

650 Attend Mothers' Club Dinner; Profit Is \$600

Mrs. Robert Kessler, treasurer of the Mothers' Club, has reported that over 650 persons were served Saturday night at the annual turkey dinner given by the club.

After all bills are paid, Mrs. Kessler estimates that a net profit of just over \$600 will be realized. It is planned that another collapsible table will be added to the all-purpose room of the elementary

school. Last year two tables were bought and installed for the school's use. Each table costs approximately \$360.

Gerald F. Caywood has donated two push carts to the elementary school. The carts were put to use Saturday night at the Mothers' club Turkey dinner to carry dishes from the dining room to the kitchen.

They will be used for dinners

and by the personnel of the kitchen for carrying heavy packages.

Well over 700 tickets to the dinner were sold, the committee reports. All but two turkeys were carved by a team consisting of Mrs. L. I. Hannum and D. B. Faust, Supt. M. J. Coon, Earl C. Cashman and Robert MacMichael. The dining room was in charge of Mrs. Robert C. Haas. Project committee of

the club — Mmes. Faust, Roger Miller and Harold Sloan — organized the dinner. Forty-one women served in kitchen and dining room before the day was out.

Two innovations this year made for improvement: diners were not sent through a service line but were served at tables, and a special table for businessmen was set in a side room.

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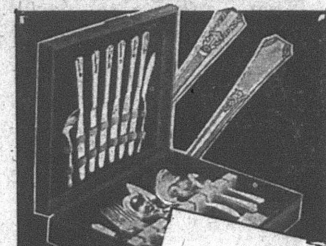

On The Questionnaire

Representative J. Harry McGregor once again has sent his appeal to his constituents for their guidance on some vital issues of the day.

We urge every resident of the 17th Congressional district to express an opinion and to send it to Mr. McGregor.

Unfortunately, the questionnaire this year is somewhat loaded. Under the heading of the farm program there is no inquiry about whether farmers would favor flexible price support with qualitative control instead of acreage control.

So far as we can see, and we have looked long and hard, the only solution to the farm price problem is to remove all price supports for grains which do not meet a very high qualitative standard. Allow farmers who persist in growing poor grain to do so to their heart's content, upon whatever acreage they may wish, but don't give them any supports. Not unless they produce a crop that is worthy of support. We personally have had enough experience abroad trying to sell inferior American agricultural products to know that there is no difficulty selling the best.

We doubt whether there will be very many who will express disapproval of the first question under the heading of the tax reduction plan - do you favor a uniform reduction for all? Certainly we do IF the government can stand it. That should be the criterion: can the government afford to forego the income that would be lost by a reduction in taxes? We do not think that it can.

We depart from the principle that we work hard in the years of our maximum production and highest earning power to pay debts which we contract while we're young. When we're older - that is, less able to afford the payment

of debt service - we do not contract so many debts. That principle should guide the government now.

And finally, the age-old tariff question. The two questions as written could be answered by any conscientious free trader with a check in the yes block. Certainly, tariffs on some manufactured items should be increased. And so should some tariffs on agricultural items.

But in the main, our national policy should be directed toward a general decrease of import duties. The reason for this is that it is better to assist an indigent cousin by doing business with him at a mutual profit than by loaning or giving him money.

The only way the European, Asiatic and African and Latin American countries can earn dollars with which to buy American manufactured goods is to sell their own products here. Everybody we know complains of sending huge amounts of grants-in-aid abroad.

One way to cut them down, if not stop them entirely, is to lower tariffs enough so the foreign countries can sell here. And to hang with the unemployment problem likely to be created here: we have sufficient faith in American know-how not to worry about that question.
