Two Seniors Take Exams for Award Of Scholarships

Two outstanding seniors at Plymouth High school competed in the new, multi-million dollar National Merit Scholarship program. R. N. Whitaker, social studies teacher, announced. These high ranking local students will be aiming at some 200 four-year college scholarships that can carry up to full tuition and living expenses depending upon the financial need of each winner. Winners will be chosen on the basis of their ability to profit from a higher education.

Jack E. McQuate and Mary M. Brinson were the seniors named to take a preliminary screening test given in the high school Oct. 26 as the first step. The competition was open to all secondary schools, and is the largest program of its kind.

The scholarship program is conducted by the National Merit Scholarship corporation, an independent, non-profit educational organization set up by grants of \$20,500,000. Aimed at the discovering and helping the most talented students in the country, the merit program permits the winners, known as Merit Scholars, to choose any accredited college or university and any course of study.

Some 800 runners-up in the competition will be awarded certificates of Merit, and their names will be announced to all colleges and other scholarship agencies as students of unusual ability.

Colleges chosen by the Merit Scholars will receive "scholarships" too, for the Merit Program also helps the undergraduate colleges. In return for educating the Merit Scholar, the college can receive a grant of up to \$3,000.

The National Merit Scholarship Corporation furthers its facilities and services without charge to organizations and individuals interested in offering scholarships and conforming to its standards. Such scholarships will bear the name of the sponsoring company.

Laniuses Return

Mr. and Mrs. John Lanius have returned to Willard, where they are temporarily staying with his sister, after a year's travel in the west. Mr. Lanius is hospitalized there with a case of pneumonia.



Jack Earl McQuate, elder son of Mr. and Mrs. R. Earl McQuate, 33 Railroad street, with a grade of 76, was the highest Richland county student in the Ohio history government and citizenship tests given by Ohio university.

He will go to the Ohio campus at Athens Nov. 18 and 19 in an all-expense-paid trip to compete in the finals for cash prizes and other awards.

Highest in the state was John Handley, Pomeroy, in Meigs county, who scored 89 per cent.

At the same time, another honor befell the young student.

Rep. J. Harry McGregor announced young McQuate is one of six youths in the 17th Congressional district eligible to take the state-wide examination for an appointment to the Air Force academy, Colorado Springs, Colo.

Editor to Speak

A Summit, Miss., editor whose effort to upset social security laws and crop quotas has gained her national publicity will speak in the high school tomorrow at 8 p.m. under the auspices of Associated Farmers of Richland, Huron and adjoining counties.

She is Mrs. Mary D. Cain, editor of the Summit Sun, an unsuccessful candidate - among nine - in her state last year. When the Internal Revenue department padlocked her establishment on charges she refused to pay withholding taxes, she arose from a sickbed to saw off the lock.

Two Killed in Freak Accidents Near Here

A 28-year-old brother of Mrs. Herbert Beeching of this place died in Norwalk Memorial hospital Sunday night of injuries received in a freak accident two hours earlier.

He was Martin Leslie Schreck, 75 South Gamble street, Shelby, a motorcycleist, who ran into his riding companion when the latter struck a dog in the new Haven-Monroeville road, two miles south of Monteville. The companion, Kenneth Beck, 20, also of Shelby, a brother-in-law of the dead man, was thrown from his machine. Schreck's motorcycle struck it and threw him off on his head. Death at 8:35 p.m. came of a fractured skull.

A Navy veteran of 21 months' duty in the Pacific during World War II, Schreck was an employee of Wilkins Air Force station. In addition to his sister, he is survived by his wife, Betty; a son, Robert, and a daughter, Connie Rae; his parents Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Schreck; Shelby, another sister, Mrs. Donald Monn, Shelby, and both maternal and paternal grandparents.

Funeral services were conducted yesterday by the Rev. Walter Adams, pastor of the Shelby Evangelical United Brethren church, with burial in Oakland cemetery.

Comer Gibson, 36, of North Delaware street, Shiloh was apparently killed instantly when he car overturned in a ditch in Free road east of Shiloh sometime Monday night.

He was found dead half out of his overturned car about 6:15 a.m. Tuesday by a Mr. Jennings, on his way to pick ore in a neighboring field. Gibson evidently had been dead for several hours.

Surviving are his wife, Mildred; five daughters Inez, Edna, Mildred and Mary (twins) and Diane, all at home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Gibson, of Kentucky, and one sister, Mrs. Carl Carter who but one week ago left here with her husband for Alaska, where he is stationed with the armed forces.

The body was taken to the McQuate Funeral home, Shiloh. Funeral arrangements are incomplete.

Council Votes Survey For Sewer Extensions

Sewer extension surveys will be carried out at once, the village council voted Tuesday night, and money from the general fund will be used to pay for the work.

The decision was not taken easily. Both Royal W. Eckstein and W. Laurence Cornell expressed reluctance to spend money now for a survey which they thought would have dubious value when the sewer disposal plant is eventually built.

Mayor Glenn West disagreed with this point of view. He said the surveys are required by the state, and will be useful because they have never been done before and must be done to complete the plans, a requirement cited by the state in issuing the dumping permit. His view prevailed, and the sum of \$5,500 was appropriated for this purpose.

An ordinance to raise the salary of Patrolman Frederick Lewis to \$650 annually from \$600 was given approval on an emergency basis, is effective from Nov. 1.

Bad Wiring Causes Two Fires in 24 Hours

Fire caused by defective wiring broke out in the home of Mose Waines, 81 Portner street, at about 1 p.m. Friday and caused about \$500 damages.

An entire room was burned out, and fire spread to the kitchen and living room. Mr. and Mrs. Waines and their son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Judson Morrison, next door until repairs can be effected.

The residence of J. B. Kennedy in North street caught fire Saturday morning. Defective wiring was believed also to have caused this blaze.

Smoke damage was extensive. The fire started in a garden room and burned that room and part of the kitchen.

Fire Chief Dalton F. McDougal declined the assistance of civil defense corps personnel in fighting the fires.

Parkinson Platform Has Four Planks

A four-point program which he will endeavor to institute if elected mayor was announced this week by Alfred M. Parkinson, 54-year-old retired Army officer who lives at 62 Woodland street.

"We must through necessity do everything possible," Mr. Parkinson said, for his first point, "to interest new industry here, if we expect Plymouth to grow with surrounding towns. There is no reason why industry should not take advantage of our truck and rail transportation facilities. I feel that that industry needs an invitation to come to Plymouth and look over a possible site-to-build on."

Full-fledged support of a sanitary sewer system is the second plank in his platform. "The time has come when we must do something about it. I intend to make this one of the main projects of my administration if I am elected. I don't believe the citizens of this community should stand the entire cost of this system. I believe the state should aid in financing a project of this size and intend to contact state officials with our case, in an effort to gain state aid. In any event, we must exhaust all means to accomplish this and get the sewer underway as quickly as possible."

Plans to provide recreational facilities for young people comprise Parkinson's third point. "I see no reason why we cannot have our own swimming pool here," he said. "We could use a theatre for the winter months. Ice skating should be revived this winter. The weather permits. We could flood the baseball diamond and use the floodlights. I feel we should have a nine-hole golf course in this town. This sort of course will call for a selling job to one or more of our able-bodied citizens. You can see why a long-range plan is needed."

Fourth point in his platform, the retired officer said, is a plan to remove dangerous trees before they are blown down, at the risk of life and limb.

Formerly mayor of Plymouth from 1946 to 1948 and a councilman for 14 years between 1932 and 1946, Lasch urged the support of Clarence M. Ervin, Ira Brougher, Maurice Bachrach, William L. Fort, Lowell Keith and Thurman R. Ford for council and endorsed the candidacies of Luther R. Fetters, Robert L. McIntire and Byron B. Scott for Board of Public Affairs.

In a prepared statement, he said, "I propose if elected as mayor or to attempt to give the village an honest business-like administration. By that I mean I will attempt to prevent any such recurrence of improper conduct as occurred in the position of village engineer. I will insist that no unnecessary expenditures be made and that like a good businessman I will insist on knowing if funds are available before I am available to pay for any goods or services purchased or contracted for by the village before such goods or services are bought or contracted for by the village."

"I will insist that an accurate budget be prepared for guidance in making such expenditures and purchases and that the governing body, the council, stay within the confines of such guidelines." With reference to the controversial sewage disposal system, Lasch said that "if elected I will attempt to work out some plan agreeable to the state health department to solve or start to solve this problem. I do not favor any additional indebtedness against the town or its citizens' property to carry out this program. Further, I intend to insist that the sewerage rentals now being collected shall not be expended except to further the development of the proposed sewage system and disposal plant."

On the subject of water supply, the candidate, who has lived here since 1922, said, "Naturally adequate water supplies must be provided and maintained for the health and fire protection of the village. I will make every effort if elected to have the village water supply at the lowest possible cost to the village."

"I will make every effort to provide such water supplies without enlarging the bonded indebtedness against this public utility any more than is required to provide such services. I intend to find out what the cause is of our recently producing wells is and what further supply and service is or will be required within the immediate future."

Mr. Lasch said he invited one of the two candidates for village clerk to accept endorsement of his group, but this offer was declined. He did not specify which of the two candidates was so invited.

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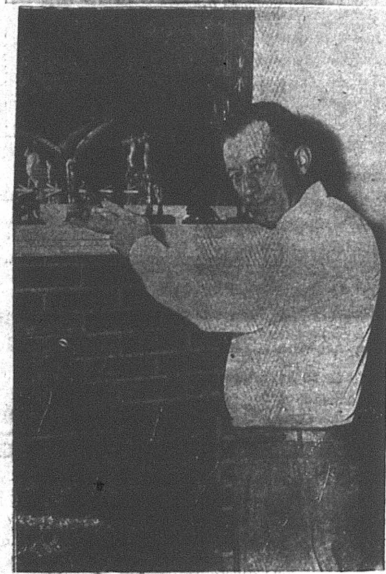
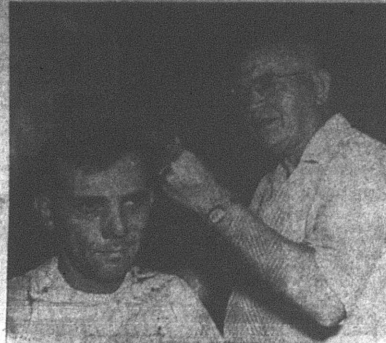
Balitches' Father Dies After Short Illness

ly spent we can do better for ourselves.

The weaker statement is, we think, of a negative nature. It says that its originator will, if elected, do all he can to improve conditions, but he doesn't want to spend any money to do it.

He and his cohorts must surely realize this is 1955. Because their predecessors on the village councils of yesterday were so short-sighted as to fail to plan (remember when Doc Searle urged a sewage system that would have cost only \$40,000?), the present council finds itself squarely up against a financial dilemma; it costs money to do things but nobody wants to pay any more taxes.

Additional taxes hit us just as hard as the next fellow. We don't like to pay 'em any more than the next chap, and we admit to spending long hours figuring how we can fool the government out of a bigger share of our wage dollar.

But we realize, as all sensible folks must realize, that if you don't go

ahead, you die. And to go ahead, to progress, you need to spend money. Not throw it away. Just spend it wisely.

Not one plank in the platform of the candidate who recommends we do something to attract industry, that we install a sewer system, that we undertake some recreational facilities for youth, and that we cut down some of the trees before they fall on and hurt one of our citizens seems to us to be out-of-the-way.

Quite the contrary. By comparison with what his opponent says, it smacks of vigorous action to improve conditions and to make Plymouth a better place in which to live.

This is not to be taken as a slur against the admirable points taken by the weaker platform. To safeguard our funds and to adhere to the regulations are certainly respectable points of view, and we endorse them.

But we said that that platform is the weaker one, and nobody would in his right mind take the weaker as against

the stronger.

We feel confident the voters of Plymouth will remember that at the polls.

The Cemetery Levy

For many years, the official policy of this newspaper has been to support tax levies to maintain Greenlawn cemetery. The present management of the newspaper, for itself, finds the whole principle of burial of the dead to be an offense against its religious beliefs, but like Her Royal Highness Princess Margaret sees the clear path of duty.

And that is to commend to the favorable notice of all that a great proportion of the citizens of Plymouth naturally look toward our Greenlawn cemetery as their final resting place. Their loved one is there, asleep under those towering trees. It would be a serious crime not to provide the money to discharge a duty we should never have taken on, but which is a duty and needs to be done.

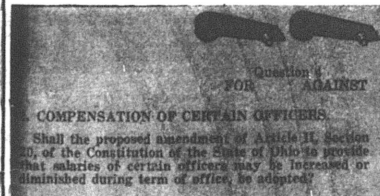

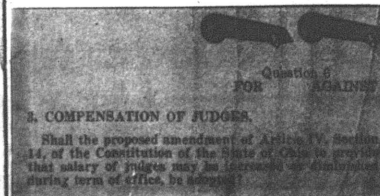

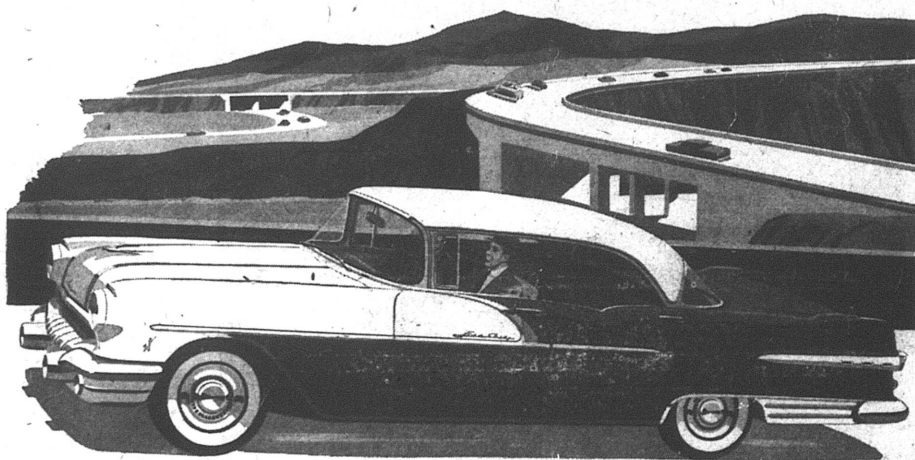

Around The Square with Phineas Whittleseed

When your nerves are worn to a frazzle, and you're slightly tired after a hard week, it's always fine to have somebody come in and make a nasty remark.

And even better when somebody rings you up on the phone and wno't say who he is, then makes a nasty crack.

These things don't happen to us often, but when they do, they make our blood boil. On press day last week, one gentleman, a man with whom we have been associated in juvenile athletics, rang us up, identified himself, and manfully, if a bit sarcastically, made inquiry about something that was sticking in his craw. Despite the fact we wholeheartedly disagree with what he thinks and says on the issue involved - and only on that issue - we'll punch the guy in the nose who says he doesn't have the right to so think. And we'll equally punch the guy who says we don't have the right to our own opinion.

The matter of what shall be published and what shall not be published is always a pretty hard line for an editor to follow.

In the past year or so we've had a few tough decisions to make: whether to report the arrest and commitment of a husband and father, whether to report the arrest of a boy accused of fathering a child, whether to print the apprehension of an individual on suspicion of sexual deviation, whether to report a simple family fight that kept the neighbors up till all hours.

We didn't, as most of the readers of this newspaper well know. But we simply will not hold still for any implication that we are covering up anything.

The question at issue, if it must be told (and we see no reason why it shouldn't) was whether the findings of the state auditor with regard to the purchase of village materials and supplies should have been given the same kind of publicity that our competitor gave them.

Our position is that these facts have been amply spread on the pages of this newspaper when they were first brought to light by the auditor on the occasion of his visit in connection with defalcations in the power and light plant. So far as we are aware, with one exception (due entirely to an arithmetical error), the offense - and it is that - has not occurred again. The instances when it did occur were due to ignorance and sloppy administration, a charge we've made before, rather than any intent to defraud.

We do not claim that the gentlemen serving on the village council are a bunch of angels, without any personal feelings on one issue or another. Nor do we say they are the best administrators in the world. But we do say they are honest, and we propose to vote for those who are running again, because we believe them to be honest, interested, and repenting of procedural mistakes.

If we thought for a minute the mistakes were substantive in nature, indicating a lack of moral character, we would be the first to go after their jobs and see to it that somebody more honest were put in their places.

As a newspaper is proud of the job it has done in keeping the public informed. It did not hesitate to publish the facts, harsh and bitter and slightly unfair though they were, about one of its good advertisers and a good citizen of this community in connection with the referenced defalcation. We did so because we believed the people have a right to know, regardless of whose feelings get hurt, in mat-

ters relating to the disbursement of public funds. Regardless of who is elected on Tuesday, we will continue to print the facts, without fear or favor, in instances where the public's interest is overriding. And we will continue to refute, with whatever means we can, any implication that we do not habitually follow that practice.

But at the same time we will be religious in respect for other people's rights and privileges, and we will give equal attention and sympathetic coverage to both sides of any issue.

We tried hard this year. We tried and tried to get the issues before the people. Fortunately, Joe Lasch and Al Parkinson were prevailed upon to speak up in a manner which everybody could consider and take note of. We wouldn't have it any other way, and we believe they wouldn't either.

But we remain convinced that the real task is to elect a council that is far-seeing and far-reaching, interested in making up the deficiencies in this our community that make it a second class town because we have inadequate public services, crowded schools, insufficient industry with which to keep our young people at home and happy, no program for the prevention of juvenile delinquency, 17 per cent of the dwelling houses in our town owned by the state of Ohio.

An election is one place to start to correct these matters. Think about it; think in your own mind, of the 10 men running for village council, which among them are aware of the needs, and have a concrete idea of how to go about it, plus the willingness to expose themselves to some public dissatisfaction to get the job done.

And when you're honestly done that, go and vote. The polls are open from 6:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m.

This year the number of different school issues and candidates which will appear on the ballot is almost overwhelming. Only a Philadelphia lawyer assisted by two lawyers of the stripe that hang around the Mansfield courthouse could figure them out.

On the ballot locally, the local school issues, as we have pointed out before, are two: the three mill levy, which we are opposed to in principle because it is a piecemeal solution of the problem, which we think ought to be solved by consolidation with Shiloh and New Haven, but which we are vigorously supporting with our vote and our urging, because without it our schools will go downhill fast; and the election of two members to the Board of Education.

We have endorsed the candidacy of Haldon Cheesman, on the grounds he has done a good job and all incumbents willing to run again should be returned to office if they have done a good job. We frankly do not know which of the other two candidates is the better qualified, and we will probably make a decision on our way to the polls. Nor will it be an easy one, nor one that will stand any debate. It's hard to choose between two first rate candidates.

In Richland county, Phin recommends a vote for J. Harold Cashman and Earl Huston to serve on the Richland county Board of Education. The other candidate may be a good one; we are not sure. We do not know him. But we feel, just as we felt when we endorsed the candidacy of Raymond L. Brooks for county commissioner a year ago, and would do so now, that it is always good to have individuals from our balliwick serving on county boards. So that is why we think Messrs. Cashman and Huston ought to be elected.

On the Huron county side, the candidacy of Walter Nord for State Board of Education seems to us worthy of the voter's confidence and support.

In Richland county, the lady from Mansfield, because she is from Richland county, deserves a vote if for no other reason than she comes from among us.

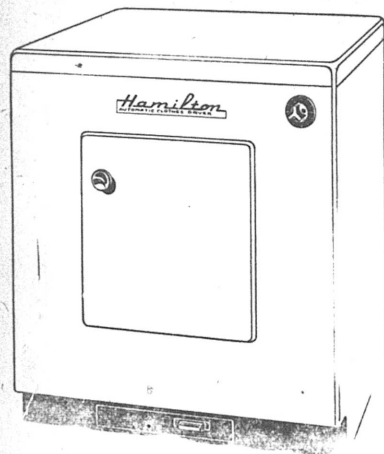

To the Shiloh School District Voters

Your Board of Education is submitting to you voters of the Shiloh Local School District the opportunity for your approval or disapproval of a 4 mill tax levy for the operation of your school.

The 4 mill levy outside the 10 mill limitation will represent a levy of 40 cents tax for every \$100.00 of valuation of your property or \$4.00 for each \$100.00 of valuation. 3 mills of this will be a renewal of the present existing 3 mills and 1 mill is additional. In districts of the state where there is less than \$800,000 property valuation for each pupil the State Legislature has made available to such districts what is known as Rehabilitation for projects such as repair to buildings and equipment, painting remodeling, etc. Your Board has participated in past years in remodeling class rooms, painting and decorating the entire building, rewiring and lighting, aid in the new building, construction and remodeling of the Home Economics room. Of the total cost of the above mentioned projects through Rehabilitation the Shiloh Board of Education has received 50% of the cost. The remaining 50% of the cost has been met by funds from the General Operating Fund of the School.

Now here is the problem of the Board at this time. Due to increased salaries and operating expenses, it will be impossible to take these matching funds from the Operation Funds but by the funds obtained from a 1 mill increase which will mean about \$3000. per year, \$3000.00 additional can be obtained from Rehabilitation giving \$6000.00 to be used annually or \$12000.00 bi-annually for projects as mentioned above. It is the intent of the Board to use the additional 1 mill for this purpose. In 1953, the total tax rate for the District for school purposes was 11.9 mills for operating and 3.4 mills for Bond Retirement or a total of 15.3 mills. In 1955, it was 11.9 mills for operating and 2.5 mills for Bond Retirement, or a total of 14.4 mills or a reduction of .9 mills, so by voting an additional 1 mill, the rate will not be increased over the rate paid in 1953 due to a reduction in the Bond Retirement paid.

The Local District has no debts other than the Bonded indebtedness which was incurred in the building program of 1951-52. Three school buses have been replaced with larger buses. The present enrollment is 537. There are 21 full time employees on the School Staff, six full time bus drivers, 2 janitors and 3 cafeteria cooks.

We are sure that you want to retain and maintain your school to the best of every taxpayers ability. This can be done by local interest and participation. Your Board of Education asks that you vote YES for the 4 mill levy at the November 8th election.

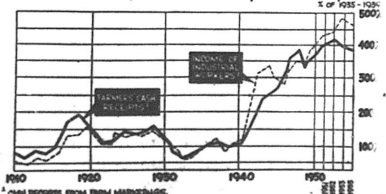

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Plymouth Drops Homecoming Tilt in Poor Showing

Wakeman Defeats Pilgrims, 19-0; Final Game at Burgoon

An aroused and hard-hitting Townsend-Wakeman eleven upset Plymouth's Pilgrims, 19 to 0, before the largest crowd of the season - about 400 - in Mary Faye park Thursday night, and before the game was over many of that crowd were departing in disgust.

For not only were the Pilgrims never in the ball game, but they seemed unwilling to change bad habits. Their vaunted passing attack connected for only one completion, the defensive line was like a sieve, and after Ray Einsel's pass on their first offensive play of the game was intercepted, the Red and White appeared to sense certain doom and played like it for the rest of the game.

The Rough Riders scored on a sustained drive the second time they got the ball. After Jim Jacobs had kicked off, Townsend-Wakeman's offense splattered to its own 31 before Bill Jackson, who played brilliantly for the Blue and White, punted to Ted Fox. Einsel's first play call was a pass intended for Ed Taylor.

However good his intentions, it nestled in the arms of Ron Link, who was dropped on the Plymouth 43. A dozen plays later Bill Bailey cracked center for the score.

The Pilgrims mounted their only scoring threat of the night after the ensuing kickoff. The gun for the first quarter only temporarily interfered with the Plymouth offensive, which carried to the Wakeman 14, where four plays gained only one yard, and the Rough Riders took over.

From this point it was increasingly apparent the outmanned, out-weighted and outgamed Pilgrims had shot their wad. Fumbles by Bud Berberick and Ray Einsel cost the Pilgrims possession once, but it was lack of a satisfactory charge by the forwards more than a stout Rough Rider defense that cost so heavily.

At half time, only six points down, a right-about-face was clearly indicated for the Pilgrims, and from their attitude upon return from the dressing room it appeared the eager Plymouth fans might indeed see that.

But Marty Hampton, heretofore thoroughly dependable, contributed to the delinquency of the Pilgrims with an amazing reverse-drive run after bobbling the kickoff. Fielding the ball as though it were afire on his own 21, he darted to his rear, was finally knocked down on the Plymouth four, and fumbled in the bargain. Townsend-Wakeman recovered and Bailey punched over for the second score

in a matter of seconds. Thus down 12 points, Hampton endeavored to recover his poise with a splendid bit of hipper-dipper on a fake handoff with the kickoff. He sped down the right sideline for 58 yards before being knocked out of bounds on the Wakeman 23.

The Pilgrims pushed to the Rough Rider 14, and then to the enemy six with first down. But cracks at guard and tackle produced no gain and when Fox fumbled Einsel's pitchout on the option play, Plymouth was back at the Wakeman 10, on fourth down, Einsel's pass to Taylor in the end zone was wild.

Plymouth was never again to penetrate Wakeman territory. Thrice there was an exchange of possession by fumbles, twice on the Plymouth side, before Coach Lew Pettit benched his quarterback and inserted young Dick Akers, a freshman. At the same time, another yearling, Dave Wallace, went in at center. On fourth down, Wallace passed back from center toward Hampton, in punt formation. The ball sailed over his head to the goal, where he retrieved it and got back to the three.

Three smashes at guard produced no gain before Tom Mahl rounded end for the third touchdown. Bailey's buck for the point was good.

Despite the fact the Plymouth ground game was not going anywhere through the big Wakeman line, the Pilgrim signal caller repeatedly sent his back into the line for small or no gain. Einsel's first play after the third kickoff was a pass intercepted by Lynn Bailey, who ran back to the Pilgrim 21. But the Rough Riders got nowhere and, on second down after the surrender of possession to the Pilgrims, Einsel fumbled. The damage was slight, because the Blue and White returned the favor two plays later.

Akers returned to the quarterback slot and showed signs that as he gains poise he will be a useful signal caller. Leroy Foster made his third pass interception of the game on one of Akers' passes, but it was a well-thrown ball and deserved a better fate.

The Wakeman eleven handed possession back to the Pilgrims, and again Akers' pass was intercepted. Wakeman again thrusting toward the Plymouth goal when the final gun sounded. It was a sorry exhibition. Coach Pettit explained in the dressing room, where several of his seniors were sobbing in tears, that "the upperclassmen just didn't want to play ball tonight. My freshmen played better ball. I just can't explain it any other way."

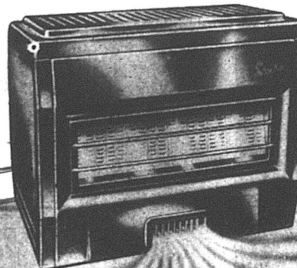

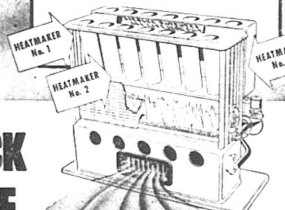

Elections Board Says Ads Confusing Since Made for Paper Ballot

Widespread advertising for and against changes in the constitutional amendments at the General election has caused some confusion, the board of elections says. Since most counties have not yet converted to voting machines, the advertising has been prepared for paper ballots. On voting machines those in favor of the measure vote "For" and those opposed, "Against," rather than Yes or No, as advertised.

The biggest point of confusion, however, is in the number of the issues.

Question 2 on the Huron county voting machines is on the proposed bond issue—for public buildings. There has not been much advertising on this issue, but it may be advertised as Amendment 1.

Question 4 on the voting machines concerns the changing of salaries of certain officials during a term of office. Statewide literature and advertising call this amendment Number 2.

Question 6 on the voting machines relates to the changing of salaries of judges during their terms of office. This is advertised as Number 3.

Question 10 concerns the controversial unemployment compensation issue or referendum, and is widely advertised by both factions as Question 4.

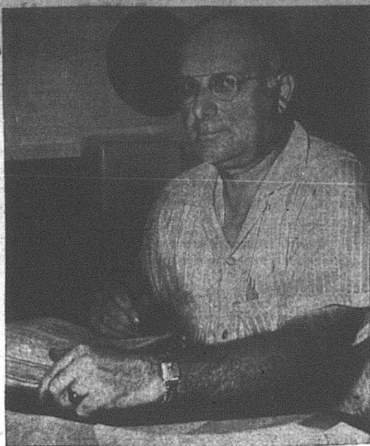
Question 12 and subsequent thereto concern county and local issues in each particular district.

Because many voters do not understand the issues, since generally they are not confronted with them until they enter the voting machine, Huron county officials with representatives of townships organized a committee for improved public service last summer, with the primary objective of bringing these important issues to the attention of the public in advance of election, for pre-voting consideration.

Where voters take the time, confusion may be avoided by reading the issues, which are plainly stated.
