

Because when it was too late, money could not buy the cure, despite the fact her beloved husband stood ready to spare no expense. God rest you well, ma'am.

Coddling

We applaud the action of Juvenile Court Judge Cramer in fixing severe punishment upon the young man who -was caught in the act of thievery. It is high time that we stopped coddling the young men and women hereabouts.

If we are to believe what we read in the Sunday supplements, the young people themselves are opposed to coddling. 




