Americans," was made by paraplegic patients, and the proceeds from its sale will be used for further research.

Three Teachers Talk On Grading Thursday

Three high school teachers will discuss various aspects of grading as measurements of the student's progress at Thursday's meeting of the Parent-Teachers association in the high school.

Kenneth Nixon, mathematics teacher and high school principal, will discuss "Methods Used to Measure the Results of Learning." Bryan Millard, instructor of Spanish, will talk on "The Problem of Evaluating the Results of Testing and Measuring," and James Nowakowski, English instructor, will discuss "Purposes Served by Marks and Grades in the School."

Parents are invited to submit questions concerning grading and measurement for discussion at the meeting.

Mothers of students in the class of 1957 will serve refreshments at the close of the meeting.

Alfred M. Parkinson, 54-year-old retired Army officer, soundly defeated his more conservative opponent, Joseph A. Lasch, in Tuesday's mayoralty contest. The count was 352 to 187.

But Parkinson's officially endorsed ticket for council did not fare so well. Incumbents Omer Burkett and John T. Dick were reelected, but the outgoing mayor, Glenn West, who sought a council seat, and Councilman W. Lawrence Cornell missed reelection by a mere 11 votes.

Two other last-minute endorsements by the mayor-elect, Maurice Bachrach and Thurman R. Ford, all but stole the election. Bachrach got 387 ballots, Ford 308. With Dick and Burkett, they will comprise two-thirds of the new council. Lowell Keith, a barber, and Clarence Ervin, who polled 316 and 279 votes, respectively, make up the final one-third.

Carl V. Ellis won another term as village clerk, defeating Harry Vandervort, 325 to 153.

A new Board of Public Affairs will be installed. Its current president, Francis Burrer, got only 156 votes. He was outdistanced by George W. Cheesman, running for reelection, who got 322 votes; Robert L. McIntire, with 340 votes, and Luther R. Fetters, with 239.

Haldon Cheesman, candidate for reelection, and Donald P. Markley, whose petition was initiated by other members of the Board, won election to the Board of Education.

The renewal of the 6.5 mill school operating levy and assessment of a new three mill levy was approved by 327 votes to 82. The renewal of the one mill levy to maintain Greenlawn cemetery was passed, 278 to 106.

Returns in Precinct A - the Richland county side of the village - were posted first. A total of 302 ballots was cast in that precinct, where voters for the first time in a general election used a voting machine.

The issue was clear cut with these results, chiefly because the preponderance of voters lives in Richland county and its choice would show a trend.

An hour later, when precinct B's figures were known, there was no change in the issue.

Assured from the huge compulsory vote given J. Harold Cushman, president of the local school board, in his candidacy for Richland county school board - he polled 425 votes and outdistanced both of his opponents the vote-giver of Robert L. McIntire, a dry goods merchant who was making his first appearance on the political scene, was noteworthy.

In his home precinct, he garnered 190 votes, where as his nearest opponent, George W. Cheesman, who lives in Huron county, got only 172, and he crossed the county line and did as well in Huron county, with 150, as many as Cheesman got.

The surprise of the election was the defeat of West, who has served five years as a councilman and one term as mayor.

Frankly anxious to give up his post as mayor because he chooses to live in Florida three months of the year, West was keen to remain on the council. He did poorly in Richland county, where he got only 135 votes, a beaten by seven of the 10 candidates in the running, and somewhat better in precinct B, where he got 133 votes, good for only fourth-best place.

Einsel's Aerial Artistry Connects for Four Touchdowns by Taylor

Pilgrims Thump Burgoon to Close Most Successful Season in History

A 24-point touchdown outburst by Eddie Taylor and a strong ground game dominated by the first half showing of Marty Hampton led Plymouth's Pilgrims to their fifth victory of the season at Burgoon Friday afternoon, 31 to 12.

It was the final contest of the year for the Red and White, which won more games in the season than in all previous seasons combined. Too, it marked the end of independent class B football for the Pilgrims. Next year they will play four games in the North Central Football conference.

The Plymouth eleven asserted its mastery at the outset. Before the game was two minutes old, it had a touchdown. The Pilgrims kicked off and after Burgoon's offense had pushed to the Pilgrim 48, a fumble - doublet caused by the biting cold wind - was recovered by the visitors.

Marty Hampton burst off tackle for two first downs, Bud Berberick and Ted Fox picked up one each, and Hampton smacked off tackle for the score Fox's try for extra point gained nothing.

By the end of the first quarter, the Pilgrims were again rapping on the door. After a 15-yard holdpenalty had set them back to their own 11, Hampton punted out to the 40. Louie Smith fumbled and the Red and White recovered. Hampton bucked to the 48 and then Ray Einsel hit Ed Taylor with a pass on the Burgoon 33. Taylor was tackled and the ball squirted out of his grasp. John Fetters was right behind, nailed it, and continued to the 21. Here the quarter ended. On fourth down, Einsel tossed to Taylor for the touchdown.

The Pilgrims were unable to make any substantial headway for

the remainder of the half, but neither was the Burgoon eleven, despite having five downs in one series to get somewhere. The half ended with Plymouth on the Burgoon 12, two minutes after Marty Hampton and John Level, the respective line-backers, had been tossed from the game for alleged kneeing.

Chilled hands apparently no obstacle, Einsel threw to Taylor for the third score early in the third period. The play was good for 15 yards. It came after Taylor had returned the kickoff to the Burgoon 43 and Einsel's heave to the same fellow was good on the Burgoon 13.

Charles Baumeister, a big and rangy back, took personal charge of the affair for Burgoon at this point and after softening up the Pilgrim line with a series of charges which carried to the Plymouth 13, he sent Louie Smith through tackle for the score.

As the fourth period began, Einsel fooled the enemy with a sharp pass into the flat that carried for 42 yards and Taylor's third touchdown.

With four minutes left, Einsel - whose signal calling left little to be desired in this cold, dreary afternoon - hit Taylor with a beautifully maneuvered throw which the

speedy end gathered in on the Burgoon 40. He outran the secondary to the goal. The play carried 65 yards.

Taylor's play was the more outstanding because after Hampton left the game, the Pilgrims had no effective gainer through the line. For Hampton, who played marvellously well in his use of line, and half a dozen other seniors, it was the last contest in Pilgrim livery. John Fetters was the inspirational leader of the forward wall. Tom Marvin broke through on at least four occasions for crushing tackles behind the scrimmage line. Floyd White was dependable at tackle, and Bud Berberick for the first time this year got through a game without chest spasms. His pass defense was exceptional.

Jerry Lillo, in his first year of interscholastic football, was used on defense to middle guard. How valuable he would have been to the preceding Pilgrim elevens was demonstrated by his play in this and previous contests.

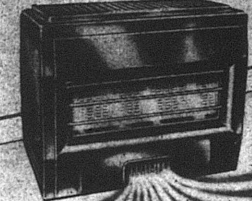

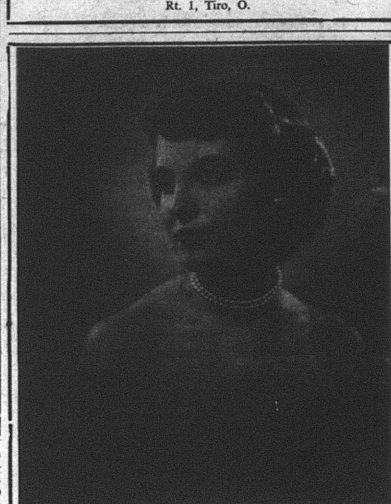
