Feed Stilbesrol, Experts Advise, For Better Bees

Cattle gains are stimulated by stilbesterol feeding, John Wells, Huron county agricultural agent, says. Facts seem well established that beef from cattle receiving approved amounts of the drug is fully as wholesome as beef produced by any other feeding methods. Wise Burroughs, professor of

animal husbandry, Iowa State college, Ames, Ia., based the following observations on 19 college experiments involving 548 cattle.

Cattle liveweight gains were stimulated consistently by stilbesterol feeding in 18 of the 19 experiments. The hormone boosted gains an average of 16 percent. A level of 10 milligrams of stilbesterol or less per animal daily was fed in

the experiments reported.

Feed costs were reduced in 18 of the 19 experiments. The one exception was a Kansas experiment where steer calves were fed a high grain ration. Average reduction in feed costs from stilbesterol feeding was 12 percent.

Calves (under 600 pounds) gained an average of 12 percent faster when 10 mg. daily of stilbesterol

were added to high-energy rations. Calves gained an average of four percent faster when the same level of stilbesterol was added to high-roughage rations.

The Food and Drug Administration has not yet allowed the feeding of stilbesterol to beef calves under 600 pounds.

Feeding stilbesterol to bred beef cows hasn't appeared to affect their

calves; running swine behind cattle fed stilbesterol hasn't appeared to affect their litters. Additional research must be completed on these questions before definite recommendations can be made.

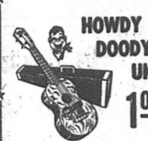
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Mrs. Gowitzka

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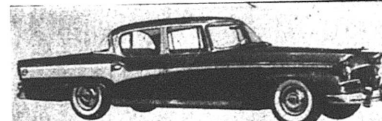
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Plymouth Drops Opener, 52 to 37

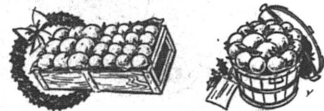

Sourwine Suggests Early Card Mailing

Postmaster Claude E. Sourwine announced today that there has been a steady increase in the flow of Christmas cards and packages through the post office the past few days. He said he was glad to see that many people are getting their Christmas gifts for distant points into the mail this week. Packages addressed to folks living in other states should be mailed before Dec. 5th and those for near-by points before Dec. 10th.

Stressing the need for everyone to cooperate on his 1955 "Mail Early for Christmas" campaign, Postmaster Sourwine says that by following these three simple rules, you're certain to have your gifts delivered before Christmas Day: **Wrap them securely. Address them correctly. And mail them early.**

Of course, early mailing of all Christmas cards and gifts is a big help in getting everything delivered before Christmas. Keep in mind that careful packing and correct addressing are equally important. Every year many poorly wrapped packages break open, despite careful handling, and we often have to puzzle over addresses which are incomplete or simply can't be read at all.

"If you have any articles of unusual size or bulk, better check with the post office before attempting to mail them," the Postmaster warns. "The limits on size and weight of packages vary, depending on where you mail your package from."

Some post offices cannot accept packages that are more than 72 inches in combined length and girth, nor more than 20 pounds in weight. Such is the case now that Plymouth is a first class post office. In others, the limits go up to 100 inches in combined length and 70 pounds in weight.

Don't seal your parcel unless you include a notice reading "Contents merchandise — may be opened for postal inspection" along with your return address and the recipient's address on the mailing label. If you use Christmas stickers or seals, put them on the back of your Christmas cards and packages so that they will not conflict with the address on the front. Before you release your packages, be sure that proper postage is firmly affixed to each. It's a good idea to place a piece of transparent cellophane

tape over the address portion of the label to prevent defacing it in transit.

Change in Method Of Grading Beef Under Discussion

A change in present grades of beef is now being discussed in marketing circles, according to John Wells, Huron county agricultural agent. Present grades of beef are prime, choice, good, commercial, utility and cutter and canner. In order for cattle to fall in the prime, choice and good grades the carcasses must be from relatively young cattle.

It is now proposed that the present commercial grade be divided into the grade name "standard" but applied to beef from carcasses of younger animals and "commercial" be retained for beef from mature animals falling in the present commercial grade. This would allow mature animals to be graded higher and in a different classification than is now possible in the present grading system.

The rural economics department at Ohio State university reports that lambs now on feed to be marketed in winter and spring months are somewhat smaller than a year ago. Shipments of feeder lambs to the Ohio area, were about two percent less than normal.

Demand for meat products has remained fairly constant throughout 1955, even though meat prices decreased slightly. Larger supplies now exist on the market, which would tend to discourage any major increases in farm prices for meat animals. Wells urges farmers to market meat animals when they are in the most desirable weight and grade, rather than holding for an anticipated increase in market price.

Baumhart to Run For Second Term

Rep. A. D. Baumhart, Jr., announced today that he will seek

re-election as representative in Congress from the 13th Ohio district, which includes Lorain, Erie, Huron and Sandusky counties.

Mr. Baumhart was elected to his present term in November, 1954. He had served a previous term in Congress in 1941 and 1942 before entering the U. S. Navy for 42 months. From 1936 to 1940 he was a member of the Ohio Senate for two terms.

In making his announcement, Mr. Baumhart said:

"It has been a great pleasure to represent the people of my district during the past year, and it is my hope that we can complete the programs which are presently underway."

Mr. Baumhart and his family live at Vermilion.

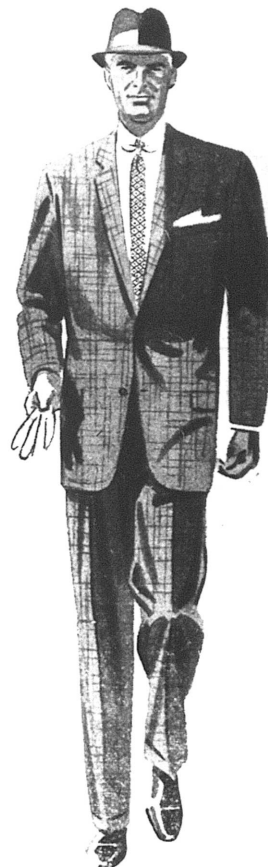

Watts Thinks Monsarrat's Book Disappointing —

Library Adds Book By Thomas Costain

By BROOKS WATTS

Thomas B. Costain's newest opus, a two-volume historical novel titled "The Tontine," and Nicholas Monsarrat's latest work, "Castle Garra," are among recent additions to the shelves of Plymouth branch library.

Monsarrat, who has achieved considerable prestige in the world of the novel for previous efforts, has turned out a short book of suspense which he terms a "Gothic novel."

There really is not very much Gothic about it. It is a tale of suspense about a plot to obtain the estate of the Countess of Garra in a forgotten and slightly run down chateau in the Alps Maritimes near the Italian border.

The hero, such as he is, is an American writer. The heroine is a slimy French girl who never really does come alive, the victim of a clever plot by two shrewd opportunists to get their hands on the fortune of a girl who disappeared during the Nazi occupation.

She is persuaded to believe that she is in fact the long lost countess. Naturally, she will probably choose the sex-charged woman of the plotting pair as her preceptor, at a handsome figure.

But the young American steps in, changes things because he falls in love with the girl, and this alone would make a reasonable plot satisfying to most readers if the characterizations were developed suf-

ficiently. But Monsarrat has another twist of plot: she really is the disappeared countess.

It's all very confusing, and something of a letdown after heightening suspense for 90 per cent of the book. For shame, Nicky boy, your public will expect better of you next time.

Costain, if you like the historical-cum-fiction novel is at his best. He has a flair for the kind of thing he writes about, and while it is not our particular dish of tea, will probably amuse those who haven't much better to do with their time.

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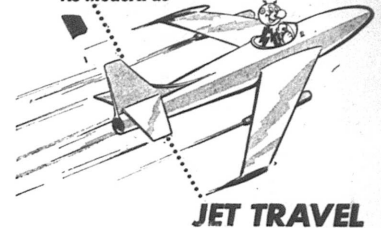
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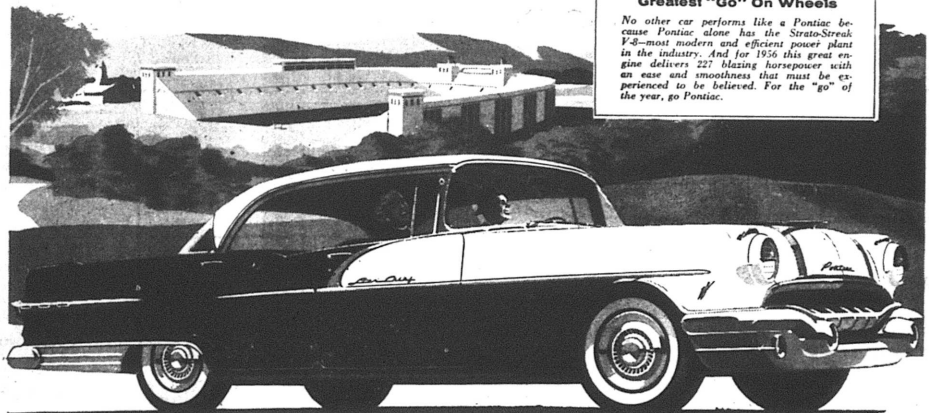
