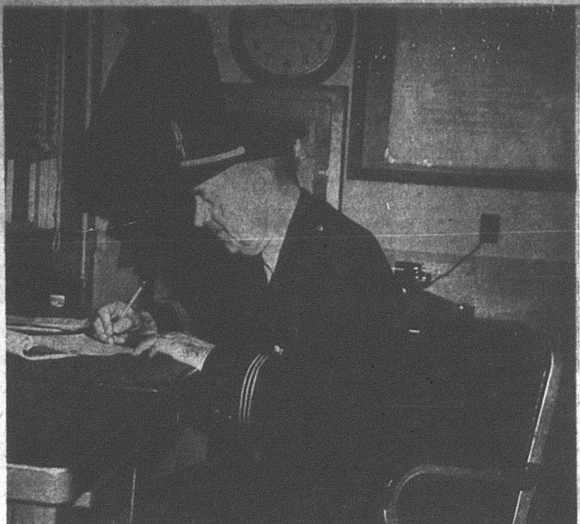

Lions Nip Petitmen In League Contest

Shiloh's hungry Lions mauled, claued and thoroughly whipped Plymouth's hapless Petitmen, 85 to 29, at Shiloh Tuesday night in a game they call basketball.

It bore a little resemblance to basketball as justfists to tiddy-winks.

Poor officiating and a clearly superior team whose superiority was built as much upon its opposition's inferiority as upon its own excellence detracted from the presentation of the skills about which the game was built by Dr. Naismith.

Except, that is, for the canny performance of young Jack Hair, who can move to his right faster and with greater speed than Alvin Dark. Hair scored 31 points, and had he not had an off night, his total would probably have been larger.

He was ably supported by Otis Hughes, gangling center, who all but controlled all of the rebounds with 22 markets, and George Poffenbaugh, who had only 13.

The Plymouth quintet never was in the ball game. Even though after two minutes of play the score the score was knotted at four all, the Pilgrims had scored from outside. They never were able to penetrate the tight Shiloh defense, as well-coached a team defensively as has been seen in the Richland county league for some years.

Only Ted Fox's accuracy from outside saved the Pilgrims from annihilation, although there are some doubts whether this may not be preferable to humiliation.

The Lions passed rings around the Pilgrims, scored whenever they set their minds to it, and kept up the pressure throughout the contest. Coach Harold Daup, mindful of the setback his charges received at Ontario, when overconfidence dumped them, kept the first stringers in the game until the last few moments.

The crispness of their passing and the ease of scoring made victory seem, perhaps, too facile. Yet the Lions' vaunted end-court out-of-bounds play fizzled all but twice and after a time they gave it up. Coach Lew Pettit started second stringers in the third period

\$100 Raise Voted To All Teachers; New Salary Slate Tabled

Teachers in Plymouth public schools got a \$100 Christmas present Tuesday night.

The Board of Education voted a raise of that much for each teacher and tabled a new salary schedule for 1956-57.

A poll of parents conducted by Supt. M. J. Coon showed 179 for and 18 against school activities on Sundays. Some Good May Derive-- But Action Begins at Home

Senator Charles A. Mosher of Oberlin, who represents Richland county in the Ohio Senate, was a delegate to the White House Conference on Education and wrote three of the Ohio recommendations to the conference.

Senator Mosher has always impressed us as a level-headed legislator who thinks deeply, feels strongly, and speaks his mind forcefully, especially in matters relating to education. We would not have it otherwise.

Which is why we paid particular attention to his report from Washington. "... Ohio has sufficient wealth to support its own system of public education and at any level of excellence the people of Ohio may desire," the committee said. "Such level can be and should be at least comparable to that afforded by any other state. We urge that Ohio immediately accept this responsibility."

Ohio's committee admits it is in the minority: it wants no federal aid to education.

"It is imperative that our schools provide an increasingly higher quality of education and demand a higher level of effort and accomplishment from pupils, especially in the basic skills," the committee went on to say. It amplified the statement, but we maintain that no amplification is needed. The committee has it all in a nutshell: the truth is we are furnishing our youngsters with a halfbaked education, and it's nobody's fault but our own.

Any school man will tell you that he can only put out the kind of education the patrons of the school district will stand for. If the teachers grade too tough, they hear about it. But if they don't grade tough enough, nobody says a word.

Pressure of pupil population in schools, particularly the smaller ones, is such that teachers had better not fail a pupil: there's no room for him to sit down in the next class.

So they skid through. We are very frankly disappointed with the kind - the average kind, that is - of product of our schools. These young men and women just don't have it. In a day when education is so readily available to all, and when it was never more needed, our high school graduates are less equipped to do a job in business, or industry, or life than they were, say, 15 years ago.

It is not the fault of the educators. Their salaries are paid by the patrons

of the school district. They do, or try to do, exactly what they think the patrons will stand for.

There was tragedy at our house last week. Our Suzie came home with a B, her first one, after straight A's. She cried bitter tears, and we felt badly that she felt badly. When we remarked upon this fact to our coffee klatsch, somebody said he was glad his child was average.

There's the nub of the whole problem. We have become so wrapped up with being average that we do not encourage scholarship. It is more important that a youngster take part in extra-curricular activities and be a member of the mob than to excel in his studies.

Our schools are aimed toward this achievement. Bright students are frankly unpopular, as much with teachers as with other pupils. And encouragement of advanced education is as much absent from the tone and motivation of our teaching as instruction in the use of narcotics or alcohol.

Ohio says it wants no federal aid because it will mean submission to federal control. In principle, that sounds fine. But what if that federal control should develop like it has in, say, France? Where the federal government sets high standards of scholarship and denies accreditation for completion of the secondary school curriculum to those who cannot meet its high standards?

There is no secret that we put out an inferior brand of student in this state, despite the effort of our university presidents to cover it up. Everybody knows that year in and year out, the students of the incoming class at Ohio State university who rank in the top 10 per cent of the group are, for the most part, out-of-state students, mostly from the east.

We were always taught that since we put our pants on one leg at a time and this is a free country, we are entitled to just what the next fellow gets, and not to settle for less. This has made us into an aggressive character, because we have a champagne taste.

We like champagne, and you can take that figuratively or literally. We like champagne and what it stands for, and insist upon our right to get it for ourselves and our children in whatever facet of life you might suggest. Most especially in schools.

And let's have none of that balderdash about a beer pocketbook. Ohio ranks eighth in income among the 48 states. We can give our kids the equal of what New Yorkers give their kids, and for our part, we do not intend to rest until we do get it.

The place to start is our own school board, and we will never cease - no matter how unpopular it may be - to urge the present board to establish and demand higher standards than are now in force. Some day, we hope, our neighbors will realize we are right.

Around The Square with Phineas Whittleseed

Anybody who thinks there hasn't been a business slump hereabouts had better have his head examined. And that it is hurting retailers throughout this part of the state is the frank truth.

Part of it derives from the drop in agricultural prices. A story from Columbus points to a four per cent decrease in farm income during November, a month when farm income should be high. Corn and wheat prices are down, in part because the government isn't supporting the prices of those commodities so strongly.

Part of it derives from the strike in Mansfield, where employees of Westinghouse have refused to report for their duties for several weeks. Families that were regularly meeting their grocery bills and paying their current and heating costs can't do so now.

They can't do so because they were living on modest incomes and equally modest savings, and couldn't stand the strain of several weeks without work.

Eventually work will resume, and they will start the long pull toward breaking even again. It takes longer to pay it back than it does to borrow. Like the fat man (and we know) who said, "It comes off a lot harder than it goes on!"

This section of the middle west derives its income in part from diversified farming and in part from light industry.

Industrial turnover is continuing at a high level, without much variation up or down. If employees are not making their common salary potential in industry right now, it's no one's fault but their own.

Agriculturally speaking, the effect of the longstanding high support policy of the Democratic administration is beginning to make itself felt because high supports are being removed. It is pretty much akin to what happens when a man who has been using narcotics is suddenly denied them.

The government - by which is meant all of the people of the United States - ought to realize that the way to cure a man who's been on a drug is to wean him gradually. The "cold turkey" method which is employed with criminals and dope peddlers at the U. S. Public Health Service hospital at Lexington, Ky., works only sometimes. And farmers are certainly not criminals, despite the fact they have been feeding off the lotus flower since the mid-thirties.

Thus a downward sliding scale for farm support prices seems called for. Farmers hereabouts - at least those who seem to be well-heeled and able to stand the pressure of a competitive situation if the forces of supply and demand are allowed full play, that includes those whose mortgages are in good shape - apparently would like to have the "cold turkey" system applied.

The sensible among them say that the marginal

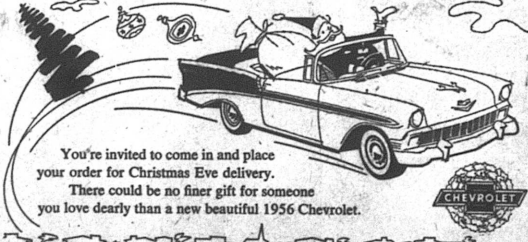

farmer - the fellow who works an industry job eight hours a day or night and his farm the rest of the time - has either got to work the scepter or descend from the throne. He's either got to farm efficiently or not farm at all. This in-between stuff is fatal. To him, to farmers generally, and to the nation.

It's easy to pontificate on the errors of what we do or don't do, and there are many armchair who do just that. But what are we doing about it?

Well, some farmers hereabouts have organized into an association which has as its main motive the complete upstopping of the crop control program and the price support idea. They may be right in their intentions. But the manner in which they undertake to achieve their ambitions is not particularly pleasant to those who have learned that a gradual weaning is easier than the "cold turkey" system.

There is no objection to the "cold turkey" system if steps are taken to enable those hurt the most to obtain funds for long term use at low interest rates so that they will not become wards of the county.

And speaking of wards of the county, those of us who live in Richland county had better start saving up their spare pennies. Because the tax bill next year is going to be bigger - much bigger.

For one thing, the county auditor has already announced that a team of experts will visit every section of the county to re-value properties for tax purposes. Since the system in force entails estimation of what building costs were in a particular year, it is plain that any re-evaluation which is based upon a year later than the previous one will result in more taxes. One sure bet for 1956: your property tax will be higher.

And taxes in Richland county generally will need to be bigger because there is more demand for tax money. A lot of it is being taken up in relief money. More people unable to find work, more people whose small savings have been dissipated while they are on strike. They've got to be fed. And we're feeding them. It costs money.

Another sure bet for 1956: if the union ever gets to be bigger because comes to terms with the company, thus ending the strike, it'll never again call a strike when inventories are high. That's the mistake it made in Westinghouse's case, and Westinghouse will bring 'em to their knees before they're through. One man in Mansfield said as how that wouldn't be such a bad idea. "There's a helluva lot of 'em," he said, "who haven't been on their knees since they were kids. I'll do 'em good."

So we find ourselves, when it all comes down to a point, in a business slump. It means that merchants are having a Christmas season less satisfactory than the effects of the downward and upward trend can be ameliorated. The machinery lies idle in the government to do just that.

Is there any reason why this must be so? One of the criticisms by old-school economists of the New Deal was - and is - that its managers thought they could rig the economy. Can the business cycle be controlled?
